Bahrain tops Asia in historic Para Taekwondo triumph

For the first time in its history, Bahrain has topped the overall standings at the Asian Para-Taekwondo (Poomsae) Championship, held recently in Kuching, Malaysia. The historic achievement came after the Bahraini team secured nine medals—five gold, three silver, and one bronze—placing them ahead of the seven other participating nations.

The team also claimed first place in the women's category with a haul of three gold, two silver, and one bronze medal, and took second place in the men's category with two gold



and one silver medal. The gold medalists included Rouba Al-Amri (wheelchair), Rawana Al-Saad and Nasser Hu-beil (Down syndrome), Nas-sar Al-Muraissi (wheelchair),

and Zeina Al-Balushi (short stature).

In recognition of their stellar performance, coach Fajr Al-Banali was awarded the Best Female Coach in Asia, while Rawana Al-Saad received the Best Female Player award. Rouba Al-Amri also achieved the highest score of the tournament, underscoring the team's exceptional technical and competitive prowess.

Coach Fajr Al-Banali stated that the success was a testament to the development of para-taekwondo in the kingdom, and the support given to athletes of determination by the leadership.

Second seed Fritz ends Canadian hopes at ATP Toronto Masters

Fritz topples Diallo as Shelton, Rublev, and Tiafoe win dramatic battles to enter ATP Toronto last 16

- Fritz beats Diallo 6-4, 6-2
- Shelton overcomes Nakashima in late-night thriller

Taylor Fritz ended Canadian hopes at the ATP Toronto Masters on Friday as he crushed Gabriel Diallo 6-4, 6-2 to advance to the fourth round.

The American second seed needed just 77 minutes to dispatch the the 37th-ranked local and book a meeting with Jiri Lehecka, a 3-6, 6-3, 6-4 winner over France's Arthur Fils.

Fritz is aiming to at least reach the quarterfinals north of the border, the only Masters where he has not gone that far.

He broke once in the opening set against a nervous opponent and dominated from there.

"It was important not to let him get into the match and get the crowd fired up," Fritz said. "I knew the momentum could shift at any time.

"I'm super happy with it,

considering how I felt on the court two nights ago in my first match," Fritz added.

"I felt way more comfortable, confident, just hitting the ball, being aggressive, just striking it. I did well to be up an early break in the sets. I did well to just hold.

"Played really solid from the baseline as well. I backed it up well from the ground, and just did a good job of not letting him back in the sets."

Brandon Nakashima won his first set against American Ben Shelton before the fourth-seed-

ed Shelton rallied to finish off a 6-7 (8/10), 6-2, 7-6 (7/5) win.

Shelton had trailed by a break in the deciding set and Nakashima saved four match points before Shelton sealed the victory with his 19th ace.

Shelton finished with 46 winners to improve to 5-0 against Nakashima and will fight for a quarterfinal berth against Flavio Cobolli, who downed Fabian Marozsan 6-2, 4-6, 6-3.

"I've got to find my fire from somewhere," Shelton said of the late-night crowd support in

Canada. "I live off of that.

"Night matches are never easy, the temperature cools down and conditions are different. I showed a lot of perseverance. it's difficult being down against a big server. To come from behind takes a bit of luck."

The seeded pair of Andrey Rublev and Frances Tiafoe were tested over three sets before also making their way into the fourth round.

Sixth seed Rublev, runner-up in Canada a year ago to Alexei Popyrin, advanced 5-7, 6-4, 6-3

as Lorenzo Sonogo double-faulted on match point in their contest.

Tiafoe, the No 7, confessed to a bad day but earned his win the hard way as he beat Australian Aleksandar Vukic 6-3, 4-6, 6-3.

"The ball was flying a lot, it was really ugly, but I'm happy to get through it," Tiafoe said. "It doesn't matter how you win. You just have to compete."

Tiafoe next lines up against another Aussie in Alex de Minaur, who advanced when compatriot Christopher O'Connell pulled out with an injury.

Rublev now goes against Alejandro Davidovich Fokina, who beat him this season on clay in Barcelona. The Spaniard beat Jakob Mensik 6-2, 6-4.

Ledecky reigns over McIntosh as record-breaking US hit back at critics

Katie Ledecky beat Summer McIntosh to win a classic 800m freestyle final at the world championships yesterday as the record-breaking United States hit back at their critics.

On a Super Saturday for the embattled Americans, who have been struggling with illness in Singapore, Ledecky won her seventh career world gold in the event she has made her own.

But the legendary American was pushed to the limit, touching the wall in a championship-record 8min 05.62sec, ahead of Australia's Lani Pallister (8:05.98) and McIntosh

(8:07.29).

It was Canadian sensation McIntosh's first defeat of the championships and ended her bid to match Michael Phelps as the only swimmer ever to win five individual golds at a single world championships.

The 18-year-old has already won three golds this week in Singapore and will go for number four in the 400m medley on Sunday.

"The feeling right now is something I never want to feel again," a forlorn McIntosh said.

Ledecky, 28, had too much staying power for her younger rival, with Pallister also right in the mix until the final lunge for

the line.

"They pushed me all the way," said Ledecky, a four-time Olympic champion in the event.

"I'm just really happy I could put that together. I just kept telling myself to trust my legs."

The United States team, under the cosh after criticism from Olympic greats Phelps and Ryan Lochte, won three golds on the penultimate day of competition.

They lead the medals table from Australia with eight golds following victories yesterday for Ledecky, Gretchen Walsh and their mixed 4x100m free-style relay team -- the latter in a world-record time.
