

Lawyer on trial over paternity row case leak

Alawyer has been sent to court after publishing material about a paternity dispute she was handling, according to the Cybercrime Prosecution.

The Public Prosecution acted on a report from the Cybercrime Directorate at the Ministry of Interior, which stated that local online newspapers and social media pages had circulated details tied to an ongoing legal case.

Investigators traced the source of the information to a lawyer representing one of the parties.

She was brought in for questioning and shown the articles in which the disputed content appeared.

The Prosecution released her afterwards but referred her to trial on a charge of disclosing information linked to a paternity suit in breach of the law.

Two Africans die in bus and truck collision in Hafira

m wo}$ African nationals, aged 33 and 37, were killed in a collision between a bus and a truck in the Hafira area, the Ministry of Interior announced yesterday morning.

The ministry confirmed the fatalities through its official account on the social media platform X, stating that the incident occurred earlier in the day and that relevant authorities were on-site conducting necessary procedures.

Further details about the cause of the accident and the number of people involved have not yet been released. An investigation is underway.

Ban the puff

MP calls for urgent action as teen e-shisha and vaping reach alarming levels

Concerns grow over addiction and public health dangers

arliament is preparing a debate on banning vapes amid rising alarm about their spread among teenagers, according to MP Jalal Kadhem.

Kadhem said the draft law, due to come up soon in Parliament, targets electronic shisha and vapes because they pose a clear health risk, especially to children and adolescents.

The plan draws heavily on similar restrictions already enforced across the Arabian Gulf, as well as in Canada, India and Singapore.

Spike

Teen vaping has spiked dramatically in Bahrain and across the Arab world, Kadhem said.

Attractive sweet flavours, easy availability and slick social media adverts promoting vaping as safer than ordinary cigarettes have all fuelled its rapid spread.

Medical research quoted by Kadhem indicates vaping liquids contain chemicals harmful to lungs and immune systems,
