Iran 'part of the problem' in Yemen: Diplomat

Iran, which is supporting Shia Huthi rebels in Yemen, "is part of the problem, not the solution" when it comes to ending conflict in the war-torn nation, Yemen's top diplomat has said.

"Iran is the cause of the Yemen.

problem, Iran continues to support the Huthis, Iranian arms are smuggled. Iran is part of the problem, not the solution," Foreign Minister Abdulmalik Al Mekhlafi said when asked if Tehran could contribute to a political solution in Yemen.

He was speaking at UN headquarters after a major luncheon hosted by Yemen and Saudi Arabia with the majority of diplomatic missions to the United Nations.

"Iran has no role to play in the region," echoed the Saudi ambassador to the United Nations, Abdallah Al-Mouallimi. Saudi humanitarian aid to Yemen is estimated to top \$8.2 billion.

The Saudi-led military coalition largely controls the country's airspace, although US drones also carry out strikes on suspected Al-Qaeda bases there.

More than 8,300 people

have been killed and 44,000 wounded since the Saudi-led coalition entered the Yemen war in 2015.

Close to 2,000 Yemenis have also died of cholera since April and another 600,000 are expected to contract the infection this year.

Development first: PM to new Governor

War on terror

On October 7, 2001, less than a month after the September 11 attacks, US president George W. Bush launches operation "Enduring Freedom" in Afghanistan, after the Taliban regime refuses to hand over Al-Qaeda chief Osama bin Laden In a matter of weeks the US-led forces overthrow the Taliban, in power since 1996.

Forgotten war

Attention is diverted from Afghanistan as US forces in 2003 mount an invasion of Iraq, which becomes the main US concern. The Taliban and other Islamist groups regroup in their strongholds in the south and east of Afghanistan, from where they can easily travel to and from Pakistani tribal zones. In 2008 the American command on the ground calls for manpower to carry out an effective strategy against the Taliban insurgency. Bush agrees to send additional soldiers and by mid-2008 there are 48,500 US troops there.

End of combat

In September 2014 Afghanistan signs a bilateral security accord with the US and a similar text with NATO: 12,500 foreign soldiers, of which 9,800 are Americans, will remain in the country in 2015, after the end of the NATO combat mission at the end of 2014.

From the beginning of 2015, American troops will be charged with two missions: anti-terrorist operations against Al-Qaeda and the training of Afghan forces.

In late December, the NATO combat mission ends, and is replaced by an assistance mission baptized "Resolute Support". However, the security situation degenerates.

On July 6, 2016, Obama again slows down the pace of withdrawal, saying that 8,400 US troops will remain in Afghanistan into 2017.

Washington

President Donald Trump cleared the way for the deployment of thousands more US troops to Afghanistan Monday, backtracking from his promise to rapidly end America's longest war, while pillorying ally Pakistan for offering safe haven to "agents of chaos.'

Trump discarded his previous criticism of the 16-year-old war as a waste of time and money, admitting things looked different from "behind the desk in the Oval Office."

"My instinct was to pull out," Trump said as he spoke of his frustration with a war that has killed thousands of US troops and cost US taxpayers trillions of dollars.

But following months of deliberation, Trump said he had concluded "the consequences of a rapid

Taliban later vowed it would make the country "a graveyard" for the United States and would continue its "jihad" as long as American troops remained in the country.

"If America doesn't withdraw its troops from Afghanistan, soon Afghanistan will become another graveyard for this superpower in the 21st century," Zabiullah Mujahid, a spokesman for the Taliban in Afghanistan, said in a statement.

Trump also indicated that single-minded approach would extend to US relations for links with the Taliban and

for harboring leading jihadists like Osama bin Laden.

"We have been paying Pakistan billions and billions of dollars at the same time they are housing the very terrorists that we are fighting, he said, warning that vital aid could be cut. That will have to change and that will change immediately."

Ahead of the speech Pakistan's military brushed off speculation that Trump could signal a stronger line against Islamabad, insisting the country has done all it can to tackle militancy.

"Let it come," spokesman Major General Asif Ghafoor told reporters, referring to Trump's decision. "Even if it comes... Pakistan shall do whatever is best in the national interest." (AFP)

It was not an ordinary initiative, but an effort to provide the special needs kids a normal day to day life by giving them a chance to know the mother nature. The results were magical and this happened in Bahrain at the Al Jasra Rotary Farm.

The project called 'Green House' by the Rotary Club of Sulmaniya received special recognition and was also awarded by the Rotary International.

"This is a big achievement for us as this is the first time where a rotary club in Bahrain has been awarded, been recognised internationally and further been featured at the International magazine," Ameera Ismail Past President of Rotary club of Sulmaniya, while talking about the project to *DT News*.

The initiative, which received many global accolades was also featured in the July 2017 issue of the Rotarian magazine, which is distributed globally to all Rotary clubs.

Commenting on the project, Sebhat Isik present vice president said, "The green house project was extremely beneficial as it was an amazing learning experience



for the special need kids. We are constantly aiming towards working with various stakeholders to benefit the society and further we have many other projects coming in the future where we could give back to the society."

"The main idea behind this project was to make the special needs kids lead a normal day to day life, bring them out of the closed doors and give them a new experience," said Ameera Ismail.

The project took almost nine months to complete. It started with the seeding in the

month of September 2016 at the Al Jasra Rotary Farm.

Around 50 special needs children from the Society For The Blind, the Al Rahma Centre, and the Bahrain Down Syndrome Society took part in the project and planted vegetables like tomatoes, cucumber, cabbage, pumpkin and bell peppers at the farm.

