Israel to terminate MSF work in Gaza for failing to provide Palestinian staff list

MSF said it had tried for months to engage with Israel

Israel announced yesterday it was terminating Doctors Without Borders' humanitarian operations in Gaza after the charity failed to provide a list of Palestinian staff, a move MSF said was a "pretext" to obstruct aid to the war-devastated territory.

In December, Israel announced it would prevent 37 aid organisations, including MSF, from working in Gaza from March 1 for failing to submit detailed information about their Palestinian employees, drawing widespread condemnation from NGOs and the United Nations.

"The Ministry of Diaspora Affairs and Combating Antisemitism is moving to terminate the activities of Medecins Sans Frontieres (MSF) in the Gaza Strip," the ministry said on Sunday.

The decision follows "MSF's failure to submit lists of local employees, a requirement applicable to all humanitarian organisations operating in the region", it added.

The ministry had earlier alleged that two MSF employees had links with Hamas and Islamic Jihad, which the charity has vehemently denied.

On Sunday, the ministry said MSF had committed in early January to sharing the staff list, but ultimately refrained.

"Subsequently, MSF announced it does not intend to proceed with the registration process at all, contradicting its previous statements and the binding protocol," the ministry added, saying "MSF will cease its operations and depart the Gaza Strip by February 28".

Israel says partially reopening Gaza's Rafah crossing

Rafah, Palestinian Territories

Israel partially reopened the Rafah crossing between the devastated Gaza Strip and Egypt yesterday, following months of appeals from aid groups, though access is limited to pedestrians.

COGAT, the Israeli defence ministry body coordinating Palestinian civilian affairs, made no mention of allowing in a long hoped-for surge of aid, and clarified that the passage of individuals through

the gateway in both directions was expected to begin Monday. Rafah is considered a key entry point for supplies into the devastated Palestinian territory, where humanitarian conditions remain dire after two years of war in spite of a ceasefire in place since October 10.

The crossing has been closed since Israeli forces seized control of it in May 2024 during the war with Hamas, aside from a brief and limited reopening in early 2025.

MSF said it had tried for months to engage with Israeli authorities over the issue, but its attempts were unsuccessful.

MSF charged that the ministry's move was a "pretext to obstruct humanitarian assistance" to Gaza.

"Israeli authorities are forcing humanitarian organisations into an impossible choice between exposing staff to risk or interrupting critical medical care for people in desperate need," it said in a statement issued on Sunday.

"MSF did not hand over staff names because Israeli authorities failed to provide the concrete assurances required to guarantee our staff's safety, protect their personal data, and uphold the independence of our medical operation," it said.

Such demands by Israel will force aid organisations to pull out when "needs are overwhelming and health services are collapsing" in Gaza, it said. "At a moment when more

humanitarian assistance is urgently needed, it is being restricted rather than facilitated," the charity said, adding that it remained open for dialogue with Israeli authorities to maintain its services in Gaza and the occupied West Bank.



MSF has long been a key provider of medical and humanitarian aid in Gaza, particularly since the war broke out in October 2023 after Hamas's attack on Israel. The charity says it currently provides at least 20 percent of hospital beds in the territory and operates around 20 health centres.

Indian Budget 2026 aims to promote prosperity at home and abroad

In the backdrop of estimated GDP growth of 7.4 percent (with nominal GDP growth at 8 per cent) for FY 2025-26, the Finance Minister of India, Ms. Nirmala Sitharaman presented the Union budget for 2026 on 1 February in New Delhi. Describing the Budget 2026 as historic, Indian Prime Minister, Shri Narendra Modi asserted that it reflects the aspirations of the 140 crore (1.4 billion) Indians, strengthens the economic reforms journey and charts a clear road map for Viksit Bharat or Developed India by 2047.

Strong macroeconomic fundamentals

The budget shows that the macroeconomic fundamentals of the Indian economy are strong. The country's GDP has passed USD 4.13 trillion. IMF states that while India accounts for 17 per cent of projected world-wide economic growth expansion, the USA sits at less than 10 percent. The fiscal deficit for 2027 is estimated at 4.3 percent of India's GDP while the debt-to-GDP ratio is expected to be 55.6 percent of GDP in 2026-27, slightly lower than 56.1 percent in 2025-26.

The services sector remains the primary growth driver, expanding by 9.1 per cent. Manufacturing and construction have grown by 7 per cent. Domestic demand continues to anchor growth. India's total exports (merchandise and services) reached USD 825.3 billion in FY25, with continued momentum in FY26.

Forward looking and reform oriented

Some of the significant initiatives of the Budget 2026 include the plans to develop seven High-Speed Rail corridors between cities as 'growth connectors' to promote environmentally sustainable passenger systems, significant outlay for Carbon Capture Utilization and Storage technologies, establishing dedicated Rare Earth Corridors, launching the Bharat-VISTAAR (a multilingual AI tool to improve agriculture sector), various tax related measures to attract global investment and improve ease of doing business and the like. It is pertinent to mention that since August 2025, almost 350 new economic reform measures have been unveiled including GST simplification, notification of Labour Codes, and rationalization of mandatory Quality Control Orders. More efforts are expected focusing on deregulation and reducing compliance requirements.

The budget has been inspired by three 'kartavyas' or duties of the Government of India, namely, (a) accelerating and sustaining economic growth, by enhancing productivity and competitiveness, and building resilience to volatile global dynamics, (b) fulfilling the aspirations of people and building their capacity, making them strong partners in India's path to prosperity, and (c) ensuring that every family, community, region and sector has access to resources, amenities and opportunities for meaningful participation. Also significantly, the budget is also focused on the youth.

International cooperation

India's Union Budget comes in the wake of a series of important developments in India's external engagement like the India-EU FTA, India-Arab League cooperation, India-GCC engagement besides the active bilateral commercial and trade links between India and countries around the world, in particular in the GCC area. The clear and unmistakable message is the commitment of India to multilateral cooperation and pursuing close ties with all economic partners around the world. This augurs well for India-Bahrain bilateral relations, especially as we celebrate the 55th anniversary of establishment of diplomatic relations. Equally significant is the Kingdom of Bahrain's presidency of the GCC and its participation in the UN Security Council for the two year term that started in January 2026. India strongly supports Bahrain's role and looks forward to working together for taking the bilateral relations forward.
