

Man City can write another chapter in European history, says Guardiola

Pep Guardiola admits Manchester City cannot compete with Real Madrid's European pedigree but says they can write a new chapter in the club's history in their Champions League semi-final against the Spanish giants.

La Liga leaders Real, who face City in the first leg at the Etihad Stadium on Tuesday, are the most successful team in European Cup history, having lifted the trophy 13 times.

In contrast City, who have been the dominant force in English domestic football over the past decade, appeared in

the Champions League final for the first time last year, losing to Chelsea.

"Being in the semi-final is so good," he said. "One day we will not be here because it's so demanding -- look at the big teams who are not here."

"I say to the players 'enjoy that moment'. You never know if we will be back here at any stage."

Guardiola said he would make a final decision on the fitness of defenders Kyle Walker and John Stones on Tuesday, admitting the pair were "doubts".

Despite the defeat, Lampard said he was delighted with the attitude of his players and that he was "more positive" about their chances of staying up.

Lampard said his players have to be "spot on" in their remaining six matches, where they face top four sides Chelsea and Arsenal.

"The whole club has to do that, there will be some negative chat (externally), but we've been in this fight since I've been here," Lampard added.

"If it goes to the end, let's stand up and take it to the end."

"There are 18 points to fight for, that is a lot of points. It is important for the players and fans and club not to get sucked into that in a negative way.

"Be realistic, yes -- but there are a lot of games for us to try to win."

No hard feelings with Ricciardo, says unlucky Sainz

Carlos Sainz said there were no hard feelings with Daniel Ricciardo after the Australian apologised for a collision that ended the Ferrari driver's race on the opening lap at Imola on Sunday.

Sainz spun into the gravel two corners into his team's home Emilia Romagna Grand Prix after being hit from behind by Ricciardo's McLaren at Tamburello.

It was the Spaniard's second successive retirement in four Formula One races.

In Australia two weeks earlier, he had retired on the second lap and Sainz also crashed in Friday's sprint qualifying at Imola.

"The first thing that he did (after the race) was coming to

the Ferrari box to apologise to me," Sainz told reporters. "The mechanics were all with me and we all thanked him for the gesture.

"That's why there's no hard feelings with Daniel. What happened with him could have

happened to anyone out there today but unfortunately it had to happen to me.

"It's how it is. The incident has really no mystery to it. What happened is very clear to everyone."

Sainz had been second to his

championship-leading team mate Charles Leclerc in the standings before the race but slipped to fifth overall with 38 points to the Monegasque's 86 from four rounds.

Leclerc could have been even further ahead but also spun off while chasing Red Bull's Sergio Perez, dropping from third place to eighth before recovering to sixth while Max Verstappen won from pole.

Leclerc made a slow start, dropping from second to fourth on the damp side of the track, and said he had been too greedy as he fought back later in the race and would learn from his costly mistake.

"Third was the best result we could have secured today, as our competitors were very strong," he said.