"On the day of harvest, we took the kids back to the farm and it was such an amazing feeling to see them so delighted with this experience," she

The produce, following the harvest in January 2017, were sold in the local farmers market by the children.

"We went to the farmers market for four consecutive Saturdays, with a few kids from these societies. The kids were happy as they were selling the products, dealing with people and welcoming them," she said.

The club managed to sell the products for more than BD2000 which in return was donated back to these societies.







IT roles in future to be more challenging

T roles in the future will be more challenging, according to IT service management (ITSM) professionals who responded to a recent survey.

The survey, conducted by ManageEngine in collaboration with ITSM.tools, showed that ITSM professionals are expecting the industry to become more challenging.

The survey conducted in Bahrain consisted of ten questions that focused on the opportunities and challenges ITSM will see in the future. Eighty-two per cent of ITSM professionals believe that the IT roles of tomorrow will be more challenging — and the majority of the workforce currently feels undervalued by management.

Cloud technology continues to enjoy positive feedback from ITSM professionals in spite of a major outage. Artificial intelligence (AI) isn't seen as a major job disruptor yet, with only 16 per cent of respondents

saying it will affect IT jobs. With an incoming millennial workforce, 77 per cent of ITSM professionals believe that IT teams will have to do more to manage the expectation gap between younger and older employees.

"With a total of 82 per cent of respondents believing that working in IT will get harder over the next three years.

Only 15 per cent of survey respondents didn't think that their life would get harder. As to why there's a higher response for "Yes, for some IT roles" than "Yes, for all IT roles" - this might reflect that some IT roles are getting harder, or it might just be the very-human assumption that "the grass is always greener on the other side of the fence. With respondents thinking that they are in a particularly difficult role versus their peers. For instance, service desk agents are usually under far greater scrutiny (and pressure) in terms of performance metrics and targets than most other, if not all, IT roles. Whereas in some areas, such as the management of legacy IT systems, roles might be viewed as being under less pressure and less likely to change," the report stated.

"The ITSM industry is continually evolving in response to its micro and macro influencers, like technology, people, practices and government regulations. Being aware of potential future challenges and opportunities

helps ITSM professionals stay relevant and responsive to changing landscapes in IT and business, giving their organizations a competitive edge," said Rajesh Ganesan, director of product management at ManageEngine.

"It's interesting — and worrying — that 82 per cent of survey respondents believe that working in IT will get harder over the next three years. There are multiple root causes, including: nearly two-thirds of respondents think that the current local and global political climate is adversely affecting IT recruitment; only 24 per cent of respondents think that existing ITSM best practices have kept up with the changing IT and business landscapes; and 77 per cent of respondents think that there is still more to be done to meet the expectations of millennial employees. Ultimately, as an industry, we still need to invest more in getting modern IT support right," said Stephen Mann, principal analyst and content director at ITSM.tools.

Bahrain's Judicial Committee for the Settlement of Stalled Real Estate Projects, has announced that the Amwaj Gateway development project will be auctioned publicly.

The Committee, which has judicial prerogatives, said that the decision to offer the Amwaj Gateway project for auction came after exhausting all possibilities for a cordial settlement as per the procedures stipulated by decree law 66 for 2014, and was made following extensive consultation with developers

and stakeholders. This follows the Committee's previous success in finding solutions for real estate projects in Bahrain, including most recently the Juffair Views project.

The panel has announced the appointment of Cluttons, the leading international real estate consultant, and Mazad, the Bahrain-based public auction specialist, to organise and manage the public auction. The Amwaj Gateway development covers 33,391 square meters of land and will have a total builtup area of around 190,000 square meters once completed. The project consists of 20-storey twin-towers which accommodate 384 apartments and a two-storey building comprising of 93 townhouses. The development also includes a 143-room hotel tower.

"We have been appointed alongside Mazad to organise and manage the Amwaj Gateway and to be working with the Judicial Committee for the Settlement of Stalled Real Estate Projects going forward. The Committee's actions will no doubt translate into increased confidence levels in Bahrain's real estate market." said Harry Goodson-Wickes. Head of Cluttons Bahrain.

N.Korea support: US slaps sanctions n Chinese, Russians

Washington

The United States yesterday slapped sanctions on 16 Chinese and Russian individuals and companies, accusing them of supporting North Korea's nuclear program and attempting to evade US sanctions.

The sanctions are part of a broader US effort to disrupt the flow of cash funding North Korean weapon's programs and target companies that have dealt in natural resources such as coal and minerals or engaged in financial transactions for North Korean interests.

"It is unacceptable for individuals and companies in China, Russia, and elsewhere to enable North Korea to generate income used to develop weapons of mass destruction and destabilize the region," Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin said in a statement.

The move follows a war of words between Washington and Pyongyang over recent missile tests that show North Korea is capable of reaching the US mainland.

President Donald Trump earlier

this month said he would respond to North Korea's nuclear threat with "fire and fury."

Also this month, Russia and China both voted to toughen UN sanctions on North Korea.

Trump has urged Beijing, North Korea's only major ally, to bring greater pressure to bear in reigning in the reclusive state's nuclear efforts, suggesting that the United States may offer concessions on trade in return.

Targets of sanctions

The sanctions unveiled Tuesday effectively block those targeted from accessing much of the global financial system and freeze any US assets as well.

