arliament's Services Committee is examining a proposal to amend Bahrain's Social Security Law.

The plan would allow university students over 18 to continue receiving state support regardless of their family's financial

The draft seeks to remove a clause in Article 6 that currently blocks students from receiving Image used for illustrative purposes only assistance if they have a financially able relative who is legally required to support them.

Under the proposed wording, any student working towards their first university degree would remain eligible for aid while enrolled, regardless of household backing.
