Life sentence upheld for drug smuggler

Large-scale sea trafficking case

The First High Criminal Court has rejected the appeal of a defendant sentenced to life imprisonment in connection with a large-scale drug trafficking operation conducted via Bahrain's territorial waters.

The original verdict sentenced four defendants including the appellant — to life in prison and fined each BD5,000, while two others received 10-year prison terms and the same fine.

A female Arab defendant was sentenced to one year in jail and fined BD1,000 for drug use, in addition to being deported after serving her sentence.

The court also ordered the confiscation of the seized narcotics.

Case details

According to case details, the Directorate of Anti-Narcotics at the General Directorate of Criminal Investigation and Forensic Science received intelligence on an international network smuggling drugs into Bahrain by sea from a neighboring country.

Investigations revealed that the first and second defendants were responsible for receiving consignments of hashish (cannabis) offshore and transporting them into Bahrain, where they sold them to the third defendant, who then handed the proceeds to the sixth defendant.

The latter used a grill restaurant's commercial license he owned as a cover to transfer the illicit funds to the network's leader abroad.

MPs approve bill requiring prior Education Ministry approval for tuition hikes in private schools

uition rises will need prior approval under a private-education bill approved unanimously by Parliament yesterday.

The bill now moves to the Shura Council and carries penalties of up to BD100,000 and a year in jail.

The text will take effect only after passage by both chambers, Royal assent and publication in the Official Gazette.

Existing providers will then have one year to bring their status into line.

Running to seven chapters and 36 articles, the bill introduces a three-year, renewable licence, bars enrolment until health, safety and teaching standards are met, and requires audited accounts.

Court to rule on false-news case

Maximum penalty pushed

Judgment set for 27 No-vember as the court keeps a woman in custody in a false-news case after prosecutors sought the maximum penalty.

Prosecutors told the Minor Criminal Court that the defendant posted videos attacking a ministry "from the realm of her imagination", claiming to warn female students about certain senior staff while also sharing indecent sketches and chatting in ways offensive to public morals.

They said the clips spread confusion and carried false information.

The Head of the Cybercrimes Prosecution presented electronic material with timestamps said to match the broadcasts.

She argued the posts were deliberate and repeated, intended to shake public confidence.

"Does Bahrain, a land of tolerance, deserve to have charges of corruption falsely attributed to it?" she asked.

She said the Public Prosecution stands "to safeguard public order, protect social peace, and preserve the reputation of institutions and individuals from malicious tampering and false news", adding: "When freedom is cut loose from responsibility, it becomes chaos."

For the defence, lawyer Shaikh Rashid bin Ahmed Al Khalifa asked for acquit-

The court allowed the defendant to speak and she also sought to be cleared of all charges. The panel kept her in custody and ordered the defendant to remain in custody until the hearing on 27 November 2025.

(Alba) (Ticker Code: ALBH), the world's largest aluminium smelter on one site, has reported a Profit of BD67.3 million (US\$179 million) for the third quarter of 2025, up by 23% Year-over-Year (YoY), versus a Profit of BD54.5 million (US\$145 million) for the same period in 2024. The Company reported Basic and Diluted Earnings per Share of fils 48 for Q3 2025 versus Basic and Diluted Earnings per Share of fils 39 for the same period in 2024. The Total Comprehensive Income for Q3 2025 stood at BD67.5 million (US\$179.4 million) versus Total Comprehensive Income for the third quarter of 2024 of BD51 million (US\$135.6 million) – up by 32% YoY. Gross Profit for Q3 2025 was BD98 million (US\$260.8 million) versus BD80.5 million (US\$214 million) for the same period in 2024 – up by 22% YoY. The Season of Spice

Finding Warmth and Comfort in Every Spoonful

s the weather begins to cool and evenings Lturn crisp in Bahrain, our cravings naturally shift toward the comforting and the familiar. The gentle steam rising from a bowl of soup or stew, the scent of something simmering on the stove- these small rituals signal warmth, safety, and home. Think about that cup of karak chai that you keep craving. It is laden with warm spices like cardamom and ginger. Ravioli with Fig Sauce

omemade ravioli is a seasonal delight. Cool weather is the best time to enjoy warm ravioli. This ravioli recipe has it all- the creamy ricotta cheese, sweet figs, toasty pine nuts and comforting spices and herbs. Include it on your menu during this season.

