

Ten-year prison term and fine for Asian drug dealer

The High Criminal Court has sentenced an Asian national to 10 years in prison and fined him BD5,000 after convicting him of possessing narcotic drugs and psychotropic substances with intent to traffic.

The court also ordered his permanent deportation following completion of the sentence and the confiscation of all seized items. According to case details, police officers on patrol became suspicious of a vehicle parked on the roadside with the defendant

inside.

Upon stopping him, officers observed signs of nervousness and trembling, while he was using his mobile phone to send a voice message in a foreign language via WhatsApp.

A previously sent message containing a location was found, and when the defendant noticed the police presence, he attempted to flee but was apprehended.

A liquid substance of unknown nature was found in his possession, and a search of the vehicle led to the seizure of substances suspected to be narcotics.

The defendant and the seized



items were referred to the Anti-Narcotics Directorate.

Further investigations re-

vealed that the incident was part of an organized criminal operation involved in importing

and distributing narcotic drugs and psychotropic substances using the so-called "dead drop" method.

The defendant's role was limited to receiving, storing, and distributing the substances in

return for financial gain.

With authorization from the Public Prosecution, the defendant's residence was searched, resulting in the seizure of large quantities of narcotic drugs of various types and weights, in addition to tools used for consumption and packaging.

During prosecution questioning, the defendant confessed to possessing the seized substances.

Laboratory analysis by the Criminal Investigation Directorate confirmed that the items contained narcotic drugs and psychotropic substances.

Driver falls asleep, kills pedestrian

An Asian defendant appeared before the First High Criminal Court to respond to charges of causing the death of a pedestrian in a traffic accident.

He told the court that he fell asleep while driving, losing control of the vehicle and causing it to veer off course, resulting in the fatal collision.

The court has scheduled February 24 for the verdict, following the defendant's admission to the act attributed to him.

The Public Prosecution charged the accused with causing the victim's death through negligence, driving without exercising utmost care, endangering pedestrians, and damaging public property.

The charges also included failure to drive with caution and vigilance, which contributed to the accident.

Housing Ministry ties property zoning to plan for 2030

The Ministry of Housing and Urban Planning says property classifications are decided under a set of planning rules led by the "National Strategic Structural Plan 2030", which it described as the top guide for urban growth and land use.

The ministry's comments came in a written reply to a parliamentary question from MP Hanan Fardan.

The 2030 plan steers growth in stages and spells out how land should be used. Classification and reclassification decisions rely on "urban classification maps" for each governorate.

Shura to debate adverts on public building wall space

Spare wall space on public buildings could be used for adverts under a draft change that the Shura Council is due to take up on Sunday, 18 January, after the Public Utilities and Environment Committee backed the plan.

The proposal amends Article 12 of Decree-Law No. 14 of 1973 on regulating advertisements, attached to Decree No. 27 of 2025.

The aim is to allow government bodies to rent out vacant spots on public buildings, or parts of buildings used for public services, as advertising space.

A blanket ban in the current law would remain in place, but the amendment adds an exception for adverts placed under

The committee said it reviewed the draft law and the

Council of Representatives' decision and attachments, after

MPs agreed the bill.

It also looked at the view of

the Ministry of Municipalities

Affairs and Agriculture, which supported the approach.

The Shura Council's Legislative and Legal Affairs Committee said the draft was sound from both constitutional and legal standpoints, according to the Public Utilities and Environment Committee.

Revenue

In its report, the committee said the change would widen the areas that can be used for advertising, with revenue expected through licensing fees and other returns linked to use of the sites.

It added that the ministerial rules are meant to keep adverts from harming the look of public buildings or affecting the public services provided from them.
