Bahrain set for plastic bag ban

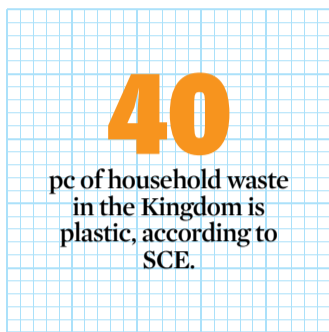

In line with the directives of the Government Executive Committee chaired by His Royal Highness Prince Salman bin Hamad Al Khalifa, Crown Prince, Deputy Supreme Commander and First Deputy Prime Minister, the Kingdom will begin phasing out the use of plastic bags.

According to Supreme Council for Environment Chief Executive Officer Dr Mohammed Bin Daina, the technical regulations for plastic products will come into effect on July 21, 2019.

The order will regulate and phase out the use of plastic bags. The first phase will focus on single-use plastic bags as well as banning the import of non-bio-degradable plastic bags.

Later phases will witness a



permanent ban on the use of plastic bags at certain malls and supermarkets, Dr Bin Daina said.

The SCE and the Ministry of Industry, Commerce and Tourism are currently working on setting the implementation phase for the remaining plastic products.

The official noted that the SCE will issue guidelines for manufacturers and suppliers on re-

ducing plastic waste to ensure a smooth transition.

He underlined the results of the SCE's intensive market research on Bahrain's plastic production, affirming that switching to the production of degradable plastic will not affect production lines.

Pointing out that the Kingdom has benefited from Saudi Arabia's expertise in this field, Dr Bin Daina said: "The SCE has implemented measures to expand the number of recycling businesses by increasing the total number of recycling bins, thereby reducing plastic waste that ends up in landfills."

He highlighted that 40 per cent of household waste is plastic, which can only be effectively reduced through prohibition and regulation.

Labour plan for no-deal vote rejected
 London

MPs have rejected a Labour-led effort to take control of Parliament's timetable, blocking the latest attempt to stop a no-deal Brexit. The Commons opposed the move by 309 votes to 298.

If passed, it would have given opponents of a no-deal Brexit the chance to table legislation to thwart the UK leaving without any agreement on the 31 October deadline. The result of the vote was greeted with cheers from the Tory benches.

But Labour leader Jeremy Corbyn responded by shouting "you won't be cheering in September".

Ten Tory MPs, mostly pro-Europeans, rebelled against the government by backing Labour's motion. Conversely, eight Labour MPs - mostly Eurosceptics or MPs in constituencies which voted Leave at the referendum - defied party instructions and voted against it.

Saudi airport attacked

Houthi missile hits Saudi Arabia's Abha airport injuring 26 people

● **The Iran-backed Houthi militia, has fired dozens of missiles into Saudi Arabia from Yemen.**

At least 26 people were injured yesterday when a Houthi missile fired from Yemen hit Abha International Airport in Saudi Arabia.

The Arab Coalition fighting to support Yemen's government vowed a firm response and said the attack proved Tehran's support for cross-border terrorism.

The attack took place in the early hours when the missile hit the arrival lounge of the airport in Asir Province at 2:21 a.m.

The coalition said the injured were all civilians of different nationalities and included two Saudi children and three women - a Saudi, a Yemeni and an Indian.

Eight people were trans-

ferred to hospital for treatment for moderate injuries, while 18 were treated at the site for minor injuries.

The general supervisor of Asir Central Hospital told Al Ekhabariya that all the patients had been discharged by 10 a.m.

Part of the airport lounge was damaged, but television pictures later showed passengers queuing inside the airport as normal services resumed.

Coalition spokesman Col Turki Al Maliki said the military and security forces were working to determine the type of "hostile projectile" used in the attack.

across the border or longer-range ballistic missiles targeting the Kingdom's main cities.

Saudi Arabia and its allies have blamed Iran for supplying ballistic missiles and drones to the Houthis. If a cruise missile, which flies at lower altitudes than ballistic missiles, has been used in the attack, it would raise further concerns that Iran is

supplying increasingly sophisticated weaponry to the militants.

The attack "proves this terrorist militia's acquisition of new special weapons; the continuation of the Iranian regime's support and practice of cross-border terrorism," Al Maliki said.

He said the attack could amount to a war crime and that the coalition would take "urgent and timely" measures in response.

He later told Al Arabiya that the evidence so far suggests that Iran's Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps provided the weapons that targeted the airport.

Prince Turki bin Talal bin Abdul Aziz, the governor of the Asir region, said that attacks by the Iranian-backed Houthis would

not affect the security and stability of Saudi Arabia and that plots to destabilize the Kingdom would not succeed.

A Houthi military spokesman Tuesday threatened that the group would target every airport in Saudi Arabia and that the coming days would reveal "big surprises".

Saudi Arabia's civil aviation authorities said that airport operations and air traffic had returned to normal.

Thousands of passengers pass through Abha airport every day.

The Yemeni government, which the Houthis drove from Sanaa in 2014 to spark the war, said that only military action will end the militia's "terrorism," Al Arabiya reported.

Kuwait, Saudi record highest temperature on earth

Kuwait City

Kuwait has recorded the highest temperatures in the world; reaching 52.2 degrees Celsius in the shadows and 63 degrees Celsius under direct sunlight, according to various reports.

In Saudi Arabia, the mercury rose to 55 degrees Celsius in Al Majmaah at noon.

The heatwave is expected to continue well into the summer season, which officially kicks off on June 21.

Arabia Weather website stated that the heatwave has also struck Qatar, Bahrain and the UAE, with the heat being accompanied by a high humidity rate.

The National Centre of Meteorology (NCM) has predicted temperatures will

soar to 48 degrees Celsius in Al Al Ain and Delma.

Temperatures in Sharjah and Fujairah will touch 43 degrees Celsius, while in Dubai they are likely to soar to 42 degrees Celsius today, Gulf News reported.

Temperatures in Abu Dhabi are likely to touch 41 degrees Celsius.

According to NCM, the weather is fore-

cast to be fair in general, but the department warned it will be partly cloudy and hazy at times. There is probability of some convective clouds formation Eastwards towards afternoon.

Meteorologists in Kuwait have predicted a volatile summer this year, noting that temperatures could reach 68 degrees under the sun next month.

Bahrain attends ILO centenary meeting

Labour and Social Development Minister and Chairman of the Labor Market Regulation Authority Jameel Humaidan is leading Bahrain's delegation to the International Labor Organisation (ILO) centenary meeting in Geneva.

Bahrain's participation is premised on the Kingdom's keenness on collaborating with the international community in drafting the policies and orientations of the ILO discussed during the meeting.

Bahrain is also keen on supporting labour causes and on discussing the development of employment and the quality of

renewable professions, in light of the rapid changes in the labor markets across the world.

The Kingdom is also interested in the developments of social protection systems globally and the prospects of tripartite dialogue between the parties of production.

Bahrain is also keen on identifying the challenges facing the labor markets and on solutions to the difficulties in the development and production process, thus contributing to the development of developing labor markets through providing the necessary technical support.

At its annual conference that marks its 100th anniversary, the

ILO is seeking to understand what tomorrow's jobs will look like and the ways to protect workers from violence and harassment.

In January, the ILO urged governments, employers and unions to deliver a "human-centred" agenda for decent work in the coming years based on investing in people's capabilities, places of employment and decent and sustainable jobs.

The report authors warned that the world of work faces "unprecedented transformational change" driven by new technologies such as artificial intelligence, automation and robotics as well as climate change, migration and globalisation.

Over a thousand people were injured in worksite accidents last year, it emerged.

The statistics revealed by the Social Insurance Organisation (SIO) says 1,037 people were injured in worksite accidents, which includes 613 Bahrainis and 424 expatriates.

In the public sector last year, 221 cases of worksite accidents

were recorded, 198 involved Bahrainis while expatriates were the victims in 23 accidents.

"The inspection campaigns play a great role in bringing adherence to the rules. The labour force is an important component of the nation and it is vital

for us to ensure their safety.

"We urge workers to follow safety protocols so that they are protected at all times. We will continue the awareness programmes and inspection campaigns to further reduce the number of worksite accidents.

