Bahrain's premier healthcare regulatory authority yesterday revealed stringent actions against 53 medical practitioners for medical negligence.

The move, intended to ensure high quality medical care, follows Prime Minister HRH Prince Khalifa bin Salman Al Khalifa's directives to tackle the growing rate of medical negligence in the Kingdom.

Voicing its strong resolve in this regard, National Health Regulatory Authority (NHRA), which deals with the complaints related to healthcare in Bahrain, said it received 171 complaints against hospitals both in the private and public sector.

The authority put 24 doctors, 23 nurses and six assistants in the dock after it investigated into 57 complaints registered. 43 disciplinary actions were taken against the defaulters.

Thirteen doctors were suspended following the

probe, while 14 others were let off with warnings.

Revealing details of the probe during a press conference, NHRA CEO Dr. Mariam Al Jalahma said around 54 per cent of the complaints were against private healthcare institutions. Public hospitals closely followed with 46pc complaints. "Around 67pc of the complaints received were related to emergency, maternity, orthopaedic and dental," she added.

Twelve out of these cases were referred to the

disciplinary committees and one taken to the Public Prosecution.

Meanwhile, the Supreme Health Council Chairman Lieutenant General Shaikh Mohammed bin Abdullah Al Khalifa said he has directed the NHRA to increase the working days of the disciplinary committee to prioritise complaints.

NHRA is also investigating alleged 'medical negligence in the recent death of two Bahraini children. Earlier, four-year-old Layla Khamees died in her father's arms at Salmaniya Medical Complex (SMC) while waiting to be treated. Another Bahraini boy Yousif Madan died on his way to SMC after initially being told he was fine by doctors at SMC. A third child Abdulla Mahmood Jassim who was 18-months-old also died of medical complications.

Parents of the children had accused SMC and health centres of medical negligence adding that their children's tragic death could have been avoided by the timely intervention of the concerned authorities.

#### 'Furious'

Jennifer Behr, a fashion accessory designer from Brooklyn, arrived from Baltimore on a train packed with passengers wearing pink hats, one of the symbols of the protest.

"Ît's important we assert our majority and we have a large physically presence" to show President Donald Trump and the Republican majority in Congress "that they cannot railroad our country," said Behr, 42. "I am furious at Trump's treatment of women and how he talks about women," she said.

#### 'Great concern'

Lisa Gottschalk, a 55 year-old scientist, came from Pennsylvania to express her "great concern" about the new president. The protesters will "make sure to keep him honest and we'll stand up so that he doesn't do things that are unfair," Gottschalk said. The march "is a demonstration of our solidarity and our belief that America should be great and should look out for all people of all stripes.

#### Muslims not 'terrorists'

Norman was accompanied by her sister Barbara Hilton, 62, who wore a pink hat, the knitted caps marchers have adopted in a sly allusion to Trump's crude sexual references to women.

"The family of my husband are immigrants," said Hilton. "They are Muslim. Not one is a terrorist."

#### 'So against' Trump

Kim Lee-Wilkins came from Maryland specifically to protest against Trump's efforts to repeal Obama's signature accomplishment, the Affordable Care Act, better known as Obamacare.

But a lot more than that was at stake, she said. The 60-year-old African American said she fears a return to the ugly days of racial segregation. "Now we are going back to where we were in the 50s, and I am not going to stand for it," she said.

Trump "doesn't stand for me, he doesn't stand for the majority of the people around here, so I am here to make a stand and my voice will be heard," she said.

"It's upsetting to see what's happening," said Karine Bailly, a 35-year-old who works in communications and lives in the US capital.

Trump's inauguration, she said, is "not the version of America that we want to see. It's not just about America first, it's about the world first.

"To me it was a bit sad." (AFP)

# 'Attackers wanted to sabotage worship'

The group of individuals, who attacked the Bahraini embassy in London on Friday, intended to prevent worshippers from attending the Friday prayer held at the embassy premises, according to sources.

