

Edict on labour safety, health

His Royal Highness Prince Salman bin Hamad Al Khalifa, the Crown Prince and Prime Minister, yesterday issued Edict No. (5) of 2026 amending certain provisions of Edict No. (2) of 2015 concerning the Occupational Safety and Health Council, following a proposal submitted by the Minister of Labour.

The edict replaces Articles (2) and (3) of the 2015 legislation and sets out a revised structure for the council.

Under the amendments, the council will be chaired by the Minister of Labour, with the Assistant Undersecretary for Labour Relations at the Ministry of Labour serving as vice-chairman.

Council membership will include senior representatives from the Ministry of Interior, the Ministry of Oil and Environment, the Ministry of Health, the Civil Service Bureau, and the General Organisation for Social Insurance, in addition to representatives from occupational health and safety bodies and trade union federations.

Two additional members, Abdulwahab Yousif Al Hajaj and Samra Abdulrahim Al Qassir, were also appointed.

Change on marine survey work area


HH Shaikh Isa is leading the Kingdom's high-level delegation at the event on behalf of His Majesty King Hamad bin Isa Al Khalifa.

Cooperation

Ratification

The Charter was signed by the US President Donald J. Trump, and His Excellency Nasser Bourita, Minister of Foreign Affairs, African Cooperation and Moroccan Expatriates of the Kingdom of Morocco, formally

Efforts

HH Shaikh Isa highlighted Bahrain's appreciation for President Trump's efforts to maintain peace regionally and globally, noting the Kingdom's hopes for

His Highness noted Bahrain's commitment to advancing the full implementation of the

peace plan proposed by President Trump regarding the Gaza Strip, which comprises 20 points and underscores the importance of safeguarding the legitimate rights of the Palestinian people.

Role

Over-50 government employees

Annual leave extension for senior staff set for debate

A plan to give government staff aged 50 and above shorter days and longer annual leave will be debated by the Shura Council on Sunday, after its Legislative and Legal Affairs Committee recommended refusing the draft changes in principle.

The draft law, based on a proposal from Parliament, would amend the Civil Service Law issued under Decree-Law No.

48 of 2010.

It would cut daily working hours in steps linked to age and add extra annual leave.

Proposal

Under the proposal, employees who have reached 50 would work one hour less a day and receive 35 working days of annual leave a year.

For those aged 55, the working day would be cut by two hours and annual leave would rise to 40 working days.

For those aged 60, the daily

cut would be three hours, with annual leave rising to 45 working days.

The committee said the changes do not sit with the way Bahrain's civil service rules are built, and raised concerns about equal treatment between employees, the day-to-day running of public services, and the cost to the state.

Report

In its report, the committee pointed to constitutional language that treats public employ-

ment as a national service, with duties linked to timekeeping, accuracy and trust.

It also cited the Civil Service Law's approach of setting the main rules in the law, while leaving attendance times, leaving times and leave detail to the executive rules and the decisions and instructions that follow them.

A key objection is that the draft law would split employees by age even where they hold the same grade and do the same job.