"Workshops, seminars and conferences will also be held as part of the efforts," the representative added.

This year has seen a few fatal worksite accidents. Earlier this month, a man was run over by a truck.

The deceased was identified as Indian national Raju, who was in his late 30s. He worked as a mason with a construction firm.

Another construction worker who died last month in a worksite accident was a Bangladeshi national.

According to sources, he fell to his death from the 11th floor of a building in Juffair.

The victim was later identified as 29 years old Sahadot who hailed from Pabna district in Bangladesh.

Two sentenced over child's electrocution

Both landlord and tenant were charged with unintentional murder

The Third Minor Criminal Court yesterday announced its judgement in a child electrocution case, sentencing the landlord and tenant of the property where the victim died.

The tragic incident occurred on a farmland in Hajar village in the Northern Governorate.

The court sentenced the two men to six months imprisonment for unintentional murder and fixing electricity extensions without obtaining the necessary permit.

The tenant said that the victim was accompanying him, admitting he had fixed the extensions himself.

Prosecutor Ibrahim Al Binjassim, who explained in a press statement that the Public Prosecution was notified by Budaiya Police about finding the body of a child on a farmland.

Mr Al Binjassim explained

that the site was inspected and the safety of electricity extensions was checked.

“Witnesses’ testimonies, including that of a technician with the Electricity and Water Authority, were heard.

The technician confirmed that the internal extensions of the farm were unsafe, which violated the Electricity and Water Authority laws.

“The coroner’s report has proven that the victim’s cause of death was electrocution, which suddenly stopped blood circulation and respiratory functions, leading to the child’s immediate death,” Mr Al Binjassim said.

The Chief Prosecutor also clarified in his statement that the person renting the farm and the owner of the farm were interrogated.

The tenant told the prosecutors that the victim was accompanying him and admitted that he had fixed the extensions himself.

Both the tenant and the landlord were charged of unintentional murder and fixing electricity extensions without obtaining a permit, contrary to safety and security standards.

A bail amount of BD500 was fixed by the court to suspend the execution of the sentence for each defendant.

Wrong side biker loses appeal

Police officers spotted a rider steering his bike on the wrong side of the road and alerted him to pull over.

However, he refused to obey the order, fleeing the scene.

He wasn’t even wearing a helmet but police officers failed to nail him down as he succeeded to disappear by diving with his bike into small alleys unfit for car use.

Police officers gave up running after him and investigations were opened into the case. The culprit eventually fell into the police net thanks to a thorough search. And he admitted to his wrongdoing and was sent for a trial before a traffic court.

He was initially fined BD1,100, but the verdict was challenged. He yesterday appeared before the court to hear the outcome of his appeal, which was rejected.

He told judges that he can’t settle it in one stretch and requested to let him pay the amount on a monthly instalment basis.

However, the judges ordered him to pay the full amount in one stretch or face six months jail.

Expat dies of heart attack

Sniffer dogs foil drug smuggling attempt

A team of sniffer dogs belonging to the Customs Department were recently able to foil an attempt to smuggle drugs hidden in the front bumper of a car that was entering the Kingdom from Saudi Arabia.

Interior Ministry confirmed in a statement issued on Tuesday that the seized drugs included Hashish and captagon pills, and explained that the incident happened on King Fahad Causeway.

Quoting the Land Ports Director in the Ministry’s Customs Affairs Director, the statement mentioned: “The K9 dog suspected one of the cars in a particular lane and the search resulted in the confiscation of the substances that were hidden inside the front part of the vehicle.”

According to the ministry, the case and the seized drugs were referred to the Anti-narcotics Directorate of the General Di-

rectorate of Criminal Investigation and Forensic Science, to proceed with the legal procedures.

Man who burnt cop's car loses appeal

The Supreme Criminal Court of Appeal yesterday upheld the imprisonment sentence of a Bahraini man who is convicted of burning a policeman’s car in Karzakkan village the Northern Governorate.

The same court earlier reduced the imprisonment sentence of another defendant who’s involved in the same case to five years.

However, it held on to its initial decision to fine both of them BD5,804 collectively in compensation for the vehicle they burnt.

The details of the case show that both defendants have agreed to burn the victim’s car, and endangering people’s lives and properties serving a terrorist purpose.

The prosecution referred the defendants to the criminal court, which earlier sentenced both to 10 years imprisonment and fined them BD5,804.

AGU launches first Master's programme in regenerative medicine in the region

The College of Medicine and Medical Science in the Arabian Gulf University (AGU) has announced that it is launching a Master’s programme in Regenerative Medicine by the beginning of the upcoming academic year 2019-2020, becoming the first university in Arab countries and the region to offer such a new and innovated major.

The announcement comes within several new graduate studies academic programmes that were confirmed and approved during the 85th meeting of the university’s Board of Trustees held in Oman in March this year.

On the occasion, Molecular Medicine Assistant Professor in the College of Medicine and Medical Science in AGU, Heart Surgeon and Stem Cell Specialist Dr Sfoug Al Shammary said: “This unique and innovated programme,

which is also known as the medicine of the future, is provided for the first

time in universities in Arab and regional countries.”



Regenerative medicine can also develop tissues and organs in the laboratory and assists in planting it safely when the human body cannot naturally recover.

He said that AGU is at the forefront of higher education institutions in the region to introduce new and innovated majors to its students, similarly to leading and prestigious international universities.

Dr Al Shammary announced that registration for the programme will be soon opened, adding that it is aiming to benefit doctors and medical professionals in GCC States.

He also explained that distinguished professors from Japan, Austria, the United States, Canada and the United Kingdom will be in charge of teaching the two-year programme, which focuses on two main specialisations; stem cells and anti-ageing.

The regenerative medicine tackles tissue engineering and regeneration of cells, tissues and organs of humans, making them work in a natural way. It depends on the activation mechanisms of the body’s self-repair.

Regenerative medicine can also develop tissues and organs in the laboratory and assists in planting it safely when the human body cannot naturally recover.

Japan PM on Tehran mission

● **Abe is the first Japanese prime minister to visit Iran in 41 years**

Tehran

Japan's Prime Minister Shinzo Abe arrived in Tehran yesterday for a rare diplomatic mission, hoping to defuse tensions between the Islamic republic and Tokyo's ally Washington.

State television broadcast footage of Abe being greeted at Tehran's Mehrabad airport by Iran's Foreign Minister Mohammad Javad Zarif.

The first Japanese prime minister to visit Iran in 41 years, Abe was expected to go straight into talks with President Hassan Rouhani and to meet Iran's supreme leader Ali Khamenei on Thursday morning.

His arrival was preceded by that of Japan's Foreign Minister Taro Kono, who held closed-door talks with Zarif.

"Amid concerns over growing tension in the Middle East and with the attention of the international community on the issue, Japan wishes to do its best towards peace and stability in the region," Abe told reporters before leaving for Tehran.

"Based on traditional friendly ties between Japan and Iran, I would like to have candid exchanges of opinions with President Rouhani and supreme leader Khamenei towards easing tensions," he said.

Japan is hoping to lower the temperature, officials say.

Abe won Trump's blessing for the mediation mission when the US president visited Tokyo last month.

“We believe it is extremely important that, at the leadership level, we call on Iran to ease tension, to adhere to the nuclear agreement and to play a constructive role for the region's stability,” Chief Cabinet Secretary Yoshihide Suga said.

Iranian newspapers were divided along conservative-reformist lines in their assessment of Abe's visit.

The reformist *Sazandegi daily* ran a front-page cartoon of Abe in full samurai armour, a rolled piece of paper in one hand and

a shield on the other.

In an accompanying article headlined “A samurai in Tehran,” the paper said everyone was waiting to see “Tehran's reaction to Japan's initiative to raise its international standing by mediating as both Washington's ally and Iran's friend.”

Philippines blasts ‘cowardly Chinese boat’ over sinking

Manila

The Philippines yesterday condemned the “cowardly action” of a suspected Chinese fishing vessel accused of abandoning a Filipino fishing crew after a collision in the disputed South China Sea.

The boat on Sunday hit a Filipino craft anchored near Reed Bank -- claimed by both Manila and Beijing -- causing it to sink and leaving 22 crewmen “to the mercy of the elements”, said defence secretary Delfin Lorenzana.