Among those hit by the sanctions was Russian national Ruben Kirakosyan and his Moscow-based company Gefest-M LLC, which the Treasury Department accuses of procuring metals for a sanctionsbarred company involved in North Korea's nuclear weapons program known as Korean Tangun Trading Corp. Also targeted is China's

Dandong Rich Earth Trading Co. Ltd., which the United States says has acted on behalf of North Korea's General Bureau of Atomic Energy -responsible for the North's nuclear program -- and has facilitated prohibited North Korean exports of vanadium ore.

A third company, Mingzheng International Trading Limited, which maintains offices in Hong Kong and mainland China, was in fact a front for Foreign Trade Bank, North Korea's main foreign exchange bank, the Treasury Department said.

The Treasury Department said three Chinese companies -- Dandong Zhicheng Metallic Materials Co. Ltd., JinHou International Holding Co. Ltd., and Dandong Tianfu Trade Co. Ltd -- had collectively imported nearly a half billion dollars' worth of North Korean coal between 2013 and 2016.

The department also sanctioned Dandong Zhicheng's director Chi Yupeng, a Chinese national accused of moving cash for North Korean interests. (*AFP*)

Headless torso 'could be' journalist from submarine

The headless torso of a woman found floating in Danish waters could be that of a Swedish journalist who authorities believe died aboard an inventor's homemade submarine, police said Tuesday.

In a grisly case that has captured public imagination in both countries, Danish inventor Peter Madsen has been accused of the negligent manslaughter of Kim Wall.

Police probing the disappearance of Wall -- who hasn't been seen since she was observed aboard the 60-foot (18-metre) Nautilus on the evening of August 10 -- said Monday they had found a torso missing its head and limbs in Koge Bay, south of Copenhagen.

"The length of the torso means we cannot rule out that it could be Kim Wall, but we don't know yet," Copenhagen homicide chief Jens Moller Jensen said in a video message released on Twitter.

He said DNA samples had been taken from the torso and would be compared with Wall's. Police were to receive the results on Wednesday.

Jensen said the body's arms, legs and head had been "deliberately cut off".

Madsen, whose website describes him as an "inventepreneur", had initially told authorities that he dropped Wall off on an island late on the evening of August 10.

He then changed his story several days later when he appeared in court, saying Wall died in an accident on board and that he dumped the body at sea in an undefined location of the Koge Bay.


Search crews found the missing sub on August 11 in Koge Bay, and Madsen was rescued from the vessel, alone, just before it sank.

Police have since said they believe Madsen "deliberately"

sank the sub. It was brought to the surface and searched, but found to be empty.

Wall was a 30-year-old freelance journalist who had reported for The Guardian and The New York Times. A graduate of the Columbia Journalism School, she was based between New York and China.

She had met with Madsen to interview him for a feature story she was writing.

Photos of the two emerged

online standing next to each other in the sub's tower. Wearing an orange fleece and with her long auburn hair tied in a topknot, she appeared to be smiling.



Erdogan vows to thwart any 'Kurdish state'

President Recep Tayyip Erdogan yesterday vowed Turkey would thwart any attempt by a Kurdish militia it deems "terrorists" to carve out a Kurdish state in northern Syria.

Ankara views the Kurdish Peoples' Protection Units (YPG) and the Kurdish Democratic Party (PYD) as a terror group. But the United States is closely allied with the groups' fighters in the battle against jihadists in Syria.

"We do not and will never allow a so-called state to be established by the PYD, YPG in northern Syria," Erdogan said in a speech in Ankara.

"They want to establish terror corridor in northern Syria reaching the Mediterranean," the president

The Syrian Kurdish groups have two "cantons" in Syria's northeast as well as the Afrin region to the west.

Erdogan added that Turkey would continue to fight against terror organisations "wherever we find them", referring to "wherever the YPG which Turkey says is the Syrian affiliate of the outlawed Kurdistan Workers' Party (PKK). The PKK is



proscribed as a terror group by Turkey, the US and the European Union. It has waged an insurgency against the Turkish state since 1984 during which over 40,000 people have been killed.

In August last year, Turkey launched a cross-border operation in northern Syria, aimed at clearing the border zone of both YPG fighters and iihadists.

There has been speculation Ankara may be planning to extend an operation against the YPG to clear it from the town of Afrin, where Erdogan has said its presence is a "threat" for Turkey.

Erdogan on Monday said a joint operation with Iran against Kurdish militants "pose a threat," which

"We have not planned any operations outside Iran's borders," said a statement from the Guards' regional ground forces headquarters published by the ISNA news agency.

"But as always we will strongly confront any group, team or person who wants to penetrate into Iran's territory for anti-security or terrorist operations," it added.

Iraqi forces retake three districts of IS bastion

yesterdav Iraqi forces yesterday recaptured from the Islamic forces State group the first three districts of jihadist bastion Tal Afar as the Pentagon chief visited Baghdad in a show of support.

The United Nations said thousands of civilians had fled Tal Afar in the two days since the start of the broad offensive backed by the US-led coalition fighting IS.

In remarks in Baghdad after meeting Prime Minister Haider al-Abadi, US Defence Secretary Jim Mattis said the jihadists were "on the run".

"Cities have been liberated, people freed from ISIS, from Daesh," Mattis said, using alternative names for IS.

The jihadists had not been able "to stand up to our team in combat, and they have not retaken one inch of ground that they lost", he said.

Iraqi troops backed by a US-led international coalition routed IS in Mosul in July after a gruelling nine-month fight for Iraq's second city.

