Earlier, the Supreme Committee opened the application process, allowing campaigns to specify the number of pilgrims they intend to accommodate.

stronomy enthusiasts in Astronomy chemical Bahrain are in for a spectacular treat, as multiple celestial phenomena are set to illuminate the night skies from the evening of Monday, August 11, until just before sunrise on Tuesday, August 12, 2025.

The phenomena will be visible for 10 hours and 52 minutes, provided weather conditions allow for clear skies.

Bahraini astronomer Ali Al-Hajri revealed that the rare astronomical sequence includes sightings of Mars, Saturn, the

Starting around 9:30 p.m., the two celestial bodies will be separated by approximately 10 degrees, drawing closer throughout the night.

By sunrise on Tuesday, the Moon will be just 7 degrees and 27 minutes from Saturn.

The Moon will be in a waning gibbous phase, 92.5% illuminated, and about 370,000 kilometers from Earth — its light reaching the planet in just over one second.

Saturn, meanwhile, will be almost fully illuminated (99.9%) and located at a distance of 1.3 billion kilometers, with its light The planet will be 325 million taking over one hour and 13 min-