“We condemn in the strongest terms the cowardly action of the suspected Chinese fishing vessel and its crew for abandoning the Filipino crew,” Lorenzana said in a statement. “This is not the expected action from a responsible and friendly people.”

Lorenzana called for an investigation into the collision, and for “diplomatic steps” to prevent a repeat of the incident.

However, Philippine defence department spokesman Arsenio Andolong said the agency had yet to confirm whether the vessel was Chi-

nese-registered, adding it was the Filipino fishermen who identified it as such.

The defence chief also thanked the crew of a Vietnamese fishing vessel in the vicinity which he said brought the Filipinos to safety.

Like the Philippines, Vietnam has partial claims over the South China Sea, where Beijing has staked “indisputable sovereignty” and built artificial islands with military facilities and airstrips. Taiwan, Brunei and Malaysia also have claims in the area.

Fish turns gloomy when separated: study

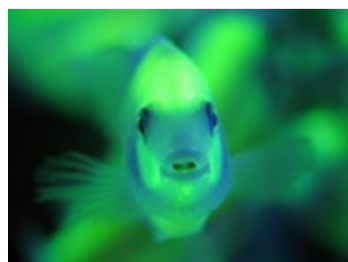
● **Tropical fish suffers from heartache when separated from its lover**

Paris

The tiny Central American convict cichlid may only be a few centimetres long but it's a fish with a big heart.

Researchers in France found that the tropical fish -- known to be a loyal and monogamous partner -- suffers from heartache when separated from its lover.

Even more heart-rending perhaps is that female cichlids, when paired with a male who is not their preferred partner, were shown in experiments to

To effectively measure each fish's mental response to separation, researchers from the University of Burgundy in Dijon trained females to use their mouths to open two small boxes, placed either side of their tanks

exhibit “pessimistic” behaviour. Scientists believe that over the course of evolution fish species such as the convict cichlid

have developed loyal partnerships as a way to better protect their young, which are extremely vulnerable to predators.

While the tale of the cichlid's lovelorn travails may warm the heart, the fish are anything but lovely: they have sharp teeth and have been shown to be extremely territorial.

86pc of internet users admit being duped by fake news

Ottawa, Canada

Eighty-six percent of internet users have been duped by fake news -- most of it spread on Facebook -- according to a global survey published Tuesday.

Respondents said they want both governments and social media companies to crack down on these activities, which are contributing to a growing distrust of the internet as well as negatively impacting economies and political discourse.

The United States took the lion's share of the blame for spreading fake news, followed by Russia and China, according to the annual Ipsos survey of more than 25,000 internet users in 25 countries.

Fake news appeared to be most prevalent on Facebook, but also appears on YouTube, blogs and Twitter, the pollsters found.

The survey results showed people in Egypt were the most gullible while respondents in Pakistan were the most skeptical.

The results also revealed widespread distrust of social media companies and growing concerns over online privacy and biases baked into algorithms used by internet companies.

The poll -- which relied on both in-person and online interviews -- was conducted between December 21, 2018 and February 10, 2019 on behalf of the Centre for International Governance Innovation (CIGI).

"This year's survey of global attitudes not only underscores the fragility of the internet, but also netizens' growing discomfort with social media and the power these corporations wield over their daily lives," CIGI's Fen Osler Hampson said in a statement.

Sudan rivals agree to new talks

Khartoum, Sudan

Protest leaders have agreed to end a campaign of civil disobedience launched after a deadly crackdown on demonstrators and to resume talks with Sudan's ruling generals, an Ethiopian mediator said Tuesday.

The apparent breakthrough, which the military rulers had yet to confirm, came as a top US diplomat prepared to embark on a mission to press the generals to halt the crackdown on protesters demanding civilian rule.

Sudan has been led by a military council since it toppled autocratic president Omar al-Bashir on April 11 after months of nationwide protests against his iron-fisted rule of three decades. Following Bashir's removal, protesters camped outside military headquarters in Khartoum for weeks to demand civilian rule, before security and paramilitary forces dispersed them in a June 3 crackdown that

killed dozens.

The protest movement launched a campaign of civil disobedience on Sunday, and most businesses stayed closed and residents hunkered indoors for the next three days.

It had threatened to pile even more pressure on the generals by releasing a list of members for a new ruling body -- the key point of dispute between the two sides.

But they agreed to end the campaign and return to talks, said an envoy of Ethiopian Prime Minister Abiy Ahmed.

"The Alliance for Freedom and Change agreed to end the civil disobedience (campaign) from today," Mahmoud Drir,

who has been mediating between the two sides since Ahmed visited Khartoum last week.

"Both sides have also agreed to resume talks soon," he told reporters. The protest movement itself said in a statement that it was calling on people "to resume work from Wednesday".

Protest 'a success'

In Khartoum, the protest strike saw most shops and businesses remain closed with some companies extending to the end of the week the Eid al-Fitr holidays marking the end of Ramadan.

"We are now getting used to living with guns as we are see-

ing so many of these men walking into restaurants with their weapons," one resident said as a group of RSF members entered an eatery.

Demonstrators declared their nationwide shutdown a success.

"This shows clearly what we can do, and also in a peaceful way," said Ishraga Mohamed.

Protest leaders vowed to name a new ruling body to replace the generals.

"The Alliance for Freedom and Change will reveal its sovereign council and a prime minister in an announcement to be made at a suitable time," the Sudanese Professionals Association, a key member of the umbrella protest movement.

Trump inadvertently reveals more of US-Mexico migrant deal

Washington, United States

US President Donald Trump revealed Tuesday that Mexico agreed to take stronger legal action to halt Central American migrants if its initial efforts to stem the flow don't show results in 45 days.

In bright sunshine outside the White House, Trump waved what he said was the text of an agreement Mexican and US officials signed Friday to avert the

application of tariffs on their exports to the United States.

Photographs of the document revealed that Mexico appeared to pledge to enact or enforce certain domestic laws if Washington is not satisfied with the results of its first promised efforts -- deploying 6,000 National Guardsmen to reinforce its southern border and expanding its policy of taking back asylum-seekers as the United States

processes their claims.

If, after 45 days, the US government "determines at its discretion" that the results aren't enough, the document says, "the Government of Mexico will take all necessary steps under domestic law to bring the agreement into force."

The document gives the Mexican government another 45 days to achieve that.

It was not clear what specific



measures the Mexican government would have to take.

Trump waved the ostensible agreement in front of reporters amid questions on whether his

administration really did reach a substantial agreement last week to stem the flow of hundreds of thousands of migrants who pass through Mexico to enter the United States.

The initial deal appeared to repeat previous undertakings the Mexicans have made.

But Trump has repeatedly suggested there is another secret part of the deal that would require more of Mexico.

Emissions rose an 'unsustainable' 2pc in 2018: study

London, United Kingdom

Global carbon emissions grew by 2.0 per cent last year, the highest rate since 2010-2011, a closely-watched review by energy giant BP said Tuesday, calling the trend "unsustainable".

"There is a growing mismatch between societal demands for action on climate change and the actual pace of progress, with energy demand and carbon emissions growing at their fastest rate for years," said BP chief executive Bob Dudley.

"The world is on an unsustainable path," he said.

The BP Statistical Review of World Energy is viewed as an energy industry standard, pooling data on everything from the size of countries' oil reserves to their production of renewable energy and various consumption rates.

India to evacuate 300,000 from cyclone

Ahmedabad, India

Almost 300,000 people are set to be evacuated in the western Indian state of Gujarat out of the path of a severe cyclonic storm due in two days, authorities said Tuesday.

"The weather department's latest bulletin forecasts that cyclone Vayu will make landfall... early in the morning on June 13," senior state official JN Singh told reporters.

"We have identified 2.91 lakh (291,000) people living in low-lying areas of 10 coastal districts who will be evacuated

ed by Wednesday afternoon," Singh said after an emergency meeting.

"All schools and colleges in the coastal districts of Saurashtra and Kutch would remain close on June 12 and June 13 as a precautionary measure," he said.