They launched an offensive Sunday to recapture Tal Afar, once a key IS supply hub between Mosul -- around 70 kilometres (45 miles) further east -- and the Syrian border to the west. IS fighters inside Tal Afar, estimated to number around 1,000, responded with artillery fire Tuesday as Iraqi forces massed outside the city.

At least 250 US-led air strikes have pounded the Syrian city of Raqa and surrounding territory in the past week, the coalition fighting the Islamic State group said Tuesday.

Coalition spokesman Colonel Ryan Dillon said that the air raids targeted the greater Raqa area.

Activists and monitoring groups have reported that intensifying coalition bombardment of the city has left scores of civilians dead.

The Britain-based Syrian Observatory for Human Rights said at least 42 civilians had been killed in US-led strikes on Raqa Monday, taking the civilian toll for the past eight days to 167.

Dillon told AFP that the allegations would be taken seriously and investigated.

Since a US-backed offensive ousted IS from Mosul in neighbouring Iraq in July, the coalition has had more available aircraft to strike Raqa, he added.

German minister says Erdogan backers threatened his wife

erman Foreign Minister Sigmar Gabriel has accused supporters of Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan of threating his wife amid a festering diplomatic crisis.

He said that Erdogan's strident style "had apparently led some to feel motivated to try to threaten and harass my

wife," in comments broadcast Tuesday by news channel NTV.

"Of course, this is a terrible outcome," he said without giving further details, at a time when relations between the NATO allies have plunged to their lowest point in years.

Saturday, Erdogan On launched a bitter personal attack on Gabriel, who has frequently criticised the president's leadership and his treatment of opponents and critics.

"Who are you to talk to the president of Turkey?" Erdogan said in a televised speech. "Know your limits. He is trying to teach us a lesson... How long have you been in politics? How old are you?"

The insurance market in the Kingdom continued to enjoy positive growth in the year 2016, driven mainly by the general insurance (including Medical insurance) segment, which contributed 81 per cent to the gross premiums.

The increase, according to the Central Bank of Bahrain. was mainly due to a surge in the Medical insurance sector, which witnessed a growth of almost 19pc in gross premiums/contributions to register BD62.11 million (US\$164.75m) in 2016 compared to BD52.20m (US\$138.50m) in 2015. This represents almost 23pc of the total premiums/ contributions written in the market in 2016.

"Due to the well established regulatory regime, a number of leading international companies insurance established their insurance and reinsurance operations in Bahrain both in Conventional and Takaful, which has further consolidated Bahrain's profile as a financial centre. The increase of insurance ancillary services in Bahrain provides an important source of synergy to these international companies," said Fouad A.Wahid Abdulla - Director, Insurance Supervision Directorate, at

"The CBB continues to further enhance its regulatory framework to be in line with the best international financial standards and boost the confidence of the insurance licensees and general public,' added Wahid Abdulla.





EU probes Bayer's Monsanto takeover

Brussels

The European Commission said yesterday it was opening an in-depth investigation into the proposed \$66-billion (56-billion-euro) takeover of US seed and pesticide supplier Monsanto by Germany's Bayer, citing concerns it may reduce competition in key products for farmers.

"Seeds and pesticide products are essential for farmers and ultimately consumers," said EU Competition Commissioner Margrethe Vestager.

"We need to ensure effective competition so that farmers can have access to innovative products, better quality and also purchase products at competitive prices."

After a months-long pursuit in which it raised its offer price

several times, Bayer won over Monsanto's management in September 2016 for the buyout that would create the world's largest integrated pesticides

But the deal has provoked criticism from environmental groups, because of Monsanto's

and seeds company.

long history of promoting genetically modified crops.

The European Commission expressed concern that Bayer produces one of the few alternatives to Monsanto's product glyphosate, which it said is the most sold non-



Urban lighting linked to breast cancer

A new U.S. study has found that exposure to city lights might increase the risk of breast cancer. Researchers tracked almost 110,000 U.S. women, followed as part of a study of nurses from 1989-2013. The study found a direct relationship between a woman's neighbourhood nighttime light level before diagnosis and her later risk of developing breast cancer: the higher the light level, the higher the risk. (Xinhua)



Talk therapy works in some PTSD cases

A study says that a talk therapy program may help people who have served in the U.S. military and have killed in combat and suffer from nightmares, hypervigilance to perceived threats and numbness to people and activities that once made them happy. The study involved 33 veterans with post-traumatic stress disorder and enrolled them in one-on-one sessions.

Death rates higher for alternative' cancer cures

People who choose alternative cures for common cancers are up to five times more likely to die compared to those opting for standard treatments, the lead scientist of a new study said.

The risk of death five years after diagnosis "was highest for breast and colon cancer," said lead author Skyler Johnson from the Yale School of Medicine in New Haven, Connecticut -- 5.6 and 4.6 times greater respectively.

Lung cancer patients who spurned surgery, radiation or chemotherapy in favour of herbs and vitamin, homoeopathy, special diets or other unorthodox therapies were more than twice as likely to die over the same period, he reported last week in the Journal of the National Cancer Institute.

Five-year survival rates for prostate cancer remained high -- around 90 percent for both conventional and alternative treatments, but this was not necessarily evidence that the alternative therapies were as effective.

"Prostate cancer usually grows very slowly in the early stages so few people die, Johnson explained by email.

Faced with poor prognoses or painful courses of chemotherapy, which can cause severe nausea and weakness, many cancer patients place their faith in a wide range of treatments dismissed by most medical doctors as useless at best.

