

Parliament
backs hiring of
24 unemployed
family doctors

Unemployed despite years of training, 24 Bahraini family medicine specialists were backed by Parliament yesterday through an urgent recommendation calling for their immediate hiring.

MP Hasan Ebrahim, who submitted the recommendation, said the doctors had finished all study, training and professional requirements, yet remained without posts.

“Twenty-four doctors and female doctors face the spectre of unemployment, despite successfully completing all requirements of study, training and professional qualification,” he said.

He added that the group had expected to be taken on in the same way as earlier cohorts, but instead found themselves without work or cover.

“After more than eleven years of study, training and continuous qualification, they expected that the natural end of this path would be employment, like all previous batches, but they found themselves unemployed, without jobs and without health insurance,” he said.

The recommendation calls for the doctors to be hired in primary healthcare centres and at Salmaniya Medical Complex.

Prioritising dignity

MPs approve amendments strengthening protections for persons with disabilities

Parliament unanimously approved yesterday a decree-law amending Bahrain’s 2006 law on the care, rehabilitation and employment of persons with disabilities, with changes that recast the committee responsible for disability affairs and tidy up terms used across the statute.

Decree-Law No. 34 of 2025 amends Law No. 74 of 2006.

The text says the aim is to update the legal framework, support the dignity and rights of persons with disabilities, and help secure their full and effective part in different areas of life on the same footing as others.

Support

MP Basema Mubarak told MPs that families were still searching for basic support.

“Behind every person with a disability is a father or mother fighting every day for the right school, a rehabilitation centre, and a job that protects their son or daughter’s dignity,” she said.

She urged MPs to focus on work. “We are talking about 325 people only out of about 13,000, a very small number, but they have skills, real desire to work,

and the ability to produce if they get the chance,” she said.

She added: “This group is not asking for pity or special favours; it is asking for its right to rehabilitation, its right to work, and a decent life.”

Lawmaking

Dr Maryam Al Dhaen framed the debate as a duty of lawmak-

ing.

“Talking about persons with disabilities is talking about the heart of social justice, and our lawmaking duty towards a core group of citizens,” she said.

She added that barriers often sit outside the person.

“The challenge is not the disability itself, but the legal, organisational and environmen-

tal barriers that narrow their chances in education, training and work,” she said.

Provisions

The decree-law rewrites the provisions governing the committee concerned with disability affairs.

Under the amended articles, the committee is created by a

decision of the Prime Minister and follows the ministry, with that decision fixing the committee’s name, its make-up and how long members serve.

It is chaired by the Minister of Social Development and includes government representatives at director level or above, alongside representatives from the private sector.

Bahraini architects earn recognition

“When dreams are paired with dedication, they have a way of arriving earlier than expected.”

This became a reality for Bahraini architect Ameen Adel Radhi and architect Maysam Hassan Al Nasser, founder of 1:1 Architectural Studio, after both were recognised by Niche Magazine as among the top architects in the Middle East during an international ceremony held in Riyadh.

During the interview, both architects shared insights into their professional journeys, creative philosophies, and the defining moments that shaped their paths.

Conversations

Radhi reflected on how entering the world of social media

became a turning point in his career, allowing him to translate complex architectural concepts into accessible conversations.

According to him, creating content encouraged continuous learning and research, while opening doors to meaningful dialogue with experienced architects across Bahrain.

“When you focus on the process rather than the result, growth happens naturally,” Radhi explained. “Sharing ideas publicly pushed me to learn more, question more, and constantly develop myself as an architect.”

Creativity

Discussing the architectural landscape in Bahrain, Radhi emphasized the importance of creativity within constraints.

He believes that successful design must balance financial

For Al Nasser, growth came through defining moments, including receiving the Bahrain Entrepreneur Honor Seal from Her Royal Highness Princess

Both architects also shared advice for young professionals aspiring to make an impact regionally or internationally, stressing the importance of pas-

sion, patience, and staying true to one’s process.

Growth

Radhi said, “Do what you love and focus on the process, because growth comes naturally when you invest effort and keep learning.”

Al Nasser added, “Always keep researching and stay connected to your roots; understanding your context is what allows young architects to make a real impact.”

Despite following different paths, both architects delivered a shared message to emerging professionals: passion, research, and authenticity are essential.

Rather than chasing recognition, they advocate for building meaningful processes that allow creativity and knowledge to evolve naturally turning ambition into lasting impact.