He added that 67 shelter homes have been set up to accommodate the displaced people. Vayu, currently a cyclonic

storm in the Arabian Sea, is set to intensify and make landfall in Gujarat on Thursday packing winds gusting up to 135 kilometres (85 miles) per hour and heavy rains, forecasters say.

It is likely to damage thatched houses, blow away rooftops and metal sheets, disrupt power and communication lines and cause major damage to roads and crops, the Indian Meteorological Department (IMD) said.

Two giraffes killed by lightning in Florida: park

Miami, United States

Two giraffes were killed instantly when they were struck by lightning in the southeastern US state of Florida, the park where they resided said on Tuesday.

"We are deeply saddened to share the passing of two of our giraffe due to a lightning strike," the Lion Country Safari park, which is located north of Miami, said in a Facebook post.

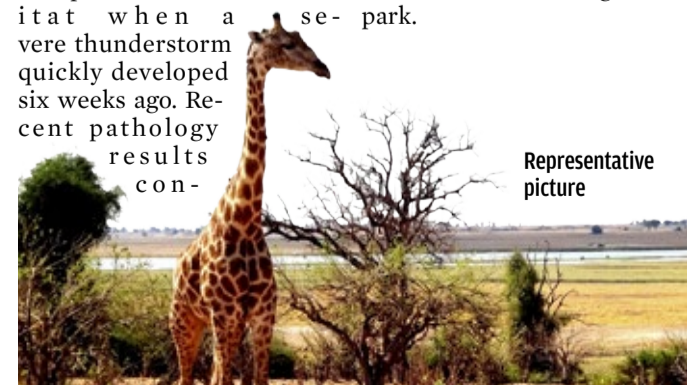
"Lily and Jioni were in the pasture in their habitat when a severe thunderstorm quickly developed six weeks ago. Recent pathology results con-

firm that the giraffe did pass as a result of the lightning and that the manner of their passing was instantaneous," it said.

The park said that the giraffes have access to "numerous shelters in the multi-acre habitat."

But "if they don't choose to seek shelter, there isn't a lot we can do to encourage them to," park spokesperson Haley Passer told the local WPTV channel.

With the death of the two giraffes, a male and a female, there are 18 remaining in the park.

Massacre toll in Mali cut to 35

Bamako, Mali

A massacre at a village in central Mali that according to early estimates killed 95 people left 35 dead, the authorities said Wednesday, giving a final toll.

Twenty-four of the dead were children, the government said in a statement which added that six people had been detained "following routine checks".

Gunmen late Sunday surrounded the village of Sobane Da, in an ethnic Dogon enclave, killing inhabitants and torching homes in a seven-hour assault, survivors said.

The killings stirred fears of tit-for-tat violence in the region, an ethnic patchwork where tensions have soared since the emergence of a violent jihadist-led movement in 2015.

The government had given a provisional figure of 95 dead and 19 missing.

That toll was based on early information from soldiers and

the district mayor who visited the village, which is also known as Sobane-Kou.

But by Monday night there was some doubt and the revised figure was confirmed the following day, officials said.

"This number is based on a painstaking count carried out by a team comprising officials from the (Malian) civil protection force, forensic doctors (and) the public prosecutor of Mopti" region, Wednesday's statement

said. About a hundred women had succeeded in fleeing to the village of Koundo, and this was one of the causes of the confusion, it said.

The government, referring to the risk of another turn in the cycle of violence, also urged local people "not to fall into the trap of guilt by association and revenge."

Ethnic violence in central Mali surged after a predominantly Fulani jihadist group led by preacher Amadou Koufa

emerged in 2015.

On May 16, the UN peacekeeping mission in Mali, MINUSMA, announced it had recorded "at least 488 deaths" in attacks on Fulanis in the central regions of Mopti and Segou since January 2018.

Armed Fulanis "caused 63 deaths" among civilians in the Mopti region over the same timespan, it said.

In the bloodiest raid, about 160 Fulani villagers were slaughtered on March 23 at Ogossagou,

near the border with Burkina Faso, by suspected Dogon hunters. The Fulani are primarily cattle breeders and traders, while the Bambara and Dogon are traditionally sedentary farmers.

In the heart of the Sahel, Mali is one of the world's poorest countries. Unrest in its volatile central region coincides with an ongoing jihadist campaign that the government is struggling to contain, despite military support from France and UN peacekeepers.

Toothpaste firm up for auction on Chinese shopping portal

A toothpaste company has been put up for auction on e-commerce giant Alibaba's Taobao, an immensely popular shopping portal in China which sells everything from mundane household items to jumbo jets.

Tianqi toothpaste, a household name in China, and its manufacturer Guangxi Aoji were listed for auction on Tuesday at a starting price of 163.24 million yuan (\$23.6 million).

The package on offer included 57 trademarks related to Tianqi, industrial real estate and production equipment, according to the auction notice, which did not explain why the company was being sold or why Taobao was chosen for the transaction.

The company went unsold in the first round, after only two buyers signed up. The auction terms require the successful bidder to resume production

of Tianqi a month after the sale.

Tianqi was most popular in the early 2000s, but has since faded away with competitors chomping away at its market share.

The auction notice yesterday did not say if the sale would be attempted again.

Taobao is estimated to hold a huge chunk of the consumer-to-consumer market in China, and handles billions of dollars in transactions for everything from jewellery and company shares to helicopters -- and even bottled flatulence.

Among its users are courts trying to auction assets of bankrupt businesses, including the 2017 sale of a defunct cargo company's 747 freight planes.

The platform started its judicial sales platform in 2012, according to China's official Xinhua news agency, and most courts have registered with it, saving buyers billions -- Taobao says it does not charge commission fees.

India unveils spacecraft for moon-landing mission

Bangalore, India

India yesterday unveiled a spacecraft which is expected to take off for the moon next month, making the country only the fourth to achieve the feat. The mission is India's second to the moon, and if successful it will put the nation in the league of the US, the former Soviet Union and China.

Named Chandrayaan-2, the craft is made up of an orbiter, a lander and a rover developed by the Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO).

It will be launched from Sriharikota space centre on July 15 and is expected to land near the lunar South Pole on September 6.

Once it touches down, the rover will carry out experiments while being controlled remotely by ISRO scientists.

"It is going to be the most complex mission ever undertaken by ISRO," chairman K. Sivan was quoted as saying by

local media.

"The aim is to use space technology for the benefit of the common man."

India has made giant strides in its space journey in recent years. It launched a record 104 satellites in a single mission in 2017, and has also built a reputation for low-cost space exploration and science missions.



In March, the country said it had destroyed a low-orbiting satellite in a missile test to prove the nation was among the world's most advanced space powers.

Boy dies of Ebola in Uganda as virus spreads from DR Congo

Kampala, Uganda

A five-year-old boy who tested positive for Ebola in Uganda has died, a health ministry official told AFP Wednesday as two of his family members also tested positive for the virus after a visit to neighbouring Democratic Republic of Congo.

The World Health Organisation confirmed on Twitter that Uganda has now recorded

three cases of Ebola, in the first spread across the country's porous western border with the DRC where more than 2,000 cases of the highly contagious virus have been registered.

Uganda's health ministry said on Tuesday that a woman of Congolese origin, who is married to a Ugandan, had gone with her child and four other family members to take care of her father in the DRC, who later died of Ebola.

More than 200 arrested at Moscow police abuse march

Moscow, Russia

More than 200 people including opposition leader Alexei Navalny were detained yesterday as police sought to break up a peaceful Moscow rally against the alleged impunity of law enforcement agencies.

Russian police in riot gear moved in against the unsanctioned march of more 1,000 people amid screams of protesters shouting "you are criminals" and "stop police terror."

Moscow police said around 1,200 took part in the march and more than 200 people were arrested.

Some of the arrested wore T-shirts in support of Ivan Gol-

unov, an investigative journalist who was last week arrested on trumped-up drugs charges.

One detained activist brandished a placard saying, "I am Ivan Golunov" in the window of a police van.

The idea of population transfe

As the United States concludes with Israel's right-wing government in undermining a two-state solution with the Palestinians, it may help to revive an alarming idea. With Israel facing an expanding number of Palestinians in the West Bank, and no plan for what to do with them, this may resuscitate the idea of transferring them out of the territories, allowing for a more complete integration of the West Bank into Israel.