These include probiotics, vitamins and minerals; traditional Indian and Chinese methods such as Ayurvedic medicine and acupuncture; homoeopathy and naturopathy; chiropractic or osteopathic manipulation; as well as yoga, Tai Qi and Qi Gong, all of which involve breath control.

Mind-over-matter approaches also include prayer, meditation, and guided imagery, in which one visualises one's cancer in order to overcome it.

Researchers led by Johnson identified 281 people in the United States with the four most common types of cancer -- breast, prostate, lung and



A standard cancer treatment colon -- who turned towards one or more of these unproven treatments when diagnosed.

The team compared their

health outcomes with those of 560 other cancer patients of comparable age, also taking into account race and different health factors.

On average, the first group were 2.5 times more likely to die within five years of

diagnosis.
"For several reasons,
I believe this may be an underestimate," Johnson said.

To begin with, the data only covered only initial treatment, which means that some of the patients who first sought out alternative cures may have switched to standard treatments as their disease progressed, thus prolonging their lives.

It is also likely, he added, that the non-conventional medicine cohort was healthier, younger and had higher income and education -attributes that translate into better survival rates.

"We don't know the exact number of people that make the decision to pursue alternative medicine instead of conventional cancer treatment," Johnson said.

Patients are reluctant to confide in doctors who are likely to frown upon their choices, he added.

But, he noted, all the miracle cancer cures on offer probably add up to a multi-billion dollar business.

2 lung diseases killed 3.6m in 2015



The two most common chronic lung diseases claimed 3.6 million lives worldwide in 2015, according to a tally published in The Lancet Respiratory Medicine.

About 3.2 million people succumbed that year to chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), caused mainly by smoking and pollution, while 400,000 people died from asthma.

COPD is a group of lung conditions -including emphysema and bronchitis -- that make it difficult to

Asthma is twice as prevalent, but COPD is eight times more deadly, the study found.

Both diseases can be treated affordably, but many sufferers are often left undiagnosed, misdiagnosed or under-treated.

COPD was the fourth-ranked cause of death worldwide in 2015, according to the World Health Organization, behind heart disease (nine million), stroke (six million) and lower respiratory infections (just over 3.2 million).

Researchers led by Theo Vos, a professor at the Institute of Health Metrics and Evaluation at the University of Washington, analysed data from 188 countries to estimate, in each one, the number of cases and deaths annually from 1990 to 2015.

COPD prevalence and death rates declined over that period, but the overall numbers increased -- with nearly 12 percent more deaths -- because of population growth.

For asthma, prevalence went up by almost 13 percent to 358 million people worldwide, but the number of deaths dropped by more than a quarter.

"These diseases have received less attention than other prominent noncommunicable diseases like cardiovascular disease, cancer or diabetes," Vos said in a statement.

The countries with the highest concentration of people disabled by COPD in 2015 were Papua New Guinea, India, Lesotho and Nepal, the study showed. (AFP)







Remains of sailors found on collided warship

ivers have found the remains of some of the 10 sailors who went missing when a US destroyer collided with a tanker off Singapore, the navy said yesterday, the latest deadly accident involving an American warship.

The US Navy has announced a fleet-wide global investigation after the incident Monday involving the USS John S. McCain and the merchant vessel, which left a gaping gash in the destroyer's hull.

But Admiral Scott Swift, commander of the US Pacific Fleet, praised the

ship and saving lives, in the second collision involving an American warship in two months

The accident -- which also left five sailors injured -- happened before dawn in busy shipping lanes around the Strait of Singapore, and sent water flooding into the ship.

A massive search involving planes and aircraft was launched and US Navy divers joined the hunt yesterday, scouring the ship's flooded compartments.

Speaking in Singapore, Swift said "the divers were able to sealed compartments during their search today", without saying how many bodies were found.

A US Navy statement confirmed he was referring to remains of some of the missing

Swift said Malaysian authorities had also found a body and were sending it to the US Navy for identification. The Malaysian navy said the body was found eight nautical miles northwest of the accident

The admiral said the search and rescue effort, involving several countries, would continue, adding: "We're always hopeful that there are survivors.

The McCain's crew were "tough, and they are resilient", Swift said. "It is clear that their damage control efforts saved their ship and saved lives.'

It was the second fatal collision in two months -- after the USS Fitzgerald collided with a Philippine-flagged cargo ship off Japan in June and left seven sailors dead -and the fourth accident in the Pacific this year involving an American warship.

ky-gazers stood transfixed across North America Monday as the Sun vanished behind the Moon in a rare total eclipse that swept the continent coast-to-coast for the first time in nearly a century.

Millions of die-hard eclipse chasers and amateur star watchers alike converged in cities along the path of totality, a 70-mile (113-kilometer) wide swath cutting through 14 US states, where the Moon briefly blocked out all light from the Sun.

"It was incredibly beautiful. I am moved to tears," said Heather Riser, a 54-year-old librarian from Virginia, sitting on a blanket in Charleston's grassy Waterfront Park where thousands had gathered to

Festivals, rooftop parties, weddings, camping trips and astronomy meetups were held nationwide for what was likely most heavily photographed and documented eclipse in modern times, thanks to the era of social

The blackest part of the shadow, known as totality because the Moon blocks all the Sun's light from the Earth, began over Lincoln Beach, Oregon at 1716 GMT.

Crowds whooped and cheered at the first sign of darkness.

Just inland, more than 100,000 people gathered at Madras, Oregon typically a town of 7,000 -- in what experts described as perfect viewing conditions.

