#### Inquiry

The Public Prosecution opened an inquiry after the Anti-Cybercrime Directorate reported the clip.

The defendant was arrested on a prosecution order and sent to court in custody, where the sentence was handed down.

The chief of Cybercrime Prosecution said the Prosecution will continue to take legal steps, working with the security services and other bodies, to keep Bahrain's online space free of content that offends public morals.

Southern Municipal Council clears land for Al Buhair health centre

The aim is to cut the strain on nearby centres and spare residents the trek to other districts for routine care.

## **BSA** takes part in AI for climate global forum

His Excellency Mo-hammed Ibrahim Al Aseeri, CEO of the Bahrain Space Agency (BSA), participated in the AI for Climate Innovation Factory sessions 2025 organised by the International Telecommunication Union (ITU) in partnership with more than fifty international organisations.

The initiative comprised two sessions in which startups from various countries presented innovative solutions using artificial intelligence to address environmental and climate challenges, with the participation of prominent international experts and assessors.

Dr Al Aseeri said that the initiative represented an exceptional opportunity to review the latest developments in using AI to confront climate challenges, which align with the BSA's efforts to harness advanced space technologies in support of environmental sustainability.

He added that the initiative is directly linked to space technologies: it uses satellite data in AI applications for environmental monitoring; it develops innovative solutions for tracking emissions and climate changes using space techniques; and it emphasises the critical use of satellite imagery in training AI models to predict environmental

Packs of stray dogs roaming neighbourhoods have triggered new concern in Muharraq, with councillors set to demand firmer action on Monday.

Council member Fadhil Al Oud said the animals' spread in streets and housing areas is causing a nuisance and a direct risk to residents, spoiling the look of districts and adding to animal waste.

He warned of disease and parasites, a higher chance of minor children and older people in accidents for drivers and pedes- some spots. trians, and rising fear among

He said current steps have fallen short despite an annual spend of about BD209,000 on trapping, shelter and care.