To put this in context, this past weekend the US ambassador to Israel, David Friedman, told the New York Times: "Under certain circumstances, I think Israel has the right to retain some, but unlikely all, of the West Bank." Such a move would make a two-state solution impossible, unless the Palestinians were to accept an entirely dependent, quasi-entity, ringed by Israel's army, with none of the attributes of sovereignty.

Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu has long sought to extend Israeli law to parts of the West Bank. However, his annexationist designs could return us to another time in Israel's history, before the declaration of the state in 1948.

During the 1930s, the idea of "transferring" the Palestinian population out of Palestine to make room for Jewish immigration was at the heart of Zionist thinking. Many in the Zionist movement considered that Palestinians could move to fellow Arab countries, without any prejudice to them, as there was no recognition among them of a Palestinian nationalist identity.

A particularly revealing mo-

ment occurred in 1937, when the British Peel Commission proposed the partition of Palestine into a Jewish and an Arab state. The Zionist leader David Ben-Gurion supported the proposals, but understood that they would only be acceptable if there were provisions for the removal of the Palestinians who remained in the Jewish state. Because Arabs represented half the population of that state, unless they were "transferred" they would have quickly formed a majority, owing to their higher birth rate.

If Israel annexes the West Bank, it will have to deal with upwards of what its Civil Administration estimated in 2012 to be some 2.6 million Palestinians in the territory. While they may be penned into areas of Palestinian autonomy, the long-term prospect that relative peace will prevail is difficult to imagine - particularly if Palestinians continue to be denied civil and political rights, and are pushed into increasingly restricted areas, as Israel consolidates and builds up the land under its control.

That is not to say that the Israelis will engage in the mass expulsions of Palestinians. Such scenes would be too reminiscent of ethnic cleansing in places such as Syria and Bosnia, and would bring international condemnation. However, Israel is aware that it is also facing a demographic time bomb and that, sooner or later, the millions of Palestinians under its control may rise up, representing a threat in the West Bank. This is all the more likely if annexation transforms many of its areas into Israel proper.

In such an event, armed

clashes between Palestinians and Israelis, particularly if the Palestinian security forces get involved, could lead to dynamics that Israel exploits. Heavy fighting could create major population movements towards safer

areas, perhaps allowing Israel to channel Palestinians into neighbouring Jordan. Certainly, the Israelis would strenuously deny any such intention, but fighting shaped the demographic landscape in 1948. So, why presume

that such a thing could not happen again?

Considering that something might happen is not the same as saying that it will. Israeli society may yet sense where all this is going, and decide that becom-

The end of iTunes marks the day

When Apple announced last week that it was killing iTunes, few mourned the application's impending demise. In fact, most critics described it as having become bloated over its long life. In response, Apple will break the existing version down into three parts - music, TV and podcasts - to make it more intuitive and user-friendly.

I was neither an early adopter of iTunes nor an especially late arrival, and, like millions of others around the world, I've now shifted to paying a monthly fee to stream music. Nevertheless, I will miss the idea of iTunes, if not the overgrown mess it became.

When it was launched, two years after the iPod's 2001 unveiling, the iTunes store was envisaged as a rebuttal to peer-to-peer file sharing websites, principally Napster, which had risen to prominence in the free-for-all of the dot-com boom years.

The late Apple boss Steve

Jobs pitched it to a generation of consumers who still lived by the old-world rules that it was better to buy than to rent, and that it was better to do things legally than to hang out with a bunch of internet pirates.

He also gambled that there were millions of music lovers who wanted to replicate the experience of browsing through new albums and spending money, just as they had done for many years in the physical space of a record shop.

"People want to own the music they love," Jobs insisted in 2003. He was right.

Even those of us who had been coerced by the music industry into buying the same music in successive formats - vinyl, cassette, CD and Minidisc - understood that iTunes and the iPod represented an exciting new destination point.

Where Sony's Walkman and its successors had allowed users to take their music wherever they went, they were limited by their inability to carry more than an amuse bouche of the songs a person might want to

If Israel annexes the West Bank, it will have to deal with upwards of what its Civil Administration estimated in 2012 to be some 2.6 million Palestinians in the territory. While they may be penned into areas of Palestinian autonomy, the long-term prospect that relative peace will prevail is difficult to imagine.

braced by the Israeli right, and that is not about to change. In advancing Israeli expansionism, the leaders on the right will do whatever it takes to secure their aims.

Would such “transfer” of the Palestinians work? In a region where millions of people have been forcibly displaced, with anaemic responses from the international community, it is difficult to rule out such an option. Moreover, if a Palestinian exodus were the result of fighting, Israel could spin it all as an act of self-defence. It has done so time and again in Gaza, despite the overwhelming level of Israeli destruction in the territory. We’re not in a region where victims are used to getting satisfaction.

Hopefully, this will not occur. However, everything points to a profoundly destructive deadlock on the Palestinian-Israeli front in the years ahead. Such deadlock already has existential implications, and so may bring about existential reactions. It is in such fraught environments that ethnic cleansing often takes place.

listen to. In comparison, the iPod, marketed as “1,000 songs in your pocket”, offered an entire banquet.

With iTunes, it was like having your local record shop repositioned as a 24-hour convenience store. The software’s other bit of genius was to enable users to create a vast digital jukebox from their old CDs and their new digital purchases.

But Jobs was also wrong. The world has now moved on. Few people want to buy any more. Most of us want to rent. In fact, with the notable exception of vinyl enthusiasts, who have grown in number over recent years, we are far more likely to buy a latte than a long-player. That’s what makes me mourn for iTunes.

There is an argument to say that the music industry has never been more vibrant, more diverse or, indeed, more able to support so many different genres than it is today.

But my biggest problem with the death of iTunes is the modern-day business model that it effectively rubber stamps.

There is an argument to say that the music industry has never been more vibrant, more diverse or, indeed, more able to support so many different genres than it is today.

Don’t get me wrong, monthly subscription models work well for TV streaming services. In fact, they work so well that they’ve ushered in a new “golden age” of programming.

By contrast, the music business was a disruptive industry long before that phrase came into common usage. Popular music spurred rebellion, but recurring monthly subscriptions can never be seen as a counter-cultural act of defiance.

The publishing industry has,

uniquely, found a halfway house between e-books and the paper variety, in which many of us buy a new release on an electronic device, but also still appreciate the experience of reading and owning a paperback or hardback.

I doubt that the “people want to own the music they love” rallying cry that Jobs made 16 years ago will ever gather strength again. Even when Apple switches iTunes off, and the music we’ve collated over the years becomes harder to access, there will, for most of us, be no great rush back to physical music.

Years ago it became popular to describe the arrival of iTunes as the day the music died. It wasn’t. Apple seized control of the music business with its introduction, but it also wrested primacy away from the pirates.

The death of iTunes marks the point where music stopped being collectible and became a common consumable. It is the moment when we jumped to paying for nothing at all.

US states sue to block Sprint, T-Mobile deal

New York, United States

New York and California led a group of state governments in filing a lawsuit to block the proposed \$26 billion merger between Sprint and T-Mobile, asserting the deal would harm consumers.

Nine states and the District of Columbia, argued that allowing the companies to combine would cause "irreparable harm" leading to higher costs that would price out low-income consumers.

T-Mobile and Sprint, the third- and fourth-largest wireless carriers in the country, together have around 130 million subscribers, and the combination would bring the merged company closer to the dominant players Verizon and

AT&T.

The merger "would not only cause irreparable harm ... by cutting access to affordable, reliable wireless service for millions of Americans, but would particularly affect lower-income and minority communities," New York Attorney General Leticia James said in a news release.

"That's why we are going to court to stop this merger and protect our consumer."

Sprint, majority owned by Japan's SoftBank, and T-Mobile, a unit of Germany's Deutsche Telekom, have said the deal is needed to compete in developing the next-generation 5G network.

The companies have agreed not to raise rates for three years and will divest from Sprint's subsidiary Boost Mobile.

Britain sets deadline for carbon neutrality by 2050

The British government yesterday presented draft legislation to reduce carbon emissions to net zero by 2050 in what it said would be a first for a major economy.