Ingredients:

For the filling:

- 150 gms ricotta cheese drain any excess liquid
- 50 gms Parmesan cheese freshly grated
- 150 gms spinachboiled for 2 minutes and drained well (should be 150g after cooking and draining)
- ½ tsp salt; ¼ tsp nutmeg

For the pasta dough:

- 300 g 00 Flour
- 3 large eggs
- 1 large egg yolk 1.5 tsp Olive oil
- Semolina flour, for dusting

For the sauce:

- 2 tbsp butter grass-fed
- 1tbsp olive oil
- 2 fresh figs sliced
- ½ cup fresh basil cut into ribbons
- 1tbsp dry oregano
- 1/4 tsp freshly ground nutmeg; 1/2 tsp freshly ground black pepper; 1/2 tsp salt
- 4 tbsp pine nuts
- 2 clove garlic, minced

Instructions: Prepare the pasta dough:

Add the flour, eggs and olive oil to a food processor fitted with the metal blade. Process to form dough, about 15-20 seconds. Remove to your work surface and cover with an upturned bowl for 5 minutes. Knead the dough into a ball for 1-2 minutes. Cover again, and let rest for 30 minutes to 1 hour then proceed with making raviolis.

Ravioli filling:

- Mix the ricotta cheese, parmesan, spinach, salt, nutmeg very well until smooth. Put it in a piping bag and set in the fridge.
- Heavily flour the ravioli mold, lay one sheet of pasta in the mould. Press it very gently with your hands so you see where are the pockets where you need to put your filling.
- Pipe each pocket with approx. 1 tbsp of the filling. Lay the second sheet on top and run the rolling pin over to seal all the edges very

well. Turn the mould over and snap it on the counter to release the ravioli easily. Lay the ravioli in a baking sheet or tray covered with a damp towel until you finish all the ravioli filling and dough. You can freeze some if the ravioli for later and continue with the desired quantity with the recipe.

For the sauce:

- In a skillet on medium-low heat, add the butter, basil, oregano, salt, nutmeg, black pepper, minced garlic and pine nuts. Stir gently until the nutmeg and basil are toasted and golden. Add the fig slices and sauté on each side gently for 30 sec so they do not break down completely.
- Meanwhile, bring a large pot of salted water to boil. Boil the ravioli for 1-2 minutes or until they float. Remove the ravioli from water; gently mix into the butter sauce. Top with some parmesan and serve.

The harmonious combination of textures and flavours defines each plate. I was invited to

taste the special four-hands, three-day autumn menu featuring ingredients that complement the season.

An amuse-bouche of roasted beetroot and salmon gravlax with passion fruit sauce and salmon caviar was served alongside freshly baked bread with Chantilly cream and basil pesto. This was followed by two crisp and delicate tart shells—one filled with creamy homemade ricotta with a light scent of lime zest, and the other filled with smoked salmon, caviar, and cucumber.

I was intrigued to see ravioli on the special menu, given its Italian origins, but Chef Alexis explained that the French have their own version, called Raviole. To elevate the dish, he gently spooned velvety brown butter foam over the ravioli, imparting a delicate, nutty note

The tenderloin was cooked to perfection, while the ridges and pits of the morels absorbed the rich, savoury bone marrow jus, releasing an intense burst of mushroom flavour. The glossy, melt-in-themouth morsels of bone marrow added a luxurious depth, and when paired with the silky celeriac purée, the dish came together as a harmonious and truly impressive creation.

The black cod with Krystal caviar is available on the standard menu. The fish is marinated in miso and cooked sous vide until done. This retains the white colour of the fish while maintaining a tender texture. The miso adds a mild

Russia says 'ready' to discuss **US** accusations of secret nuclear tests

◆ Russian Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov said Tuesday that Moscow was "ready" to discuss with **Washington accusations by President Donald Trump** that it had carried out secret underground nuclear tests. Tensions have risen between the world's two largest nuclear nations after the latest attempt to resolve the Ukraine war failed, with Russia carrying out tests

of its nuclear-powered, nuclear-capable weapons systems and Trump saying he was ordering the test of atomic weapons. He accused Moscow of having secretly carried out nuclear detonations -- not just the testing of delivery systems, which all nuclear-armed states do regularly. "We are ready to discuss the suspicions raised by our American colleagues regarding the possibility that we might be secretly doing something deep underground," Lavrov told state media in a

televised interview. He denied Trump's claims and said the United States could check whether Russia tested a nuclear warhead via the global seismic monitoring system.