"I've wanted to see one of these my whole life, since I've been studying astronomy, since I was a kid," said Christine Sapio, a science professor. "I thought I was prepared for it -- I totally wasn't."

"I was shaking, I was crying. I was just totally taken aback by just how beautiful it was.'

In Los Angeles, "oohs and aahs" emanated from the crowd of thousands gathered at the Griffith Observatory in the hills above the city as the partial eclipse began.

Many had hiked to avoid massive traffic jams. Some watchers had fashioned their own pinhole projectors out of cardboard and scotch tape. Others watched while wearing special, dark solar eclipse

'Just awesome'

In downtown Charleston, South Carolina, the last point in the path of totality, crowds of tourists -- some in special eclipse T-shirts and starprinted trousers -- staked out prime spots on the bustling city's storied waterfront.

Forecasts of thunderstorms threatened to block the view, but the eclipse managed to peek through the wispy clouds.

Onlookers in Waterfront Park screamed and cheered as the sky went dark in the middle of the afternoon. streetlamps came on, and a rumble of thunder could be heard in the distance.

"It was just awesome," said Dave Lichtenauer, age 63, a retired electrical engineer, describing the event as "partially spiritual."

"The crowd here was very into it," he added, remarking on the diversity and peacefulness of the masses

"You don't get many chances to experience that.

One bar had installed outdoor speakers blasting Bonnie Tyler's mega-hit "Total Eclipse of the Heart" which she performed live on a cruise ship sailing through the path of totality.

The unofficial anthem for the celestial show soared to the top of the iTunes charts, outdoing even recordsmashing pop song "Despacito."

Cloudy weather and thunderstorms dashed viewers' hopes of seeing the eclipse in some places, including Missouri.

Some of the clearest views were along the West Coast.

'Don't look

In the US capital, where 81 percent totality occurred, Donald Trump watched the partial eclipse from the White House with his wife Melania and son Barron -- although the president appeared to have missed the memo on eclipse do's and don'ts.

At one point, Trump glanced skyward without protective eyewear -- a big no-no, according to experts. "Don't look," an aide shouted to him. He later donned glasses.

Eclipse watchers also flocked to Washington's National Air and Space Museum, where solar telescopes were set up for the occasion.

In Mexico, where there was a partial eclipse, astronomy buffs set up telescopes fitted with special sun filters in parks and squares in various

Eclipse watchers often describe being overcome by emotion as the sky goes black, birds return to their nests and the air chills

"It is such an incredible, sensoryoverload kind of event," eclipsechaser Fred Espenak, a retired NASA astrophysicist, told AFP of the first total solar eclipse he saw in the United States back in 1970.

Scientists planned to study the eclipse to learn more about the super-

hot corona, or outer atmosphere of the Sun.

"It is really exciting to see so many people interested in nature and science and this amazing phenomenon," said Kwayera Davis, an adjunct professor of astronomy at the College of Charleston.

'Sharing a cosmic event'

After weeks of turmoil triggered by the race-fueled violence in Charlottesville, Virginia, some commentators welcomed the national feel-good moment afforded by the Great American Eclipse.

"The divided United States of America will unite today, sharing a cosmic event predicted by the methods and tools of science," tweeted the US astrophysicist Neil DeGrasse Tyson -- who earlier advised people to "put down your smartphone and experience this one emotionally, psychologically, physically."

The CEO of Goldman Sachs, Lloyd Blankfein, drew a more somber parallel between the day's spectacle and the country's challenges.

"Wish the moon wasn't the only thing casting a shadow across the country. We got through one, we'll get through the other," he tweeted.

Amessage in a bottle cast into the sea by a holidaying British couple on the island of Rhodes has washed up on the blockaded Gaza Strip, the fisherman who found it said yesterday.

Jihad al-Soltan retrieved the bottle while fishing on August 15.

Using the email address supplied, his family contacted the senders of the letter, Bethany Wright and her boyfriend Zac Marriner.

They had thrown the bottle into the sea during a romantic

holiday on the Greek island two months earlier.

"We are currently on holiday in Rhodes and we would love to know how far this bottle got -- even if it's just the next beach," the note

It had travelled a lot around further, kilometres (500 miles), before Soltan retrieved it.

"They never expected it to reach Gaza!" he said.

The crowded coastal territory is largely closed off to the world under a crippling, decade-long Israeli blockade aimed at

isolating Hamas, the Islamist movement which runs the territory.

Israel and Hamas have fought three wars since 2008.

Egypt, the only other country that shares a border with Gaza, has also largely sealed its frontier.

Fishing off the northern part of the strip, adjacent to Israel, is limited to six nautical miles offshore and the Israeli navy regularly fires at Palestinians at the zone's outer limit.

Post to Gaza usually goes through Israeli security measures. (AFP)

China defends Pakistan against Trump criticism

hina yesterday defended its friend Pakistan against strong criticism by Donald Trump that the country is not doing enough to counter terrorism.

In a major speech outlining US policy on Afghanistan, the American president slammed Islamabad for offering safe haven to "agents of chaos".

Successive administrations have criticised Pakistan for links with the Taliban and for

harbouring leading jihadists - like Osama bin Laden.

"We have been paying Pakistan billions billions of dollars at the same time they are housing the very terrorists that we are fighting," Trump said, warning that vital aid could be cut.

Chinese foreign But ministry spokeswoman Hua Chunying took a contrary view, telling reporters that Pakistan "has made great sacrifices and contributions to fighting terrorism".