"The group of individuals gathered near the embassy to halt the work of diplomats and to prevent worshippers from attending the weekly Friday prayers. Some of the embassy staff interfered to stop them and move them away from the embassy," a source in the embassy told Al Ayam daily.

As reported yesterday, a video shared online showed the group

assaulting the embassy for the second time in less than a week. They closed the entrance of the embassy using steel chains before the embassy staff and British police removed it. Some of the individuals even verbally abused the staff

"The embassy was not forcibly closed by the vandals and it resumed works regularly after the attackers were dispersed," the source said adding that the embassy is in the process of taking legal action against these groups.

The act was condemned by several politicians and rights groups who described the act as a violation to international pacts and agreements which instruct to protect diplomatic



Ambassador to the UK Shaikh Fawaz bin Mohammed Al Khalifa confirmed that a female British staffer sustained a back injury in the incident.

"I extend my concern to a valued staffer subjected to harassment when entering Embassy premises," he posted on his official Twitter page.

The ambassador asserted that the assault violates the Vienna Convention on Diplomatic Relations, which safeguards the security and protection of diplomatic missions

It is a weekly routine for the Kingdom's embassy in London to receive worshippers from Arab and Islamic diplomatic missions for sermons on Friday.



## Asian man arrested with drugs worth BD236000

## **Making Feminism** a Priority at the **United Nations**

they around the table?" Swedish Foreign Minister Margot Wallstrom recently asked during a visit to the United Nations. Sweden has just started its 2-year term on the UN Security Council, and it is determined to make sure that women are involved in future peace processes as they are usually excluded from the table.

Despite having an entity entirely devoted to women's issues (UN Women), catchy slogans and the inclusion of gender equality as one of the new Sustainable Development Goals, the UN still grapples with putting gender equality into practice in its own organization. In October hopes for the first female Secretary-General were dashed when former Prime Minister of Portugal, Antonio Guterres, became the 8th Secretary-General. The UN's uneven support for women was also recently revealed in a news article by Devex, which reported that the World Food Programme, a UN entity, asked its staff not to attend the Women's Marches which took place across the world Saturday to highlight women's issues.

The idea for the main march, in Washington, D.C., came out of the aftermath of the US Presidential Election and the World Food Programme thus felt that it was not appropriate for staff to attend. Although the organization's reasoning is understandable, the marches were not political and intended to promote gender equality. Ultimately the UN should be supporting women's initiatives, not telling its own employees—who are leaders in the development field—to

Grassroots women's initiatives need encouragement and support in order to make their voices heard. The UN needs to practice what it preaches, as it sets an example for the whole world. If it cannot support gender equality in its own hallowed halls, then why should any country follow its advice?

The UN needs to make women a greater priority in both its internal and external agendas. Yet there is hope: Secretary-General Guterres has stated that he wants to fill half of the top positions under his command with women. And UN Women's Executive Board has just elected a new president for 2017, and this time a woman is taking the helm: Lana Zaki Nusseibeh, the United Arab Emirates' Ambassador to the UN. Advancing women's empowerment is one of Her Excellency's key focuses, and I wish her success in promoting UN Women's priorities within the United Nations and

# Medical fees hike; **Expats to feel the heat**

The sudden hike in fees at government health centres and hospitals for expats might force low paid workers to turn to 'alternative treatment' which puts their health at risk, according to a social worker

The increased fees at government health centres and hospitals could be too big of a burden for low paid expatriates, said Migrant Workers Protection Society (MWPS) Chairperson Marietta

"It is likely that these workers turn to alternatives such as home remedies or take advise from unqualified persons to treat their illness or they might decide not to seek treatment," she said.

Earlier the Health Ministry hiked the medical care cost for non-Bahrainis at public hospitals and health centres

from BD3 to BD7. It also mentioned that expats will have to purchase their medications from private pharmacies.

According to her, this move will have many repercussions on the labourers.

"This is going to affect the low paid workers more than anyone. They will have to suffer as they cannot afford healthcare," she said.

