Bahrain, the United Arab Emirates, and Kuwait voiced strong support to the Saudi position rejecting the negative, false and unacceptable assessment of the US intel report regarding the murder of Jamal Khashoggi.

"The government of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia completely rejects the negative, false and unacceptable assessment in the report about the kingdom's leadership, and notes that the report contained inaccurate information and conclusions," the Saudi foreign ministry said in a statement.

Bahrain's foreign ministry said the Kingdom rejects any attempt to "undermine" Saudi Arabia's sovereignty under the leadership of the Custodian of the Two Holy Mosques King Salman bin Abdulaziz Al Saud and Crown Prince in the efforts to enhance security and regional stability.

The foreign ministry also pointed out that Saudi already took "necessary measures against those responsible for murdering the journalist."

The UAE's foreign ministry "expressed its confidence and support for the Saudi judiciary rulings, which affirm the kingdom's commitment to implementing the law transparently and impartially, and holding all those involved in this case accountable."

Kuwaiti Ministry of Foreign Affairs said, "it categorically rejects everything that would prejudice the sovereignty of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia."