The new target was broadly welcomed across the political spectrum but environmental groups said it would require radical action to decarbonise the entire economy.

The deadline is far more ambitious than Britain's current policy of cutting emissions by 80 per cent over the same period and Finance Minister Philip Hammond has reportedly warned it could cost more than £1.0 trillion.

The 2050 date will be introduced in existing climate change laws through a piece of

legislation known as a statutory instrument that parliament is expected to approve.

"As the first country to legislate for long-term climate targets, we can be truly proud of our record in tackling climate change," Prime Minister Theresa May said.

In one of her final acts before she steps down next month, she said Britain "must lead the world to a cleaner, greener form of growth".

"Standing by is not an option," she added. Britain's top advisory body on climate change this year said the net zero target could be achieved within a budget of 1.0-2.0 per cent of gross domestic product by 2050.

The deadline would put Britain on track to fully meet its commitments under The Paris Agreement, under which countries have pledged to keep the global average temperature rise to well below 2 degrees Celsius.

Other EU countries have also pencilled in various emission reduction deadlines, although none have been adopted into law.

In France, the government introduced a bill in April setting a 2050 target date, while Norway is discussing 2030.

The world's net carbon emissions grew by an "unsustainable" rate of 2.0 percent last year, according to a closely-watched review by energy giant BP published on Tuesday.

The review also found that global energy demand grew by 2.8 percent, with the United States recording the biggest increase of any country.

Global markets retreat

London, United Kingdom

Stock markets pulled back yesterday after a strong run over several sessions as attention returned to US-China trade tensions, dealers said.

Asian markets kicked off the losses after two days of healthy gains, with Hong Kong the worst performer -- sinking two per cent as a huge anti-government protest paralysed key roads in the city before turning violent.

European indices followed suit with losses of around half apc by the close, while Wall Street, having opened steady, slid gently downwards throughout the New York morning.

"US stocks are dipping in early action, after snapping a five-day winning streak yesterday, with the heightened US-China trade tensions countering elevated Fed rate cut expectations and the recent deal that averted increased tariffs on Mexico," brokers Charles Schwab said.

Profit-takers moved in also as traders keep a nervous eye on developments in the China-US trade saga ahead of an expected meeting between Donald Trump and Xi Jinping at the G20 summit in Japan later this month.

The dollar was mixed on Wednesday, while oil prices tumbled.

Stock markets had rallied in recent days on the prospect of a US interest rate cut and broader central bank dovishness which helped to offset lingering US-China trade war tensions.

US Commerce Secretary Wilbur Ross tempered expectations that the US and China will reach an agreement when Trump and Xi meet.

Elsewhere, oil prices slumped after data pointed to a jump in US stockpiles, exacerbating worries about oversupply and weak-

"Oil prices have struggled to retain (recent) bullish gains as traders stay cautious over heightened geopolitical risks

and persistent weakness in the global economic backdrop," said Benjamin Lu, commodities analyst with Phillip Futures in Singapore.

Lu and other analysts said oil prices had been winning support from expectations that OPEC and Russia would agree at a meeting this month to extend output cuts beyond June.

Elsewhere in commodities, cocoa futures rose sharply after key producers Ivory Coast and Ghana stopped sales in a push for higher prices, dealers said.

The September forward contract for the commodity, listed in New York, reached an 11-month high, hitting \$2,545, a rise of around 1.6pc on the day.

The two African nations, which together account for 60pc of the world's cocoa production, summoned buyers to Accra demanding a price of \$2,600 per tonne.

The meeting reached agreement in principle, a Ghana official announced, but implementation remains an issue.

Johnson plays down no-deal Brexit

London, United Kingdom

Boris Johnson said yesterday he would only take Britain out of the EU without a deal as a "last resort", launching his campaign to be prime minister with a promise to unify a country deeply divided over Brexit.

The former foreign minister is the favourite among the 10 candidates vying to succeed Theresa May, who is stepping down after being forced to delay Britain's departure from the European Union twice.

At a launch event in London packed with senior members of the ruling Conservative party, Johnson insisted that Brexit must happen on October 31, the latest deadline agreed with Brussels.

He said Britain must prepare to leave with no new arrangements if need be, but softened his previous rhetoric, suggesting that this was "a last resort, not something that anybody desires".

However, as a protester outside shouted "Stop Brexit" and "Bollocks to Boris", Johnson offered no details of how to break the deadlock in parliament that prevented May from getting her deal through.

He said a new government with "new optimism" and "total conviction about the way forward" could find a way.

The EU has insisted repeatedly that it will not renegotiate

the terms of the divorce, while parliament has voted against leaving without an accord.

On Wednesday, a cross-party group of lawmakers made a fresh bid to block such a scenario happening in future.

Finance Minister Philip Hammond warned Johnson and other leadership rivals not to make promises on Brexit they could not keep.

"The parliamentary arithmetic remains exactly the same, the European Union's position remains exactly the same," he said at a Bloomberg event.

Labour challenge

Conservative lawmakers will

hold the first of a series of secret ballots on Thursday on the leadership candidates, who also include Foreign Secretary Jeremy Hunt.

They will whittle down the field to two by June 20, and that pair will then be put to a ballot of around 160,000 Conservative party members.

The winner should be in Downing Street in late July but, if they cannot break the political deadlock in parliament, an election may be inevitable.

Johnson's supporters believe he is the only leader who can win against the twin threats of leftist Labour leader Jeremy Corbyn and eurosceptic Nigel Farage.

On Wednesday, he warned that his party faced "mortal retribution from the electorate" if it failed to deliver Brexit.

"Delay means defeat. Delay means Corbyn. Kick the can and we kick the bucket," he said.

But in a repeat of moves earlier this year, Labour led an effort Wednesday to try to take control of the Commons timetable to legislate against a "no deal" in the future.

The party's Brexit spokesman, Keir Starmer, said threats of crashing out of the EU were "disturbing, ludicrous and reckless".

Oil falls almost 2pc on weaker demand, rising US inventories

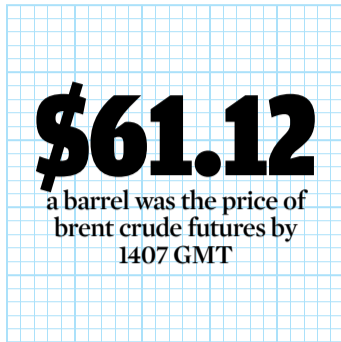
Oil prices fell almost 2 per cent yesterday, weighed down by a weaker outlook for demand and a rise in US crude inventories despite expectations of extended supply cuts led by OPEC.

Brent crude futures, the international benchmark for oil prices, were down \$1.17, or 1.9pc, at \$61.12 a barrel by 1407 GMT. US West Texas Intermediate crude futures were down \$1.13, or 2.1pc, at \$52.14.

The US Energy Information Administration (EIA) cut its forecasts for 2019 world oil demand growth and US crude production on Tuesday.

A surprise increase in US crude stockpiles also kept oil prices under pressure.

"Yesterday's bout of paralysis is giving way to a fresh slide in prices as market players fret over a swelling glut in US oil stockpiles," brokerage firm PVM said in a note.



US crude inventories rose by 4.9 million barrels in the week ended June 7 to 482.8 million barrels, data from the American Petroleum Institute (API) showed on Tuesday. That compared with analyst expectations for a decrease of 481,000 barrels.

Trade tensions between the United States and China, the world's two biggest oil consumers, also weighed on prices. US President Donald Trump said he was holding up a trade deal with China.

European shares pulled back

from three-week highs on Wednesday as this month's recovery rally ran out of steam on the back of soft Chinese factory activity and trade frictions.

Hedge fund managers are liquidating bullish oil positions at the fastest rate since the fourth quarter of 2018.

With the next meeting of the Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries set for the end of June, the market is looking to whether the world's major oil producers will prolong their supply cuts.

OPEC, along with non-members including Russia, have limited their oil output by 1.2 million barrels per day since the start of the year to prop up prices.

Goldman Sachs said an uncertain macroeconomic outlook and volatile oil production from Iran and others could lead OPEC to roll over supply cuts.

"The sell off in recent weeks shows how vulnerable the market is and it may force Russia's

hand in extending the deal," said Warren Patterson, head of commodities strategy at ING.