"They are being paid a very low salary so it is impossible to pay this amount. Many are being paid BD150 or BD100

or less as it is in many cases. In such cases, how can they afford BD7 plus the additional charges including the payment to the pharmacy? It might end up costing BD20 to BD30 and many cannot afford that," she

Marietta Das warns that it is dangerous if these people seek home remedies and alternatives that could potentially harm

"However, if they are not able to afford healthcare they may feel that they are left without another choice. They might try something based on bad advise or they might take help from someone unqualified and this will harm them. Taking these sort of alternatives could make their illness worse, and we will have people with all sorts of untreated diseases," she

When asked if the employers should take up the responsibility of paying for healthcare expenses of the employees in such cases,

not practical.

It makes sense in theory but in practice, the employers may find a way around it. They may deduct the amounts from the worker's salary. The poor workers would be too afraid to protest or may not know his rights," she

Published in the Official Gazette, the decision stipulates that non-Bahrainis are obliged to pay BD7 for general medical consultancy. It is also mentioned that expats will have to purchase their medications from private pharmacies.

"Other services such as laboratory tests, X-ray, nursing, maternity and physiotherapy will be priced according to the approved prices at the ministry for each service," the resolution

Expats who work in the public sector and their dependents were however excluded from the decision.

Security forces raided a suspected "terrorist" hideout used for making explosive belts and other devices in a southern district of Jeddah, a spokesman for the ministry said in a statement.

Two men holed up inside the premises shot at security forces, who returned fire, according to the statement carried by the official Saudi Press Agency.

The suspects refused to surrender and "blew

themselves up by detonating their explosive belts", it said, confirming an earlier statement Ieddah authorities.

Pictures posted on Twitter showed a fire at the site of the shootout.

The interior ministry spokesman also said that a third suspect was arrested on Saturday in a security operation targeting another Jeddah neighbourhood.

The suspect, a Saudi national, is believed to have had links to the two men who blew themselves up.

He was arrested along with a Pakistani women whom he identified as his wife, the spokesman said.

# Car bomb kills 11 at Syria-Jordan border camp

#### **Beirut**

Acar bomb blast killed at least 11 people at a camp for displaced Syrians by the border with Jordan on yesterday, the Syrian Observatory for Human Rights monitor said.

The Britain-based group said the dead included a family of four, with the father, mother and two children killed in the blast on the outskirts of the Rukban camp.

Another four of those killed were fighters from local tribes in eastern Syria that have battled the jihadist Islamic State group.

The monitor said the toll could rise further because a number of the injured were in serious condition.

Iordan's official Petra news agency, citing a military source, also reported the blast at the isolated makeshift camp, which houses around 85,000 Syrians according to the United Nations.

The source said 14 wounded people had been taken to a clinic in the border area for treatment, adding that no

decision had been taken yet on whether they would be transported to Jordanian hospitals.

The source said there were no Jordanian casualties.

Jordan closed its border in June 2016, halting aid deliveries to the camp, after a bombing claimed by the Islamic State jihadist group killed seven Jordanian soldiers.

Officials said at the time that the bomber had come from the camp and declared the border a closed military zone.

The decision prompted shortages at the camp, with group Amnesty International in October decrying "hellish" conditions for those seeking refuge there.

Aid has been delivered to the camp only twice since the border was closed, most recently in November, when the UN supplied food, hygiene kits and winter clothing.

The United Nations says there are more than 600,000 refugees from Svria in Iordan, a figure Amman puts at 1.4 million. (AFP)

will hold a durkev Turkey win referendum this spring on dramatically expanding President Recep Tayyip Erdogan's powers after a parliamentary vote yesterday backed changes that could leave him in power until 2029.

The government insists the proposals to create an

executive presidency will ensure simpler and more effective leadership, but critics fear they will edge Turkey toward one-man rule.

Hours after the bill was approved, Erdogan said the "real (and) final decision" would be made by the people in a referendum, expected to be held in April.

Parliament approved a new 18-article constitution, which includes the presidency changes, in a final vote which saw 339 in favour and 142 against.