Rare white koala born at Australian zoo

Akoala at an Australian zoo has given birth to a rare white joey, staff announced yesterday.

Handlers at the Australia Zoo on Queensland's Sunshine Coast say the pale animal born in January owes its white fur to a recessive gene inherited from mother Tia.

The mother has given birth to light-coloured joeys in the past.

"In veterinary science it's often referred to as

the 'silvering gene' where animals are born with white or very pale fur and, just like baby teeth, they eventually shed their baby fur and the regular adult colouration comes through," said the zoo's wildlife hospital director Rosie Booth in a statement.

Koala fur differs in colour -- from light grey to brown -- depending on their environment. Animals in the south of Australia tend to have thicker and darker fur than those in the north.

India's top court bans instant divorce

New Delhi

India's top court yesterday banned a practice that allows men to divorce their wives instantly.

The Supreme Court ruled that the practice of "triple talaq", whereby Muslim men can divorce their wives by reciting the word talaq (divorce) three times, was both unconstitutional and

Victims including Shayara Bano, whose husband used triple talaq to divorce her in 2015, had approached India's highest court to ask for a

A panel of five male judges

from India's major faiths -- Hinduism, Christianity, Sikhism Zoroastrianism -- said triple talaq was "not integral to religious practice and violates constitutional morality".

They said it was "manifestly arbitrary" to allow a man to "break down (a) marriage whimsically and capriciously".

"What is sinful under religion cannot be valid under law," said the judges.

Bano, who suffered a nervous breakdown after her divorce, said it was a "historic occasion" for Muslim

Fukushima reactor 'ice wall' nearly finished

Fukushima's operator yesterday started freezing operator the last section of a \$320 million ice wall designed to combat widespread water contamination at the site of the worst nuclear accident in a generation.

Tokyo Electric Power (TEPCO) began pumping coolant into the remaining seven metres (23 feet) of its 1.5-kilometre underground wall which encircles the four reactors along Japan's northeast coast.

Underground

circulate the coolant and freeze soil around the buildings.

The 30-metre deep wall is

designed to block underground water from nearby mountains from flowing into the shattered

complex and then seeping into the Pacific.

It is reportedly expected to

until the wall is completely frozen.

The huge utility has been building the barrier since March 2016 with the government picking up its 34.5 billion yen (\$320 million) price

Even now, with the ice wall almost complete, about 140 tonnes of underground water flows into the plant daily, forcing the company to pump it out and store it in on-site

"When the ice wall is completed, we estimate that water flowing into the complex will be less than 100 tonnes," a company spokesman said.

But some experts have cast doubt on the ice wall, and the country's Nuclear Regulation Authority said it has not yet done an independent analysis.

"We doubt the ice wall is going to be as effective as TEPCO claims it will be," said an NRA official who spoke on condition of anonymity.

"We're going to monitor its progress after it is finished to check the impact."

Egyptian authorities
have arrested 12 people including doctors and nurses suspected of belonging to a "large criminal network specialised in trading human organs", the interior ministry said Tuesday.

Hundreds of poor Egyptians sell their kidneys Hundreds of and livers each year to be able to buy food or pay off debts, according to the United Nations.

The network "agreed with Egyptians to transfer some of their organs to foreign patients in exchange for large

sums of money, exploiting people's financial need," the interior ministry said.

Among those arrested were three doctors, four nurses, three hospital workers and two agents, it said in a

Some were arrested "while they were carrying out an operation to remove the kidneys and part of the liver of a citizen in a private hospital" in Giza province, part of Greater

The man had sold the organs for \$10,000 (8,500 euros). Those operating on him were planning to implant the organs in a patient, the ministry said.

It did not give further details on the man's condition or say when the arrests took place, but added that the hospital had been closed pending an investigation.

World The Health Organization in 2010 ranked Egypt among the top five countries in the world trading illegally in organs.

Egypt's parliament passed a law that year banning commercial trade in organs as well as transplants between Egyptians and foreigners,

except between husbands and wives.

The law aimed to regulate organ transplants and curb illegal trafficking and medical tourism for such operations.

In 2012, then-United Nations refugee agency chief Antonio Guterres warned that migrants in Egypt's Sinai peninsula were being killed for their organs.

Authorities in December arrested 25 people, including doctors and university professors, suspected of being part of an organ trading network. (AFP)

US teen pleads guilty to internet villain-inspired attack

ne of two girls accused with stabbing a friend inspired by a fictitious internet character pleaded guilty to a reduced attempted homicide charge Monday in a Wisconsin court.

Anissa Weier, who is now 15 but was 12 years old at the time of the 2014 crime, agreed to plea to a lesser charge of second-degree homicide as party to a crime, with use of a deadly weapon.

She originally faced firstdegree intentional homicide. She will stand trial next month to determine if she is legally responsible considering her mental health condition.

She told the court she participated in the attack, because she feared the internet character Slender Man -- a villain featured on a horror website -- would otherwise hurt her and her family, according to US media.

Both she and her alleged accomplice Morgan Geyser are accused of stabbing their friend Payton Leutner 19 times at a park. A bicyclist found Leutner and helped her get to a hospital.

Chile Constitutional court clears way to ease abortion ban

hile's Constitutional Court ⊿on Monday approved a bill to decriminalize abortion in certain cases, a move decried by conservative opponents but hailed by Socialist President Michelle Bachelet as a victory for women's rights.

The bill will allow abortion in cases of rape, threat to the mother's life or deadly birth defects.