The energy minister of the United Arab Emirates, Suhail bin Mohammed al-Mazroui, said on Tuesday that OPEC members were close to reaching an agreement on continuing production cuts.

China inflation hits highest level in 15 months

Beijing, China

Inflation in China rose to its highest level in more than a year in May driven by surges in pork and fruit prices caused by the African swine fever epidemic and bad weather, official data showed yesterday.

But while prices are increasing, demand remains weak because of the trade war with the United States and economic uncertainty.

The consumer price index (CPI) -- a key gauge of retail inflation -- hit 2.7 per cent, the National Bureau of Statistics (NBS) said, compared with 2.5pc in April and the highest since February 2018.

The data was in line with a forecast of analysts polled by Bloomberg News.

The rise was "largely the result of renewed acceleration in food price inflation", and pork supply disruptions caused by African swine fever, Capital Economics said in a note.

Millions of pigs have been

culled recently as the disease cuts through China and beyond, devastating global food chains and impacting pork prices from the food markets of Hong Kong to US dinner tables. The price of pork soared 18.2pc in May, China's NBS said. The price of fresh fruit on-year was up 26.7pc as bad weather hammered supplies.

Beijing's official statistics say around one million pigs have been killed since the first outbreak in August -- but that is widely considered to be an underestimate.

The producer price index (PPI), an important indicator of domestic demand, hit 0.6pc in May, from 0.9pc the previous month. Economic "growth could slow further on escalating US-China trade tensions", Nomura International said in a note.

"We expect Beijing to undertake further easing/stimulus measures to bolster confidence and to stabilise growth."

Falling prices for energy and used cars held down US inflation in May, extending the long run of soft price pressures, according to government data released yesterday.

The latest confirmation of the absence of inflation should comfort markets hoping the Federal Reserve will cut interest rates in the coming months to boost the economy, especially amid President Donald Trump's multi-front trade wars.

The central bank is due to hold its next policy meeting

next week but most investors do not expect the Fed to announce any changes so soon.

The Consumer Price Index -- which tracks costs for household goods and services -- rose a token 0.1 per cent compared to April, matching analyst forecasts, the Labor Department reported.

Food prices jumped 0.3pc in the month, but that was more than offset by a steep 0.6pc decline in energy costs.

Compared to May of last year,

prices are up 1.8pc, slowing from the 2pc increase in April.

When the volatile food and fuel categories are excluded, "core" inflation also rose 0.1pc for the fourth month in a row, falling just shy of a consensus forecast.

Compared to May of last year, the core CPI is twopc higher, slowing slightly from the 2.1pc pace of a month earlier.

Prices medical care, air fares, education, furniture and new autos all rose. But costs for auto

insurance, used motor vehicles and recreation fell.

Housing costs have been rising steadily as rents have increased 3.7pc in the latest 12 months, while the rent equivalent for homeowners in up 3.3pc, according to the data.

Economists said the price data undermine Fed's view that factors keeping inflation below the twopc goal are temporary.

"The view that the dip in core inflation is transitory -- a view that both we and Fed Chairman Powell have held to -- is coming under pressure," RDQ Economics said in a research note.

But Kathy Bostjancic of Oxford Economics said the Fed will hold off before cutting the benchmark lending rate, and watch to see the impact of tariffs on the economy.

"We believe the Fed will cut rates this year but wait until December as they want to see evidence in the hard data that heightened trade tensions are significantly eroding economic activity before pulling the easing trigger," she said in an analysis.

Andy Murray aims for singles return this year

Andy Murray hopes to be back on the singles court later this year, but the British former world number one is setting no time limits on his return.

Murray will step up his comeback bid from the hip surgery he underwent in January when he competes in the doubles with Feliciano Lopez at Queen's Club next week.

The 32-year-old then plans to play doubles at Wimbledon, where he has won two of his three singles Grand Slam titles.

However, Murray still expects to take his time before returning to singles action, which probably rules out competing at the US Open at the end of August.

"It's baby steps just now," said the Scot. "I'm feeling good, pretty much pain-free and enjoying kind of just training, practising, improving all the time just now."

"I don't think when Wimbledon finishes that I will just step onto the singles court the following week and everything's good. I still have quite a lot of work to do before I'm at a level where I feel like I'll be able to be competitive."

Murray, who last played singles at the Australian Open in January, said he had been making consistent progress but he would probably plateau at some stage.

"I hope at some stage this year I would be able to get back to playing singles again."

said Murray, speaking at the launch of a new tennis support scheme in partnership with Amazon Prime at the Queen's Club in London.

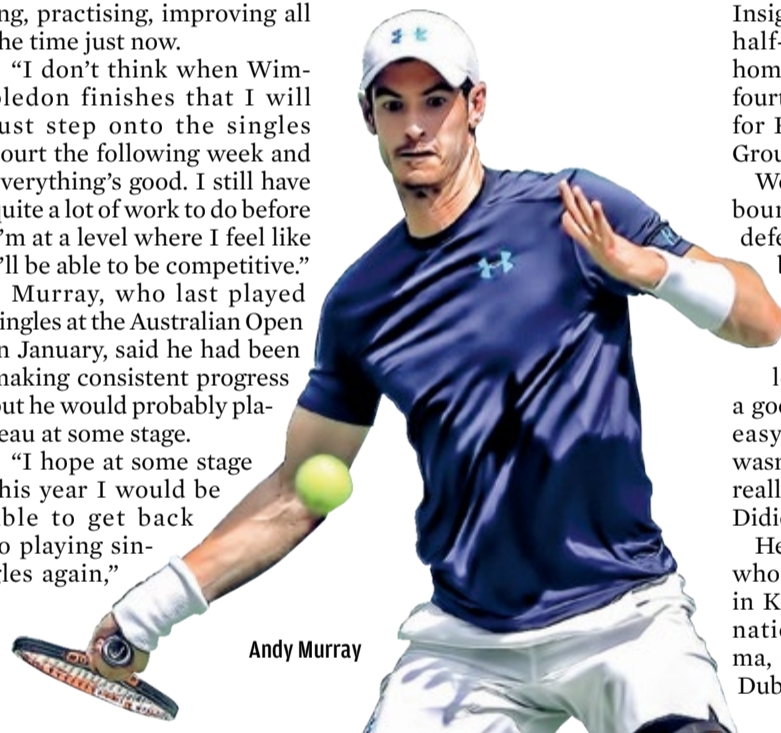
"When that is, I'm not really interested in putting a time limit on because I'm quite happy just now so I don't need to play singles after Wimbledon or at the US Open."

"If I can, that would be brilliant, but I don't think that's going to be the case. I think it's going to take a bit longer."

Murray has been training with American Frances Tiafoe but has still not fully tested his recovery with any singles practice matches.

"Earlier on I was hitting with singles players but I was more stationary. I was moving them rather than them moving me about."

"So, I have not played properly singles-wise yet. I am hoping that will come more after Wimbledon."

Italy edge Bosnia as Germany, France stroll

Insigne, Verratti push Italy closer to Euro 2020 with Bosnia win

● **Mbappe Scores as France Beat Andorra 4-0**

● **Germany beat Estonia 8-0 in 2020 Euro Qualifier**

Italy needed a late winner from Marco Verratti to defeat a determined Bosnia-Herzegovina 2-1 in Euro 2020 qualifying Tuesday, while Germany and France piled up the goals in lopsided victories.

Edin Dzeko fired Bosnia in front in Turin, but Lorenzo Insigne equalised shortly after half-time and Verratti curled home on 86 minutes to earn a fourth win in as many attempts for Roberto Mancini's side in Group J.

World champions France rebounded from last weekend's defeat in Turkey with a trouble-free 4-0 win away to minnows Andorra.

"We reacted well after not playing to our usual level on Saturday against a good Turkey team. It looked easy today and the intensity wasn't the same but we played really well," said France coach Didier Deschamps.

He retained just four of those who began Saturday's 2-0 loss in Konya, handing first international starts to Kurt Zouma, Clement Lenglet and Leo Dubois.

Kylian Mbappe opened the scoring with a chipped finish on 11 minutes, with Wissam Ben Yedder and Florian Thauvin adding to their lead in the first half.