France's **Macron to meet** Palestinian president Abbas

◆ French President Emmanuel Macron will meet Palestinian president Mahmud Abbas in Paris on Tuesday to discuss the "full implementation" of the Gaza ceasefire agreement, the Elysee said. The meeting comes a month into a fragile truce between Hamas and Israel, following two years of war triggered by the Palestinian militant group's October 7, 2023 attack against Israel.

ndian Prime Minister Narendra Modi yesterday called a deadly car explosion in the heart of the capital a "conspiracy", vowing those responsible will face justice.

Police are yet to give exact details of what caused Monday's incident near the historic Red Fort, one of India's most wellknown landmarks, and the site of the prime minister's annual Independence Day speech.

The blast killed at least eight people, and 19 others were injured when flames ripped through several vehicles.

It was the first significant seattack in late April that left 26 mainly Hindu civilians dead at the tourist site of Pahalgam in Indian-administered Kashmir, triggering clashes with Paki-

Home Minister Amit Shah, after chairing security talks following the blast, said he had instructed officials "to hunt down each and every culprit behind this incident", he said in a statement.

"Everyone involved in this act will face the full wrath of our agencies," he added.

'People were burning'

New Delhi's deputy chief fire officer AK Malik told AFP shortly after the explosion that eight people had been killed.

The Press Trust of India news agency reported on Tuesday that the death toll had risen to 12, although that figure has not been confirmed.

Witnesses described to AFP how the car exploded in traffic and how people caught up in the surge of flames were set on fire.

"People were on fire and we tried to save them... Cars and people were burning -- people inside the cars were burning," said Dharmindra Dhaga, 27.

"I was telling the public to save them, rescue them, and get them out. The public was busy making videos and taking photos."

The emergency ward at Delhi's LNJP hospital was chaotic after the explosion as wounded people streamed in and doctors rushed to treat them.

Pakistani Taliban claim deadly suicide attack in Islamabad

AFP | Islamabad, Pakistan

The Pakistani Taliban claimed a suicide bombing that killed at least 12 people in Islamabad yesterday, a rare attack by the militant group on the country's capital.

The first such attack to hit the city in years sent people fleeing in panic, leaving shattered glass and charred vehicles on the road outside district court buildings.

"Judges, lawyers and officials who carried out rulings under Pakistan's un-Islamic laws were targeted," the Pakistani Taliban (TTP) said, threatening more attacks until Islamic law is implemented in the Muslim-majority country.

Interior Minister Mohsin Naqvi said 12 people were killed and 27 wounded when the assailant detonated explosives near a police vehicle.

A lawyer at the scene, Mohammed Shahzad Butt, said there was a "massive blast".

"Everyone started running in-least five dead bodies lying at the side out of panic. I have seen at front gate," he told AFP.

The bombing follows the Indian capital Delhi being hit by a car explosion Monday, which killed at least eight people.

The prime minister of Pakistan, Shehbaz Sharif, earlier accused the TTP and separatists from the country's Balochistan region, both of whom have carried out attacks mostly on security forces.

The BBC's outgoing boss **⊥** yesterday defended its journalists as the broadcaster grappled with how to respond to US President Donald Trump's threat of a lawsuit over a misleading speech edit.

Trump's lawyers on Monday gave the BBC until Friday to "appropriately compensate" the president for "harm caused" by a documentary containing the edit, or face a \$1 billion lawsuit for damages.

The controversy has already seen the under-fire broadcaster apologise for giving the impression that Trump directly urged "violent action" just before the assault on the US Capitol by his supporters in 2021.

Cristiano Ronaldo says 2026 World Cup 'definitely' his last

ortuguese superstar Cristiano Ronaldo yesterday said next year's World Cup would be his last as he winds down one of the all-time great careers.

The 40-year-old forward, with more than 950 club and international goals, also said he would retire from football in "one or two years".

"Definitely, yes," he told a Saudi forum by video link, when asked if 2026 would be his final World Cup. "I'm gonna be 41 years old and I think it will be the moment."

Ronaldo, who began a lucrative stint at Saudi Arabia's Al Nassr in 2023, also elaborated on comments last week when he said he would retire "soon".

"Let's be honest, when I mean soon, it's probably one or two years I'll still be at the game," he said.

The five-time Ballon d'Or winner is hoping to play at a sixth World Cup next year. He came closest to lifting the trophy on debut in 2006, when Portugal lost to France in the semi-finals.

Portugal have yet to qualify for the 2026 tournament in the USA, Canada and Mexico, but can secure their spot if they ter leaving Manchester United beat Ireland on Thursday.