Judges voted by six to four to dismiss challenges brought by conservative parties opposed to the reform, the court's secretary-general Rodrigo Pica told a news conference.

The bill can now be signed into law by the socialist president, who launched the reform in 2015.

Citizens for and against the reform staged rowdy demonstrations near the court during its deliberations.

Supporters of the bill celebrated outside the court after the ruling, yelling their thanks to Bachelet.

Rival demonstrators shouted curses, calling those behind the reform "murderers."

Alleged Barcelona killer was 'a normal factory worker'

The alleged Barcelona attacker who was killed Monday grew up in a small Catalan town where he seemed "nicely integrated" like his younger brother who also died as part of the same terror cell, residents said.

Younes Abouyaaqoub, a 22-year-old Moroccan, was shot by police not far from Barcelona in northeastern Spain after a four-day manhunt

for the man who allegedly drove a van through crowds in the popular Mediterranean

city, killing 13. He didn't stop there, fleeing his vehicle on foot after Thursday's attack, hijacking a car and stabbing its driver to make his getaway.

"I'm happy and sad all at once," Hassan Azzidi, a Moroccan factory worker, said in the Catalan town of Ripoll where many members of the

terror cell that planned the Barcelona attack and another car rampage in the seaside resort of Cambrils came from.

"This had to end, because we're living as if in a war, but at the same time, someone brainwashed such a young boy.

"Younes lived normally, he worked in a factory, he had everything... I don't know how they manage to eat their brains.

Police suspect an imam of

radicalising Abouyaaqoub, his younger brother Houssein and nine other young men.

The imam Abdelbaki Es Satty died in an explosion believed to have been accidentally detonated by the suspects themselves in their bomb factory in the seaside town of Alcanar, also in Catalonia.

Other suspects have either been killed by police or detained.

Barca sues Neymar Lionel Mess

Seeks \$10 million in damages over contract breach

Barcelona

Barcelona are seeking at least 8.5 million euros (\$10 million) in compensation from Neymar for breach of contract, the club said on Tuesday as the bitter fallout rumbles on from his world record 222 million-euro move to Paris Saint-Germain

The move comes after Barcelona refused to pay a separate 26 million-euro bonus due to Neymar for signing a five-year contract renewal last year.

"In the lawsuit, the club demands the player return the already paid sum for his contract renewal as he has not completed his contract; 8.5 million euros in damages; and an additional 10 percent because of delayed payment," Barcelona said in a statement.

Despite being under contract, Barcelona were powerless to stop his move to PSG earlier this month as the French side met the buyout

clause in his contract.

The Catalan giants have also passed the claim onto FIFA and the French Football Federation via the Spanish Football Federation to take what they see as "the appropriate legal effects".

Moreover, Barca urged PSG to pay the amount they are seeking if Neymar -- who is reported to earn 30 million euros a year after tax for the next five years in Paris -- isn't able to meet their demands.

The club's latest move comes two days after Neymar fiercely criticised Barcelona's under-fire board after scoring twice in a stunning home debut as PSG beat Toulouse 6-2 on Sunday.

"There are people in charge that shouldn't be there," Neymar told reporters.

"Barca deserve much more and everyone knows that."

The split between Barca's top players and board was evidenced as a smiling Neymar posted photos on his Instagram page of the Brazilian visiting former teammates including Lionel Messi, Luis Suarez, Gerard Pique and Ivan Rakitic on Tuesday.

"Friends that I missed," Neymar wrote alongside a picture of him being embraced by Messi and Suarez.

Messi is yet to formally sign a new contract, the terms of which were agreed back in July, provoking speculation over his future.

Barca president Josep Maria Bartomeu, former president Sandro Rosell, Neymar and his parents are to face trial for fraud and corruption in Spain over the murky transfer that brought the player from Santos to Barca in 2013.

Investment company DIS -- who owned 40 percent of Neymar's sporting rights at the time of the transfer -believe they were cheated out of their real share of the deal.

Ronaldo cries injustice as appeal rejected

ristiano Ronaldo reiterated his anger at what he described as the "incomprehensible decision" to reject his final appeal against a five-match ban on Tuesday.

Spain's administrative sports court (TAD) dismissed Real Madrid's latest appeal for the suspension handed out to the World Player of the Year for pushing a referee after being sentoff in the first leg of the Spanish Super Cup against Barcelona.

incomprehensible "Another decision," Ronaldo posted to his over 57 million Twitter followers.

"Injustices will not knock me down. I will come back stronger.

"Thanks to those who have supported me."

Ronaldo was controversially shown a second yellow card for diving after coming off the bench to score as Real won the first leg of the Spanish Super Cup 3-1 away to Barcelona. The Portugal captain was handed a one-match ban for the 10th red card of his career and a further four-game suspension for pushing referee Ricardo de Burgos Bengoetxea in protest.

Ronaldo blasted his treatment by the Spanish Football Federation as "persecution" on his Instagram account after his first appeal was rejected last week.

"It seems to me exaggerated and ridiculous, this is called persecution!"

Ronaldo has already served two games of his suspension as Madrid completed a 5-1 aggregate win over Barcelona in the Super Cup second leg and as Real opened their La Liga campaign with a 3-0 win at Deportivo la Coruna.

Real will also be without their all-time top scorer for La Liga matches at home to Valencia and Levante and away at Real Sociedad.

However, Ronaldo will be free to play when the European champions begin their defence of the Champions League on September 12 or 13.