Zouma bundled home a fourth on the hour as France reclaimed top spot in Group H after Iceland beat Turkey 2-1 in Reykjavik to further sour the mood in the visiting camp.

Turkish officials had denounced the "disrespect" shown to the team when they arrived in Iceland, unhappy at being kept waiting for several hours at passport control at the airport and subjected to extensive

security checks.

Two headers in the first half by centre-back Ragnar Sigurdsson saw Iceland draw level on nine points with France as well as Turkey, for whom Dorukhan Tokoz scored a consolation.

Germany made light work of Estonia as Serge Gnabry and Marco Reus fired them to a thundering 8-0 victory in Mainz.

Gnabry and Reus scored two goals each, with Leon Goretzka, Ilkay Gundogan, Timo Werner and Leroy Sane also on target, as Germany ran riot to seal a third win from three games in Group C.

Underdogs Estonia were helpless against a bright young Germany side who now appear to have left last year's World Cup woes far behind them.

Belgium extended their perfect start to Group I with a 3-0 defeat of Scotland in Brussels.

Romelu Lukaku headed in an Eden Hazard cross on the stroke of half-time and bagged a second early in the second half, with Kevin De Bruyne thumping home another at the death.

Russia followed up their 9-0 trouncing of San Marino with a much nervier win over Cyprus that came courtesy of a single goal by Aleksei Ionov.

Froome out of Criterium after training fall

Chris Froome was taken to hospital Wednesday after falling on a training run for the Criterium du Dauphine 4th stage, Team Ineos said.

The team confirmed that Froome would take no further part in the race, potentially casting a shadow over the 34-year-old's bid for a fifth Tour de France which starts in Brussels on July 6.

"Team INEOS can confirm that Chris Froome crashed during a recon of stage four of the Criterium du Dauphine today. He is currently on his way to a local hospital and won't start today's fourth stage. We will provide a further update in due course," Ineos said on Twitter.

During Froome's training run on Wednesday conditions were windy but the roads were dry with the route presenting no difficulties apart from two well-signalled downhill bends.

Ineos also have defending champion Geraint Thomas in their ranks with the Welshman scheduled to take part at eight-stage Tour de Suisse which starts Sunday.

Aussies survive Pakistan scare

● Mitchell Starc sinks Pakistan's pursuit of Australia after David Warner's century

● Pat Cummins claimed three wickets

David Warner scored his first international century since completing a ball-tampering ban as Australia returned to winning ways at the World Cup with a 41-run victory over Pakistan at Taunton yesterday.

Warner made 107 and, with Australia captain Aaron Finch (82), got the defending champions off to a flying start with an opening stand of 146 -- the highest partnership for any wicket at this World Cup to date.

Mohammad Amir dragged Pakistan back into the game with career-best figures of five for 30 in 10 overs but Australia still managed to post a challenging score of 307, which ultimately proved beyond their opponents.

"It means a lot to a batter to get a century," said man-of-the-match Warner. "It was a great effort from Pakistan in the end but our bowlers bowled excellent. They probably got closer than we expected."

Pakistan, after a middle-order collapse that saw them lose three wickets for 11 runs in 15 balls, were all but beaten at 200 for seven in the 34th over.

But captain Sarfaraz Ahmed (40) and the big-hitting Wahab Riaz (45) gave them renewed hope with a stand of 64.

Australia, who lost to India on Sunday, were again looking to Mitchell Starc to get them out of a tight spot, as had done in an earlier win over the West Indies and the fast bowler duly delivered with 2-43.

He had Wahab caught behind got off a thin edge, although it needed an Australia review of an original not out decision to leave Pakistan 264-8

Two balls later, Amir played on for a duck before Glenn Maxwell ended the match with a brilliant direct hit run out of Sarfaraz.

Opener Imam-ul-Haq was upping the tempo in his 53 when he gloved Pat Cummins (3-33) down the legside to wicket-keeper Alex Carey.

Finch, an occasional slow bowler, grabbed a real bonus wicket when Mohammad Hafeez (46) hit a rank full toss straight to Starc at deep square leg.

And when Shoaib Malik was brilliantly caught for nought by a diving Carey after inside edging Cummins, Pakistan

were in dire straits at 147-5.

Both Warner and Steve Smith, also returning from a year-long ban for ball-tampering, had been jeered by fans in previous games but Pakistan fans largely heeded an appeal from Sarfaraz not to boo the pair, preferring to roar chants of "Amir!, Amir!".

Warner completed his 15th one-day international hundred when an edge off Shaheen Shah Afridi flew past slip for four.

An elated Warner leapt in the air in celebration but his 111-ball innings ended soon afterwards when he was caught at point off Shaheen, having gone past fifty for the third time in four innings at this World Cup.

"I'm very disappointed," said Sarfaraz. "We lost three wickets in 15 balls and that's why we lost."

"We conceded too many runs in the first 20 overs apart from Mohammad Amir. We came back and restricted them well but it was a 270-280 pitch."

"We made some runs and got starts but we've got to convert them and go long. If you want to win matches your top four must score runs."

Australia have three wins in four matches while Pakistan are struggling, with just one victory in their four games so far.

India call up Pant as cover for Dhawan

Rishabh Pant has been called up as cover for the injured Shikhar Dhawan in India's World Cup squad, team chiefs confirmed yesterday.

Dhawan injured his hand during the team's 36-run victory against Australia on Sunday and remains a doubt for the rest of the 50-over tournament.

The left-handed opener has been put under medical observation and Pant will join the team in England and Wales and stay on as standby.

"We will be observing Dhawan and around the 10th or 12th day we will know where he stands," India's assistant coach Sanjay Bangar said ahead of Thursday's match against New Zealand at Trent Bridge.

"We do not want to rule out a precious player like Shikhar. As far as batting order goes, KL (Rahul) moves top of the order and there are various options the team can utilise going into the next game."

Bangar added: "If and when a re-

placement is required, it's always good to have a replacement coming in and practising with the team as a standby".

Dhawan made 117, putting on 127 for the opening wicket with Rohit Sharma to set up India's second straight win in the World Cup against defending champions Australia.

Bangar said India would miss Dhawan but the team had enough strength in

depth to maintain their momentum in the round-robin tournament.

"Shikhar will definitely be missed in the next three to four games but we have great back-up for each position," he said. "With that we should be able to make it up."

"He (Pant) bats in middle order and obviously being a left-hander helps and he was named in the standbys as well, so the team management has gone and picked him," he said of Pant's call-up.

Team management said Pant would join the side in Manchester ahead of the match against arch-rivals Pakistan, which takes place on Sunday.

The 21-year-old, a flamboyant wicket-keeper-batsman, made his Test debut in England last year and scored his maiden Test century during the series.

Pant, who is being groomed to take over from M.S. Dhoni as first-choice wicketkeeper in all formats of the game, also underlined his worth with an unbeaten 159 against Australia in Sydney earlier this year.

The weather around the United Kingdom has been bad this week and the forecast in Nottingham for this match is not very good either.

A lot of rain is expected to fall in Trent Bridge and we could struggle to get any cricket in. The best case scenario looks one where a shortened match is possible to get a result.

The pitch in Trent Bridge is flat and full of runs. The batsmen are going to be able to score at their will and a score of about 330 seems to be par for the venue.

Head to Head

New Zealand need to grab half-chances against India: Ferguson

New Zealand cannot afford to squander even half-chances against a team of India's calibre in Thursday's World Cup match at Trent Bridge, Kiwi fast bowler Lockie Ferguson said.

The right-arm paceman will be spending much of his 28th birthday trying to tame a formidable Indian batting order headlined by Virat Kohli and Rohit Sharma, the top two batsmen in ODI rankings.

"They're world-class players, you're not going to blow them out of the water, but if you can build

up enough pressure against them and then create a half-chance, that could be the wicket and you can then build from there," Ferguson told reporters on Tuesday.

"Obviously, they're playing some great cricket and they're one of the top teams in the competition but we're definitely looking forward to the opportunity of playing them in England and we haven't played them for a while in England."

India have adopted a new approach to the first powerplay overs which was evident in their clinical victory against Australia on Sunday.
