His Royal Highness Prince Salman bin Hamad Al Khalifa, the Crown Prince, Deputy Supreme Commander and First Deputy Prime Minister, yesterday extended his condolences to the family of twin babies declared dead at the Salmaniya Medical Complex but were later found to be alive during their burial ceremony.

During yesterday's weekly Cabinet meeting, held remotely, and chaired by HRH the Crown Prince, he was updated on developments regarding the shocking incident at the hospital where the infants were born a week ago.

HRH the Crown Prince was briefed on measures taken by relevant authorities to produce the final report on the case, in preparation for taking the necessary legal and administrative measures, if any signs of negligence or error is proven.

The Cabinet congratulated HM the King,

HRH the Prime Minister, HRH the Crown Prince, and the citizens of Bahrain and the Arab and Islamic nations on the anniversary of Prophet Mohammed's birthday on Thursday.

On this occasion, the Cabinet recalled the honourable values and noble teachings of Islam, which espouse peace, love and goodness among humanity.

The Cabinet also welcomed the historic agreement between Sudan and Israel to establish relations, a major step towards achieving regional peace, stability and prosperity.

Likewise, the Cabinet welcomed the US's decision to remove Sudan from the list of countries sponsoring terrorism.

The Cabinet also welcomed the signing of the permanent ceasefire agreement in all parts of Libya, which was reached at the UN headquarters in Geneva.

During the meeting, the payment of 50 percent of Bahraini citizens' salaries working in parts of the private sector that are most adversely affected by the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic until the end of the year was approved.

The wages will be paid by the unemployment insurance account for a period of three months starting from October, in accordance with the rules and regulations specified by the Minister of Labour and Social Development.

The Cabinet approved proposals submitted by the Council of Representatives, which have already been enacted by the government over the past months.

The first proposal is related to supporting institutions most adversely affected by the COVID-19, while the second proposal is regarding the sterilisation of migrant workers' accommodations and raising awareness on precautionary measures to combat the virus.

The third proposal is regarding fees and renewal of commercial registrations for those businesses mostly adversely affected by the pandemic.

The Cabinet approved measures that will commence at the beginning of 2021 to permit volunteering for civilians working in the public and private sectors as part of the reserve force at the Bahrain Defence Force.

Four Bahrainis die from COVID

Four Bahrainis died yesterday from coronavirus (COVID-19), along with 278 new cases, the Health Ministry reported.

The casualties were two men, aged 54 and 65, and two women, 36 and 64, bringing the death toll in the Kingdom to 316.

The Ministry offered condolences to the family of the deceased.

There were also 356 new recoveries, increasing total survivors to 77,132.

As of yesterday, 67 were receiving treatment at various facilities, of which 24 people were in a critical condition and 3,061 stable.

Health authorities conducted a total of 10,035 tests yesterday.

The fresh infections included 91 expatriate workers, 182 contacts, and five travellers.

The total number of active cases in the Kingdom rose to 80,533.

Defamation of Prophet Mohammed condemned

The Supreme Council of Islamic Affairs (SCIA) has strongly condemned attempts to insult Prophet Mohammed, and categorical rejected any reference to Muslim symbols and sanctities to serve narrow agendas.

In a statement, the council said the defamation of prophets and his messengers reflects racism, hatred, extremism, violence and conflict, and undermines efforts to achieve coexistence and peace among people. It emphasised that provoking people and denigrating their sanctities and beliefs are unacceptable methods that cannot be tolerated.

The SCIA called for a serious, clear and urgent stance by all advocates of peace to preserve community security, respect religion, and protect people from falling into conflicts.

'Water' found on the moon

US scientists have discovered new evidence of water on the moon, they said in two articles published yesterday.

Molecular water was detected on the lunar surface, where areas were also found that trap water in the form of ice, researchers wrote in the Nature Astronomy journal.

The findings suggest that water is produced on the moon, or brought from outside sources, and is stored in the moon's polar regions.

Six-kilogram cancerous ovarian tumour removed