Each article was put to a vote in the 550-seat parliament, where the ruling Justice and Development Partv (AKP) enjoys a comfortable majority of 317 including the speaker.

At least 330 votes a threefifths majority were needed to adopt the changes.

Speaking to supporters in Istanbul, Erdogan said he believed they would "move towards the future by working night and day" for the referendum campaign.

The bill would create an executive presidency for the first time in modern Turkey, giving the head of state the power to hire and fire ministers.

It would also abolish the post of prime minister for the first time, with the position to be replaced with a vice president, or perhaps several.

The bill would allow

parliamentary elections and presidential ballots to be held at the same time, with the draft giving November 3, 2019 as the poll date.

Prime Minister Binali Yildirim said the changes would allow for a "sole power that would be strong", meaning a more decisive approach to solving problems.-(AFP)

#### **Egypt working for talks between rival Libya authorities**

Egypt is working to organise direct talks between the leaders of rival Libyan authorities contesting the war-torn country, its foreign minister said yesterday after hosting a regional meeting.

The UN-backed government in Tripoli has struggled to impose its authority contested by a rival administration in the east of the country.

"A political solution is the only way to resolve the crisis



Sameh Shoukry in Libya," Egyptian Foreign Minister Sameh Shoukry said yesterday before going into a

meeting with foreign ministers from Libya's neighbouring countries.

Following the meeting, attended by ministers from Algeria, Tunisia, Libya and Niger, as well as UN envoy Martin Kobler, Shoukry announced plans to hold the direct negotiations.

"We are focusing efforts on bringing Libyan leaders together for a direct dialogue, to build confidence and trust," he said. -(AFP)

### **Bodies of 2 firemen recovered after** Tehran's high-rise building collapse

#### **Tehran**

Rescue teams recovered the bodies of two Iranian firefighters yesterday, two days after they were killed while tackling a blaze in Tehran's oldest high-rise.

They were among around 20 firefighters feared to have been killed when the 15-storey Plasco building collapsed on Thursday after a fourhour blaze while emergency services were still evacuating the tower.



yria's government and rebel Ofighters will on Monday sit down at the negotiating table for the first time in nearly six years of war, the latest diplomatic push to end the hostilities.

Hosted in the Kazakh capital Astana, the talks will see an opposition delegation composed exclusively of rebel groups negotiating with the regime of President Bashar al-Assad in an initiative sponsored by rebel backer Turkey and regime allies Russia and Iran.

Though the talks have been welcomed by all parties in the conflict, delegates from both sides are heading to Kazakhstan with apparently opposing ideas about the goals, with Assad insisting Thursday that rebels lay down their arms in exchange for an amnesty deal.

Although Assad said the talks would prioritise reaching a ceasefire, Damascus has insisted it will seek a political "comprehensive" solution to the conflict that has killed more than 300,000 and displaced over half of the country's population.

The rebels meanwhile say they will focus solely on reinforcing a frail nationwide truce brokered by Moscow and Ankara last month.

#### Who is attending?

Moscow said this week that the objective was to "consolidate' the ceasefire and involve rebel field commanders in the "political process" to end the bloodshed, creating a basis for a new round of UN-hosted negotiations in Geneva next month. Syria's UN ambassador Bashar al-Jaafari,

an experienced negotiator involved in past failed talks in Geneva, will head the regime delegation in Astana.

The United Nations' peace envoy for Syria, Staffan de Mistura, will also attend, alongside representatives of Russia, Turkey and Iran.

Mohammad Alloush of the Jaish al-Islam (Army of Islam) rebel group -- whose commander cousin Zahran Alloush was killed in an air strike claimed by the regime in December 2015 -- will lead a "military delegation" of around eight people.

They will be backed by nine legal and political advisors from the opposition High Negotiations Committee (HNC) umbrella group.

But key rebel group Ahrar al-Sham said it would snub the Astana talks over ceasefire violations and ongoing

Ahigh-profile French jihadist was charged with terrorist offences and remanded in custody yesterday, a day after being transferred to France from Turkey, where he had turned himself in to authorities.

