▼he Bahraini juggernaut rolled through the group stage, untouched and unbothered. Their latest display on Monday, which was a 3-0 sweep of the UAE (25-15, 25-15, 25-18) on the final day of preliminary play, sealed their place atop Pool A and set the tone for today's quarter-finals at the WAVA Men's Volleyball Championship.

Led by head coach Arnaud Josserand, "Al Ahmar" once again showed why they've become the tournament's team to beat. By the second set, Bahrain were already rotating freely not to recover, but to reassert dominance with fresh legs and fresh angles.

Three players - Mohamed Anan, Mohamed Yaqoob, and Mohamed Jassim - shared top-scoring honors with eight points apiece. The UAE's offensive threat, led by Mohamed Al ly sparked, as Bahrain's blockand-serve game smothered their rhythm from start to finish.

Paret-Peintre delivers Tour de France home win in Mont Ventoux thriller

Pogacar extended overall lead

alentin Paret-Peintre bagged a first home win on an enthralling stage 16 of the Tour de France yesterday pipping Ireland's Ben Healy atop the 1910m altitude Mont Ventoux finish line.

Behind them Jonas Vingegaard attacked overall leader Tadei Pogacar relentlessly but the defending champion tracked the

Dane all the way up the 15km ascent to extend his lead by two seconds.

Trailing by 4min 13sec at the start of this stage Vingegaard attacked with 9km to climb on Mont Ventoux, whose eery upper reaches resemble a lunar landscape

They were eclipsed, however, by a frantic fight for the line and the stage win between EF's Healy and Soudal Quick-Step;s Paret-Peintre who relieved home hopes on a Tour raced entirely on French soil.

Vingegaard and his Visma team did everything they could to hurt the Team UAE leader Pogacar, but the 26-year-old resisted all they threw at him despite mates early in the climb which being isolated from his team-

Stage 17 should be one for the sprinters as Tim Merlier hopes to add to his two stage wins and current green jersey Jonathan Milan also targets a second win at the 700m straight run to the finish line at Valence.
