

# GCC man in the dock for bid to murder son-in-law

Defendant charged with attempted premeditated murder

● **The accused has pleaded not guilty in the case.**

● **The victim was rushed to the hospital, where he underwent surgeries.**

A GCC national attempted to murder his son-in-law and attacked his wife, the High

Criminal Court heard.

The defendant reportedly took the victim by surprise and he stabbed him several times before assaulting his wife.

He attributed his actions to receiving a call from someone who revealed to him that his wife was dating another man.

However, investigations revealed that the man didn't receive any phone call.

And it was found that he had issues with his wife, as a result of which he carried out the attack, according to Prosecutors.

ACCUSED'S WIFE

A medical report attached to the court files revealed that the defendant stabbed his son-in-law's neck and cut his ear, which was later surgically sewed.

“There are so many problems

between us and several ongoing cases filed against each other,” the wife began in her statement before the Public Prosecution.

“At that night, I was sitting with my child in my apartment. And suddenly he broke in and attacked us,” she added.

The GCC man denied murder attempt, alleging that his second son-in-law was the one who called him and revealed to him that his mother was cheating on him.

“He told me that whenever the man comes he would call me and open the door for me. He did and

when I arrived he came to me and gave me a knife.

“I entered the bedroom and saw a man laying on the bed and he was fully covered with a blanket. I directly stabbed him and I was shocked to find that this was my son-in-law,” the man claimed.

Such claims were later dismissed after it was discovered that the man didn't receive any phone call before heading to the apartment.

The defendant was charged with attempted premeditated murder.

The body was found near a cemetery in Shahrakan.

Forensic were called to examine the body and declared that the initial pieces of evidence confirm that there was a crime behind it.

## Bahrain attends key Montreal Protocol meeting

Chief Executive Officer of the Supreme Council for Environment (SCE), Dr Mohammed Mubarak bin Daina, led the Kingdom's delegation to the High-Level Ministerial Segment of the 31st Meeting of the Parties to the Montreal Protocol on Substances that Deplete the Ozone Layer, held in Rome, Italy.

In his statement, Dr Bin Daina lauded the good stances of the Parties to the Montreal Protocol, especially those of the West Asia and the Pacific region for their endorsement of the Kingdom's membership in the Executive Committee, which, he

said, reflects the honourable role played by the Bahraini negotiators over the past years in defending the common issues of the West Asian and Pacific countries on their behalf.

Dr Bin Daina pointed out that the Parties to the Montreal Protocol had discussed the main issues related to the policies that should be adopted to protect the Ozone Layer, noting that the agenda focused on the unexpected emissions of CFC-11, and ways to address them, especially after all countries have stopped producing or trading them since 2010.

The meeting also discussed the study on the 2021-2023 re-

plenishment of the Multilateral Fund for the Implementation of the Montreal Protocol in, which

is expected to adopt a budget of at least half a billion US dollars. Attending the event, Pope



**Montreal Protocol is the only multi-national agreement signed by all members of the United Nations.**

Francis praised the Protocol as a “model of international co-operation, not only in the area of environmental protection, but

also that of the promotion of integral human development”.

The Montreal Protocol is an addendum to the Vienna Convention for the Protection of the Ozone Layer, which provides a framework for international reductions in the productions of certain chemicals that contribute to the destruction of the so-called “ozone layer” in the earth's atmosphere.

As Pope Francis noted, this became “the first Convention of the United Nations system to gain universal endorsement on the part of the entire family of nations”.

One hundred ninety-six states, as well as the European Union, have signed the agreement.