Kevin Guiavarch, a 24-yearold who converted to Islam 10 years ago, was one of the UN's most wanted jihadists and had been placed on a blacklist in

Suspected as being one of the major Islamic State group recruiters attracting young French people to join the jihadist cause in Syria and Iraq, Guiavarch rubbed

shoulders with some of the perpetrators of the November 2015 Paris attacks while living in Raqa, IS's de facto

The former church choirboy, who was raised by a single mother in Brittany, now claims to be "reformed" -- though he has also told French author David Thomson, who wrote a book about returning jihadists, that he left IS because he was afraid of dying.

He spent four years in Syria amongst jihadists, first with former Al-Qaeda affiliate the Fateh al-Sham Front, and then

He quit Syria in June 2016 with his four French wives and six children, and went to Turkey where they were all arrested.

All four wives had already been deported to France.

Guiavarch, who had been the subject of an international arrest warrant, arrived in the French capital on Friday night before on Saturday being charged with association of a criminal terrorist organisation and financing terrorism, the Paris prosecutor

French authorities will now try to determine whether Guiavarch is truly reformed or part of a sleeper cell aiming to carry out attacks in France at a later date. (AFP)

Russia has cut its oil production by some 100,000 barrels a day, Energy Minister Alexander Novak said yesterday ahead of a key meeting in Vienna.

Under a landmark deal in November last year, the OPEC oil cartel agreed to reduce production in order to boost prices.

Non-OPEC countries -notably Russia, but not the United States -- followed suit and agreed in December to make cuts.

Both deals boosted oil prices by around 20 percent to above \$50 per barrel, but gains have been capped by unease about implementation and rising US shale production thanks to the higher prices.

A committee to monitor compliance with the deals is scheduled to meet in Vienna later Saturday.



#### **Trump says US may exit NAFTA** unless it gets "a fair deal"

Washington

President Donald Trump announced yesterday he will demand renegotiation of the free trade agreement linking North America's economies, and will abandon the pact unless the US gets

"a fair deal." The statement on the White House website, posted less than two hours after Trump took the oath of office, said the new administration will seek to change the terms of the 23-yearold North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA) with Canada and Mexico.

Trump condemned NAFTA on the campaign trail, claiming it had contributed to job losses, lost manufacturing and economic decline, and threatened to impose big tariffs on imports from Mexico.

"President Trump committed to renegotiating NAFTA," the White House said.

#### Iceman Oetzi's last meal was 'Stone Age bacon'

Oetzi the famous "iceman" mummy of the Alps appears to have enjoyed a fine slice or two of Stone Age bacon before he was killed by an arrow some 5,300 years ago. Mummified in ice, he was discovered by two German hikers in the Oetztal Alps, 3,210 metres (10,500 feet) above sea level.

#### Dried goat meat

dried goat meat, according to scientists who recently managed to dissect the contents Oetzi's stomach.



The tasty snack is thought to have come from a wild goat in South Tyrol, the northern Italian region where Oetzi roamed around and where his remains were found in September 1991.

"We've analysed the meat's nanostructure and it looks like he ate very fatty, dried meat, most likely bacon,"

German mummy expert Albert Zink said at a talk in Vienna late Wednesday.



#### Violent death

He suffered a violent death, with an arrow severing a major blood vessel between the rib cage and the left shoulder blade. as well as a laceration on the hand. As part of their latest discoveries, Zink's team also found that Oetzi had an ulcerinducing bacteria and may have suffered from stomach aches.

#### Died around 45

Scientists have used hitech, non-invasive diagnostics and genomic sequencing to penetrate his mysterious past. These efforts have determined Oetzi died around the age of 45. was about 1.60 metres (five foot, three inches) tall and weighed 50 kilos (110 pounds)

But for all his parasites, worn ligaments and bad teeth, he was in "pretty good shape", Zink wrote in the renowned US magazine Science earlier this month.



# tech giant of overcharging 'billions of ple lock horns with Qualcomm

#### San Francisco

Apple on Friday sued Qualcomm, accusing accusing the California chipmaker of abusing its market power to demand unfair royalties, echoing charges filed days earlier by US antitrust regulators.

