

AFC Asian Cup 2019 Qualifiers

India confirm finals berth

Sleeping giant' India woke up on Wednesday, securing their passage into the 2019 AFC Asian Cup in the United Arab Emirates with a rousing 4-1 win against minnows Macau at the Sree Kanteerava stadium yesterday.

A fourth straight win in Group A saw the 'Blue Tigers' cement a top-2 finish in the qualifying round along with a berth in the main draw of the second oldest continental football championship in the world. India last played in the tournament in 2011 when they qualified after winning the AFC Challenge Cup. This is India's fourth qualification after 1964, 1984 and 2011.
