Police officers gave up running after him and investigations were opened into the case. The culprit eventually fell into the police net thanks to a thorough search. And he admitted to his wrongdoing and was sent for a trial before a traffic court.

He was initially fined BD1,100, but the verdict was challenged. He yesterday appeared before the court to hear the outcome of his appeal, which was rejected.

He told judges that he can't settle it in one stretch and requested to let him pay the amount on a monthly instalment basis.

However, the judges ordered him to pay the full amount in one stretch or face six months jail.

The College of Medicine and Medical Science in the Arabian Gulf University (AGU) has announced that it is launching a Master's programme in Regenerative Medicine by the beginning of the upcoming academic year 2019-2020, becoming the first university in Arab countries and the region to offer such a new and innovated major.

The announcement comes within several new graduate studies academic programmes that were confirmed and approved during the 85th meeting of the university's Board of Trustees held in Oman in March this year.
