

# Three MPs Face Ouster Vote

Committee Backs Removal Move

Three MPs moved closer to losing their seats on Monday after Parliament's Legislative and Legal Affairs Committee recommended approving a request to remove Abdulnabi Salman, Mahdi Al Shuwaikh and Mamdouh Al Saleh.

The request has been signed by 37 of Parliament's 40 members, meaning every MP apart from the three named in it has supported the move. Speaker Ahmed Al Musallam is among those who signed.

Sources told The Daily Tribune that the three MPs attended Monday's meeting of the Legislative and Legal Affairs Committee, where they were heard before the committee drafted its final report and sent it to Parliament.

According to the explanatory note attached to the request, the signatories said the three MPs took a position that ran counter to the parliamentary oath and national duty by criticising state action against people accused of praising Iranian attacks on Bahrain.

The note said that action included stripping citizenship from those involved, as well as

from others whose nationality was withdrawn as dependants. It argued that the MPs' remarks cast doubt on the fairness of the state's steps and formed part of their grounds for rejecting the decree-law.

The signatories said the position amounted, in their view, to a breach of national unity, cost the three MPs trust and standing, and breached the duties of

membership and the honour of representing citizens.

Those named in the request are First Deputy Speaker Abdulnabi Salman, Services Committee Chairman Mamdouh Al Saleh and Dr Mahdi Al Shuwaikh.

The committee's report is expected to go to Parliament's Bureau before being placed on the agenda for today's sitting,

when MPs are expected to decide the matter. Parliamentary sources said a meeting held earlier on Monday, attended by MPs other than the three named in the request, ended with agreement to move ahead with the removal bid. The committee is also expected to examine the choice of a new First Deputy Speaker in the event that Abdulnabi Salman's seat is declared vacant.

# Hammer Attack Conviction Upheld

A 43-year-old African national will serve a 10-year prison sentence followed by permanent deportation after the Court of Cassation upheld his conviction for attempting to kill an African woman inside her home, following a dispute between them.

According to court findings, the man attacked the victim inside her residence using a hammer, striking her multiple times and causing serious injuries. The assault reportedly continued until he believed she had died.

The attack was interrupted when a passerby intervened, allowing the injured woman to escape. A witness later testified that after being called for help, he arrived at the scene,

saw the victim bleeding as she left the apartment, and spotted the accused inside with blood-stained clothing before the accused fled.

Prosecutors charged the defendant with attempted premeditated murder, arguing the crime was not completed due to circumstances beyond his control, namely the victim's escape. The court also noted that the victim suffered a permanent disability estimated at five percent.

The accused denied the charges during investigations, claiming the incident stemmed from a minor dispute. However, the victim maintained that he had attacked her with intent to kill her inside her home.

The ruling confirms the 10-year prison term, after which the defendant will be deported from the country permanently.

# Emergency Lane Stop Ends in Tragedy

Road Safety Urged After Fatal Crash

A 22-year-old university student died in a road accident on Shaikh Khalifa bin Salman Highway near Hidd City, heading toward Manama. His vehicle collided with another while it was stopped in the emergency lane due to a breakdown.

According to authorities, Ali Ibrahim Bujasam, a media student at Gulf University, was waiting for a tow truck when the incident occurred. A companion traveling with him was also injured.

Eyewitnesses said the crash happened suddenly, leaving no time to avoid impact.

A lasting impression

Those who knew Ali remembered him as a driven and hard-working young man who bal-

anced studies and work from an early age. In a previous video, he spoke about his routine, saying he had been studying and working since the age of 15 or 16, describing life as “a constant race against time.”

He later established his own business, Royal Car Care, a fully equipped car wash built independently, reflecting his entrepreneurial drive and determination.

At Gulf University, a professor described him as a bright and disciplined student who showed strong motivation and creativity, particularly in practical assignments. She highlighted a short film he produced about himself, noting that his work was “made with passion.”

## BD10,000 Copper Stolen



The Ministry of Interior said its Criminal Investigation Directorate arrested three Asian men, aged 35 to 46, in connection with the theft of copper cables from a private company in Ras Zuwayed.

Authorities said they detained the suspects after investigating the case, which involved stealing around two tonnes of copper wires valued at approximately BD10,000.

Police recovered and seized the stolen materials.

## Minors Jailed Over Vandalism

Prosecutors said Monday that a juvenile court sentenced three minors to three years in detention each for their involvement in violence and vandalism incidents, citing a lack of parental supervision as a contributing factor.

The High Juvenile Reform Court also ordered authorities to submit a follow-up report within six months to assess the youths' behaviour and progress in rehabilitation, the Family and Child Prosecution said.

The cases relate to incidents in March in which the juveniles were caught taking part in acts of disorder and property damage. They were arrested at the scene by police in the capital and later referred to prosecutors.

Authorities said the minors were questioned with full legal safeguards in place and held in custody during the investigation, which relied on testimonial and forensic evidence before the case was sent to court.

Social assessments presented to the court pointed to inadequate parental oversight and guidance in the defendants' upbringing, which judges took into account in issuing the sentences.

Prosecutors said the rulings underscore efforts to uphold public safety while pursuing rehabilitation to prevent repeat offences, stressing the importance of family responsibility in supervising minors.

# Parliament speaker warns over regional security threats

Speaker of the Parliament, Ahmed bin Salman Al Musallam, reaffirmed the kingdom's commitment to strengthening cooperation with

the European Union, particularly in trade, investment and broader strategic partnerships.

He made the remarks during a meeting on Sunday with a European Parliament delegation led by MEP Reinhold Lopatka,

highlighting Bahrain's leadership under HM King Hamad bin Isa Al Khalifa and the support of HRH Crown Prince and Prime Minister Salman bin Hamad Al Khalifa in advancing international engagement.

Al Musallam welcomed the European Union's solidarity with Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) states amid regional tensions and he reiterated Bahrain's position that dialogue and diplomacy remain essential for

achieving long-term regional stability

The Speaker also referred to the impact of Iranian attacks on civilian and strategic sites, which he said caused casualties and material damage.
