### **Pakistan bans** Latif for five vears

Pakistan cricket's anti-corruption tribunal Wednesday banned opener Khalid Latif for five years and fined him one million rupees (\$9,489) over a spot-fixing case, the second casualty after teammate Sharjeel Khan was banned late last month.

"Latif is banned for five vears and fined one million rupees after the proceedings of the case," the threemember tribunal announced.

The 31-year-old has played five one-day internationals and 13 T20Is, the last of which was against the West Indies in Abu Dhabi in September

## **Karim Benzema** extends Madrid contract

Karim Benzema became the latest Real Madrid star to sign a new bumper four-year contract with the European champions to 2021, the club announced yesterday.

"Real Madrid and Benzema have agreed to extend the contract of the player, who will remain tied to the club until June 30, 2021," Madrid said in a statement.

Vice-captain Marcelo, Isco and Dani Carvajal all extended to 2022 over the past week as Real reward key members of the squad that became the first side to retain the Champions League trophy in June. (AFP)

# Juwana crashes out of taekwondo battle

Bahrain suffered another heartbreaking exit yesterday at the Fifth Asian Indoor and Martial Arts Games in Ashgabat, Turkmenistan, when Juwana Mohammed bowed out in the Round of 16 of the women's 62kg and under category on the second day of taekwondo events at the Taekwondo DanceSport

The 17-year old Bahraini lost out 27-10 to Vietnam's Thi Nguyen Ha and out of the battle for medals.

In the first round, the Vietnamese held a 9-5 points lead, then extended it to 19-9 following a (10-4) second round and finished off in style winning 8-1 in the third round.

It was an emotional outcome for Juwana, whose elder sister Jumana lost out in the quarter finals of the women's under-73kg category on Tuesday, going down to her Philippine opponent Kirstl Alora 17-10 in the quarter-finals.

Bahrain stays on two medals, thanks to Ali Monfaradi and Ahmed Shebeeb, who took the men's under-77kg gold and bronze medals, respectively on Monday.

on the penultimate day of taekwondo competition, when Walaa Al Doseri, Bahrain's last hope in this discipline heads

into her opening women's under-57-kg bout with Chimi Dolma of Bhutan at 7.30am (Bahrain time).

The trio Bahrainis are being coached by Tawfeeq Nuwaiser of Jordan, who earlier described the event is a golden opportunity for his young athletes to acquire more experience, improve their skills and boost their rating

After the completion of taekwondo today, Bahrain's last chance of medal success rests with Adam Batirov in the 70kg freestyle category, when the former Asian champion coached by Mahmood Magomedov is in action on Monday. In total, Bahrain has sent nine athletes in three sports disciplines - Jiu Jjitsu, Taekwondo and Wrestling for the 12-day games, being organised for the first time in a Central Asian country and featuring more than 6,000 athletes from 65 nations from

Asia, Oceania and a Refugee team

Meanwhile, Bahrain Royal Equestrian and Endurance Federation president and Bahrain chef de mission Shaikh Faisal bin Rashid Al Khalifa visited Olympic Council of Asia president Shaikh Ahmed Al Fahad Al Sabah, who is also present in Ashgabat.

Both sides had discussions on the games progress and tremendous success Turkmenistan achieved so far as the first central Asian nation to host this event.

Elsewhere, Bahrain Olympic Committee general secretary Abdulrahman Askar headed his nation's side at the Olympic Council of Asia meetings held in Turkmenistan's capital on the sidelines of the games.

Shaikh Ahmed chaired the meeting, in which he commended the efforts of Ashgabat in bringing this continental gathering on its home soil as well as the opening ceremony programme, which he described as 'outstanding.'

Bergen, Norway

Dutchman Tom Dumoulin took a stunning victory in the men's time-trial at the world championships in Bergen yesterday.

Slovenia's Primoz Roglic finished second almost a minute back with Tour de France and Vuelta a Espana winner Chris Froome of Britain third.

Four-time world champion Tony Martin could finish only ninth as the punishing final 3.4km climb to the finish of the 31km course penalised the powerful German.

Having finished third behind Bradley Wiggins and Martin in 2014 and second to Fabian Cancellara at last year's Rio Olympics, this was a first major global time-trial title for Dumoulin, whose Sunweb outfit claimed team time-trial gold on Sunday.

"I can't believe it, wow! It's

really amazing, it's such a good

day," said Dumoulin.
"I thought the power meter was off because it was so high! I felt really, really good. It started

raining and I had to take the corners really slowly, especially in the climb.

"The back wheel was slipping because I had a TT (time-trial) bike because I thought it would be dry."

The 26-year-old is enjoying the best year of his career having also won May's Giro

d'Italia, his first Grand Tour success.

The finishing climb to the course in Bergen meant the race favoured good climbers and Dumoulin was expected to face stiff competition from Froome and Rohan Dennis of Australia.

Dennis was second behind Dumoulin at the second and third time-checks but a crash on the slippery, wet course cost him a significant amount of time and he had dropped to 21st by the fourth check.

He recovered to finish eighth but some 1min 37.39sec behind Dumoulin.

Froome, who 10 days ago completed a Tour-Vuelta double, seemed a little off the pace at the beginning. Whereas the roads had been dry half an hour earlier, he was amongst the final group that had to contend with rain.
