Anyone who travels around Bahrain lately would have noticed a sharp increase in two-wheelers whether it's delivery bikes, electric scooters, or cycles weaving through traffic. Urgent Call for Action on Manama's Parking Crisis

The predictable consequence is a surge in traffic fines, penalizing citizens and residents for a systemic failure. I urge the relevant authorities to urgently investigate and rectify the management and operation of parking valets and public parking solutions. Drivers need reliable, accessible, and affordable options to avoid being unjustly fined.
