

# Bahrain's warriors ready for Asian battle

Strong Yellow Cup showing builds confidence for Kuwait

Bahrain's senior men's handball team have concluded their preparatory stint at the Yellow Cup in Switzerland and now shift their focus to the 22nd Asian Men's Handball Championship, which begins on Thursday in Kuwait City. The continental tournament will also serve as the Asian

qualifier for the 2027 IHF Men's World Championship in Germany, placing extra emphasis on a strong start for Robert Hedin's squad.

The Bahrainis wrapped up the Yellow Cup with a close 31-33 defeat to Ukraine, finishing fourth overall. Trailing 17-18 at halftime, Bahrain showed greater tenacity in the second half, clawing back from a four-goal deficit to within one goal late in the match, but Ukraine ultimately held on for the victory. While the result may have disappointed, the performance offered

encouraging signs that Bahrain can compete under pressure. Hosts Switzerland claimed the title for the tenth time after a 29-all draw with North Macedonia, who finished as runners-up. Despite not recording a win, none of Bahrain's three losses exceeded a four-goal margin, which is a small but significant indicator of their competitive level against strong European opposition.

Following their return to Bahrain yesterday, the national team will have a short recovery period before departing for Kuwait City on Wednesday to begin their continental campaign, ensuring players are rested and ready for the intense schedule ahead.

Bahrain will compete in Group B alongside Jordan, China, and Iraq. They open their campaign against Jordan at 4pm on Friday, face China on Sunday at 6pm, and conclude the preliminary round against Iraq next Tuesday at 4pm, all times local to Bahrain. A strong start in the group

will be key, as every point could prove decisive in the race for an Asian qualifying spot for the World Championship.

The squad, led by captain Hussain Al Sayyad, also includes: Hassan Al Samaheej, Mohammed Abdulhussain, Mohammed Habib Ahmed, Mohammed Habib Nasser, Hussain Mahfoudh, Jaffar Abdulshaheed, Mohamed Hameed, Hesham Ahmed, Salman Al Showaikh, Qassim Qamber, Ahmed Redha, Sayed Ali Basem, Hassan Madan, Ahmed Almaqabi, Ali Mahmood, Jassim Khamis, Ali Redha, and Ali Alasheeri.

Robert Hedin's men, gold medal winners at last year's sixth Islamic Solidarity Games, will be aiming for a strong start in the Kuwaiti capital. Observers will be watching to see if the lessons learned in Switzerland translate into sharper performances as the "Warriors" compete for one of the Asian qualifying spots for the 2027 World Championship.

## 'Fragile' Man United hit new low with FA Cup exit

Darren Fletcher admitted Manchester United's "fragile" players have lost their confidence after Sunday's FA Cup exit against Brighton left Old Trafford in turmoil.

Managerless, out of both domestic cups at the first hurdle for the first time since 1981-82 and sitting a disappointing seventh in the Premier League, United have rarely been at a lower ebb in their history.

Caretaker boss Fletcher, who stepped up from his role as United's Under-18 coach after Ruben Amorim's dismissal last Monday, experienced the club's glory days as a midfielder under legendary manager Alex Ferguson.

But those trophy-filled years

seem a lifetime ago for Fletcher and the furious fans who filled

United's first FA Cup third round defeat since 2014 underscored the litany of problems scarring the club at present.

For now, United's hierarchy plan to hire an interim boss until the end of the season, buying them time to search for Amorim's permanent successor.

Former United manager Ole Gunnar Solskjaer, who failed in his first spell in charge, and Michael Carrick, a decorated ex-United midfielder sacked by second tier Middlesbrough this season, have been linked with the temporary post.

Few have faith that United will hire the right manager after Amorim lasted just 14 turbulent months following the equally chaotic reign of Erik ten Hag, who was axed in 2024.

## Swiatek insists 'everything is fine' after back-to-back defeats

## Shabab Al Ahli Snatch Victory from Muharraq

Bahrain champions Muharraq came agonizingly close to avenging an earlier narrow loss to UAE giants Shabab Al Ahli, but fell 84-83 at the BBA Arena yesterday in Group A of the 2025-26 FIBA WASL Gulf League. The Red Wolves were chasing a third straight Gulf League win, hoping to climb the group standings while settling the score after a prior 89-87 defeat to the same opponents.

Muharraq dominated early, storming out to a 21-9 lead in the first quarter. Nicholas Simon West powered the paint with inside scoring, while Kerwin Roach Jr. drove repeatedly to the basket. Timothy Lamont Bond Jr. contributed fast-break points and dunks, as the Red Wolves forced turnovers and outrebounded Shabab Al Ahli 10-5 in the opening frame, energizing the home crowd and setting the stage for a dramatic rematch.

By halftime, Peter Schomers'
