Jennifer Aniston thinks “comedy is a necessity” in life. The 56-year-old actress has cited the Horrible Bosses film franchise as the project that she would most like to revisit in her career. The Hollywood star - who plays Dr. Julia Harris in the Horrible Bosses movies - told People: “Horrible Bosses. Jason

Bateman and I were talking about that, and Charlie Day has been talking about it a lot too. So that’s something that we think would be super fun. “The characters are hilarious, and we need comedy. I personally think comedy is a necessity. “That’s one that we would have a really fun time, I think, going back to, seeing where those crazy cats are today.” Jennifer has enjoyed huge success in her career, including starring in Friends, one of the most popular sitcoms of all

time. But the actress has one career goal that she still hopes to achieve. Jennifer - who is best known for playing Rachel Green in Friends - shared: “I definitely want to do a Broadway play. That’s on my bucket list, but it’s finding the time and finding the right piece, the right material. “But I absolutely have to do a play on Broadway.” Jennifer is one of the biggest names in Hollywood, but she previously confessed to being terrible at auditions.

The actress admitted that she struggles to find immediate chemistry with a stranger. The 32-year-old rap star is set to release her long-awaited new album, Am I the Drama?, later this year, and Cardi has revealed the inspiration behind her album title. Asked if the album name was a reference to Scarlet Envy’s quote from RuPaul’s Drag Race, Cardi told People: “It’s just actually a mood that I feel because I feel like I’m always in some drama, and I don’t understand why I’m always in some drama.

“It’s like, ‘Damn, am I the drama? Is it me? Like, what? Why am I always in something? But I do know she said it on Drag Race and it’s like, ‘Well, great minds think alike.’ “She said it before me, and I’m gonna give her, always, the props. the end?” Cardi released her debut album, Invasion of Privacy, in April 2018, and the chart-topping star thinks she’s “evolved” a lot since then. Cardi - who split from her husband Offset in 2023 - said: “I dealt with a lot for seven years. It has been a journey, and I have evolved as a person and as an artist, and I cannot wait for you guys to hear that.”

Cardi is one of the best-selling artists in the world, but she previously claimed to have been happier before she found fame. The Bodak Yellow hitmaker doesn’t have any money worries these days, but she’s less happy than she used to be.

Cardi - who has Culture, six, Wave, three, and a daughter, whose name has not been revealed, born in September - told CR Fashion Book magazine: “One positive thing is that, my family, whatever they want, they get. Everything that I want to buy, I can get. I don’t have to worry so much about my future.

Scarlett Johansson wary of AI ‘threat’

Scarlett Johansson doesn’t think AI can replicate the “soulfulness” of an actor or actress.

The 40-year-old movie star believes AI has a role to play in the long-term future of the film industry, but Scarlett doesn’t think the technology can replace the emotional core of an actor or actress’ performance.

She told The Sunday Times newspaper: “I just don’t believe the work I do can be done by AI. I don’t believe the soulfulness of a performance can be replicated.”

Despite this, Scarlett believes AI poses a threat to society more broadly.

The Hollywood star explained: “The bigger picture - about how we human beings, with fragile egos, can continue to have the trust that we have to have in one another, to continue as a society. It’s a moral compass.

“We move around the world every day just knowing we have to trust in some basic reality that we all agree on. AI threatens the foundation of that, and that to me is very haunting.”

Scarlett began working in the film industry as a child, and she recently acknowledged that child stardom can be a “dangerous thing”.

The actress - who made her film debut in North, the 1994 fantasy-comedy movie - thinks she was “very fortunate” to come through child stardom unscathed.

Speaking to Vanity Fair magazine, Scarlett explained: “Making decisions on your own - like, adult decisions as a kid - it’s a dangerous thing, right?”

The Hollywood actress has seen other child stars struggle to cope with the pressures of fame and success.

But Scarlett is thankful that she “dodged a lot of it”.

She said: “I lived through that and also was very fortunate that I dodged a lot of it.”

Scarlett starred alongside Bill Murray in Lost in Translation, the 2003 comedy-drama movie, and she now views the film as a turning point in her career.

She explained: “After Lost in Translation, every role that I was offered for years was ‘the girlfriend,’ ‘the other woman,’ a sex object - I couldn’t get out of the cycle.

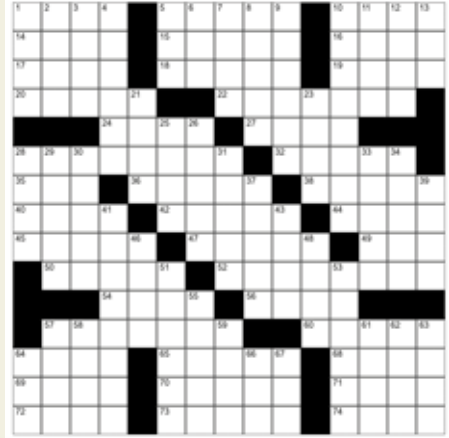
