Demi Lovato 'completely embarrassed' by ex Max Ehrich's behaviour after breakup

Demi Lovato isn't a fan of how Max Ehrich is handling their breakup. The pair is rumoured to have begun dating in March and became engaged in July. Just last week, Fox News confirmed that their engagement had ended. Since then, Ehrich, 29, has claimed on Instagram that Lovato, 28, didn't inform him of the breakup, but that he learned the news from a tabloid. He followed that claim with several social media posts, per E! News, suggesting he was being "bullied" by the singer's fans.

"Please stop trying to thank you, next... Me," he said in reference to the popular Ariana Grande hit. "... For I'm just a human being who has to go to work tomorrow AM where there are families with kids relying on me. Thanks. God bless." An insider told the outlet that

The posts reportedly haven't gone over well with the "Anyone" singer, according to a source that spoke to the outlet. "Demi wants no contact with Max at this point," said the insider. "She is completely

embarrassed at the way he's been acting and putting their relationship on blast via social media. She wants nothing to do with him."

Additionally, the source claims that Ehrich is "in denial" about the end of their engagement and has "tried to reach out" to the singer, but she finds his behaviour "worrying" because she "does not want the situation to escalate."

"Demi is completely done and doesn't want to see him again at this point," the source said. "She can't believe she fell into his trap and is really upset over it."

It also appears that the singer has deleted photos of herself and Ehrich from Instagram, as has Ehrich.

Lovato hasn't spoken publicly about the break up yet, but has been spending time with loved ones, according to the source.

"She's been spending a lot of time with her family and friends to help heal from this and they are all keeping her occupied and rallying around her," they said.

A source told People magazine that they broke up to focus on "their respective careers," but citing a source, E! reports that Lovato "didn't know who Max truly was and didn't think he had good intentions."

Mariah Carey says her mother's jealousy has lived 'with me for the rest of my life'

Mariah Carey is reflecting on the impact her mother had on her as a child.

The 50-year-old singer has been busy in recent weeks promoting her new memoir "The Meaning of Mariah Carey," which drops tomorrow.

Among the topics she discusses in the book is her relationship with her mother, who was allegedly jealous of the up-and-coming musician.

Carey's mother, Patricia, was a Julliard-trained opera singer.

"My mother is a very talented singer ... I've always credited her with exposing me to music, with really [not] saying ... 'if I make it,' [but to] say 'when I make it,'" reflected the "We Belong Together" singer. "It's such a complicated relationship."

Carey further alleged that Patricia once told her that Carey "should only hope" to be "half the singer that" she was, as CBS' Gayle King put it.

"It definitely had an effect on me," confessed Carey. "I don't even know that she would even remember that. That one statement did live with me for the rest of my life. You have to be so careful what you say."

Fox News' attempts to reach Patricia were unsuccessful.

Comments like that one have even affected the way Carey treats her own children, the singer said.

"... With my kids, I really try to acknowledge their talent and acknowledge when they draw a picture for me or sing or dance or anything that they do, I want them to know that it's also all about them and their happiness," she explained. "For me, it's very important that the kids always feel safe and that they feel seen and heard and that they know that they are loved unconditionally and that no matter what, I'll be there for them."

Carey is mother to nine-year-old twins Moroccan and Monroe, who she shares with ex-husband Nick Cannon.

She elaborated: "That's very important to me because growing up and being alone in the house or alone in these dangerous situations was traumatizing."

Carey said that writing the book was about "emancipating [her] inner child, the little girl that never really felt seen or heard."

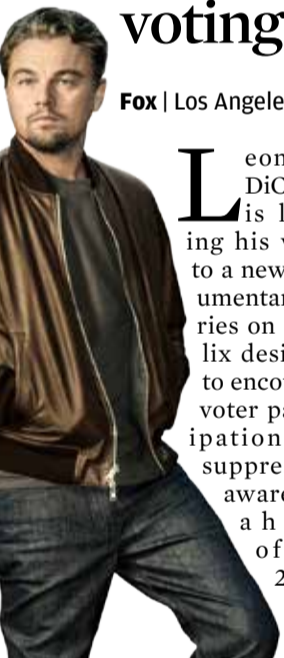
She added that she grew up poor and "struggled with race and identity," leaving her "scared."

Leonardo DiCaprio narrates documentary series about voting rights ahead of 2020 election

Leonardo DiCaprio is lending his voice to a new documentary series on Netflix designed to encourage voter participation and suppression awareness ahead of the 2020 presidential election.

The actor, 45, narrates the first episode of "Whose Vote Counts, Explained," a short form limited series from Vox Media in partnership with his Appian Way Productions. The series tells the story of the history of voting rights in America and lays out the importance of voting in the upcoming election. It also explains the difficulties some people have had historically with getting their vote counted.

"In 1776, voting was a privilege, almost exclusively for White men with property," DiCaprio says in the opening to

episode one. The series then shows historians, former and current politicians and celebrities discussing the current fight for voting rights in the US.

"All of us may have been created equal. But we'll never actually be equal until we all vote. So don't wait," DiCaprio later adds.

In total, "Whose Vote Counts, Explained" will consist of three episodes, with the other two narrated by Selena Gomez and John Legend, according to People. Also appearing are Stacey Abrams, Rep. Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez, former Ohio Gov. John Kasich and former California Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger.

Now, during an episode of his

podcast "Armchair Expert, Shepard has issued a thank you to those who have supported him through the process.

"Just quickly, I want to say thanks to all the people that have been so unbelievably lovely to us in response to 'Day 7,'" he said in reference to

the episode in which he revealed the relapse.

Monica Padman, Shepard's co-host, said she hoped that the actor "felt loved and supported" after sharing his news and that his "fears were abated."

"My fears were the opposite of

what the result was," said Shepard. "But, yes, [I'm] struggling with receiving some fraudulent feelings of love based on a f-k up. But, at any rate, I am really, really grateful and there's so many beautiful, nice people."