Tech giant Apple said in the court filing that it has been overcharged "billions of dollars" by its chipmaking partner's "illegal scheme."

The company also claimed Qualcomm owes it a billion dollars but is refusing to pay in retaliation for the iPhone maker's cooperating with South Korean antitrust regulators looking into the chipmaker's actions in that country.

"For many years Qualcomm has unfairly insisted charging rovalties technologies they have nothing to do with," Apple said in an email statement.

"To protect this business scheme Qualcomm has taken increasingly radical steps, most recently withholding nearly \$1



Apple CEO, Tim Cook billion in payments from Apple as retaliation for responding truthfully to law enforcement agencies investigating them."

Qualcomm rejected Apple's claims at baseless, contending the iPhone maker "intentionally mischaracterized" agreements as well as the value of the company's technology.

"Apple has been actively encouraging regulatory attacks on Qualcomm's business in various jurisdictions around the world... by misrepresenting facts and withholding information," Oualcomm general counsel Don Rosenberg said in a statement.

"We welcome opportunity to have these meritless claims heard in court."

The suit charges Qualcomm of building a business model on using its rights to older, legacy technology considered telecommunication industry standards to raise royalties when Apple innovates with features such as TouchID fingerprint recognition or digital wallets in mobile devices.

"Despite being just one of over a dozen companies who contributed to basic cellular standards, Qualcomm insists on charging Apple at least five times more in payments than all the other cellular patent licensors we have agreements with combined," Apple said.

Apple relies on Qualcomm for chip-based modems that enable iPhones and iPads to communicate with telecommunication networks.

Here are five key themes from this year's World Economic Forum, which gathers movers and shakers from business, politics, academia and showbiz every year for a week of earnest debate and extravagant partying.

# China: globalisation's new saviour?



China's President Xi Jinping emerged as an unlikely capitalist hero as Davos kicked off Tuesday, with a staunch defence of globalisation that stood in stark contrast to the protectionist Trump.

The first Chinese supremo to address Davos, Xi said there was "no point in blaming economic globalisation for the world's problems" at a time when anger over the downsides of open borders has triggered political revolts in the US, Britain and beyond.

The message won glowing praise from Davos delegates -- though the irony of the communist leader's new

status as a capitalist darling was not lost on observers, and China hands noted that his mantra of openness clashed with his government's repressive actions at home.

China's growing thirst for foreign acquisitions was also on display in Davos. The country's richest man Wang Jianling and internet billionaire Jack Ma both expressed an interest in further investments in Hollywood and elsewhere.

#### **Tackling the populist revolt**

A fter a year in which US and British electorates lashed out at out-of-touch elites, the cream of that elite did plenty of head-scratching over the reasons for the revolt and what can be done about it.

The official theme of this year's meeting was "responsive and responsible leadership", with the growing rural-urban divide in Western countries up for discussion along with how to appease the "squeezed and angry" middle class.

"It's a mistake not to recognise that the middle class in my country and in others is concerned that the government is not fighting for it," said ex-US Treasury secretary Lawrence Summers.

# Getting down to business on Brexit

# Robots are coming for your jobs

Others spent the week laying preparations for the "Fourth Industrial Revolution" -- technological advances such as artificial intelligence that are predicted to change our lives hugely in the decades to come, notably the way we work.

After industrial robots put paid to many manufacturing jobs in the West, experts now predict the loss of millions of white-collar jobs that machines will be able to perform -- and are urging governments to wake up to the challenge.

"There's insidious insertion of automation in a lot of different domains," said Missy Cummings, a robotics expert at Duke University, naming driverless cars as just one technology that will revolutionise our lives.

"The reality is we can't just keep our head in the sand like an ostrich." (AFP)





At least 16 people died when a coach bringing Hungarian teenagers home from a skiing trip crashed and burst into flames on a northern Italian motorway overnight, authorities said yesterday.

Emergency workers said that the bus carrying 56 people returning from France, most of them teenagers aged 14-16, as well as several teachers and two drivers, ploughed into a bridge pillar.

"At the moment, there are 16 confirmed deaths," said Verona traffic police chief Girolamo Lacquaniti.

The accident has deeply shaken Hungary where Prime

Minister Viktor Orban has declared a national day of mourning to be observed on Monday to remember the victims

It appeared the death toll from the tragedy near Verona at around 11:00 pm (2200 GMT) could have been much worse had it not been for the bravery and quick thinking of a teacher.

Those who were seated at the back of the bus saved themselves by smashing the windows amid shouting and panic," Hungary's consul in Italy Judit Timaffy told Italian

"A gym teacher rescued lots of those on board by



getting back on the bus. He was taken to hospital with serious burns on his back,"

Timaffy said.

The Hungarian government said that three

people were in a very serious condition, including one in an artificial coma. Ten more were seriously hurt and 13 had minor injuries.

All were being treated in nearby hospitals. Twelve others who were not hurt were receiving counselling at a hotel in the vicinity.

Describing a "devastating" scene, Lacquaniti told Radio Capitale that 13 passengers had managed to escape by jumping out.

A huge inferno very quickly engulfed the bus, dramatic pictures released by police showed, completely destroying the interior and reducing the vehicle to a

burned-out wreck. Once the blaze was put out emergency workers had to wait for a judge to give approval to comb through the smoking remains, which they then spent the rest of the night doing to establish the complete death toll.

Some passengers were killed when they were hurled from the coach on impact, but most of the victims were found badly charred inside the vehicle after being unable to escape in time.

Traffic police in Italy were still gathering evidence and consulting video evidence so it was "still too early to determine the cause of this tragedy," Lacquaniti said.

# Manama/Chennai

Minister ndian Prime ■Narendra Modi's decision to overturn court ban on a popular bull-wrestling festival was welcomed with cheers yesterday by expatriates here in Bahrain.

The ruling overturned after a gap of two-years follows massive protests in southern India by demonstrators who called the court's ruling an attack on their culture.

The decision by India's Supreme Court also sparked a wave of protests here in Bahrain too, with expatriates coming out in large numbers to express their solidarity and protest.

Hundreds of expatriates including women and children gathered at Asry beach to voice their support for the pro-Jallikattu movement, which in recent days saw thousands of demonstrators gathering in state capital Chennai and other cities, demanding the ban on Jallikattu

The court outlawed the bull-



During a protest in Manama wrestling Jallikattu festival last year after a plea by animal rights groups, which have long accused

participants in the event -- held annually across southern Tamil Nadu state -- of cruelty to the animals. The growing protests prompted Tamil Nadu's chief minister to travel to Delhi earlier this week to ask Modi to overturn the ban, which he did late Friday.

Tamil Nadu's governor then promulgated the executive order Saturday evening, paving the way for Jallikattu to resume on Sunday.

"Tamil Nadu Governor Vidyasagar Rao approves Jallikattu ordinance," the state's ruling AIADMK party posted on Twitter.

Television footage from Chennai showed crowds erupting in joy, waving, giving the thumbs up and flashing peace signs as the news came in.

State Chief Minister O. Panneerselvam is set to kick off the traditional contest today morning.

"Honourable CM Thiru O. Panneerselvam thanks the students, women and the public who staged agitations across the state to protect our culture," the party said on Twitter.

In Jallikattu, young men struggle to grab the bulls by their sharpened horns or jump on their backs as the muscular animals, festooned with marigolds, charge down the road.

Unlike in traditional Spanish bullfighting, the animals are let loose into open fields where young men compete to subdue them bare-handed. (With inputs from agencies)

Italian rescuers pulled four survivors from an avalanche-hit hotel yesterday and said they remained hopeful of finding alive at least some of the 23 people still trapped under the ruins.

The latest rescues lifted the total number of survivors to 11.

But there were 23 people still unaccounted for, according to a first official statement on the number of missing.

Morale among the teams of mountain police and firefighters remained high after Friday's dramatic rescue of all four children who were inside the Hotel Rigopiano, in central Italy, along with the mother of two of them.

But the rescue operation, now in its third day, was increasingly resembling a race against the clock amid fears that anyone still alive could succumb to the cold before being found.

Two men and two women were rescued alive in the early hours of yesterday.

There were no reports of any other signs of life but officials emphasised that was no reason to give up hope.

Enrica Centi, a spokeswoman for the mountain rescuers involved in the operation, said: "There is still hope because although no more voices have been heard, there may be people trapped behind or under a cement wall which would make it impossible to hear them."

#### **Extreme conditions**

Heavy snow and poor visibility that grounded helicopters in the area was hampering the rescue effort.

"The operation continues to be very complicated," said Fabrizio Curcio, head of the civil protection agency. "The rescuers are working in extreme conditions."

Teams of firefighters and police are combing a debrisstrewn area bigger than several football pitches as a result of the devastating force of the avalanche, which pushed the three-storey hotel

some 10 metres (30 feet) from its foundations.

And Friday's rescue showed that even once someone is located, it can take many more hours to complete their extraction amid an ever-present risk of further masonry collapses.

The latest operations bring to 11 the total number people who survived the disaster, including two hotel guests who were outside when the avalanche struck just before nightfall on Wednesday.

Five bodies had been recovered by lunchtime Saturday.

#### Kids in games room

In a first official update on the numbers at the hotel when the avalanche struck, the prefecture in the nearest city, Pescara, said 23 people remained unaccounted for.

Earlier estimates had put the missing figure at between 11 and 20 with the uncertainty caused by doubts over the guest register and whether any casual visitors were in the bar or restaurant.

The first rescuers battled through a snowstorm to reach the hotel early on Thursday and since then, progress has been painfully slow because of the risk of masonry and snow slides.

The children likely survived because they were in or around a games room which was not crushed by the avalanche.

"There were three of us kids playing pool. One of the mums was there but all the other adults were in another room," nine-year-old Edoardo Di Carlo said after his rescue.

The avalanche followed four earthquakes of more than five magnitude in the space of four hours earlier on Wednesday.

The death toll from the quake, not including the victims at the hotel, rose to five on Saturday.

Some 33,000 homes were still powerless and 8,000 troops and emergency services were deployed to help the affected region. - (AFP)



#### Mexican drug lord 'El Chapo' pleads not guilty in US

**New York** 

exican drug lord Joaquin "El Chapo" Guzman, one of the world's most notorious criminals, pleaded not guilty in a US court yesterday to a raft of firearms, drug trafficking and conspiracy charges that could see him jailed for life.

Less than 24 hours after being extradited by Mexico, the 59-year-old drug baron looked tired as he stood in blue prison scrubs flanked by his US public defenders for the brief, 10-minute hearing in a federal court in Brooklyn.

USprosecutorssayGuzman's Sinaloa cartel is responsible for distributing hundreds of thousands of kilos of heroin, cocaine, methamphetamine and marijuana throughout the United States, reaping billions of dollars in profits.

# Seven held over infamous diamond heist

#### The Hague

Seven people have been arrested over the robbery of \$72 million (67 million euros) in jewellery, one the world's biggest ever heists, from Amsterdam's airport nearly 12 years ago, authorities said yesterday.

The diamonds and jewellery were taken during the hold up of a KLM armoured car in a high-security portion of Schiphol airport in February 2005, police said in a statement.

Though the thieves were armed, no one was hurt in the heist.

Police "carried out, on Friday January 20 and Saturday January 21, 2017, a total of seven arrests in connection with the diamond theft at Schiphol airport in February 2005 and money laundering," the statement said.

The five male and two

female suspects, all Dutch nationals, were arrested in Amsterdam and Valencia, in eastern Spain.

While some of the stolen diamonds were found in an escape vehicle immediately after the heist, the rest --valued at \$43 million remain unaccounted for.

Four people had been arrested soon after the incident, one of the Netherlands' worst cases of theft.


